American Makes Successful Flight—Other Ships Fall Enroute.

Genoa, May 31—(Special to the Signal)—Roland Garros in the Aerial race from Paris to Turin today fell about forty miles out from Rome. He escaped unhurt. His machine rolled over on its back but was not badly damaged. Frey, German Trent fell at Pisa. He was unhurt also, but the propeller on his car was broken.

Beaumont, the American passed here safe and reached Rome in the afternoon, winning \$20,000.

SAN ANGELO GETS SHOPS

Orient Road Will Move From Sweetwater to San Angelo Contract Held Void.

Austin, Texas, May 31—(Special to Signal)—The Supreme Court today finally rendered and settled the case of the Orient Railroad company vs. the City of Sweetwater and held that the contract made by officials of the road to locate shops at Sweetwater is not binding on the Company.

It is understood that this will mean the Orient shops will move to San Angelo.

Supreme Court Renders Favorable to San Angelo.—Other Rulings of Importance at Austin.

EXCITEMENT IN WHEAT PIT

Shortage of Actual Stock—Buyers Demand Full Delivery

Chicago, Ill., May 31—(Special to Signal)—The leading spirits in the present May wheat deal are believed to be in a close place today. It is said that they had 15,000,000 bushels for May deliveries and among dealers it is believed that amount can be turned over by tonight but the uncertainty is very trying. The bull leaders insist that every bushel purchased shall be delivered, otherwise the undelivered wheat must go on the July basis which is 12 or 13 cents under May.

Officials of the Board of Trade are investigating.

Eastern Rate War

Formal complaint by eastern railroads of the reduction by the Delaware and Hudson railway of 13 cents a hundred in the class freight rates between New York and Chicago was made to the interstate commerce commission, which will inquire into the reduction with a view to suspending the rate if found unreasonably low. The complaint brings directly to an issue the question whether the commission is empowered to suspend a reduction in rates and should the reduced rate be sustained there is likelihood of a serious rate war among the eastern railways.

Rural High Schools.

The 32nd legislature passed a law providing for a system of rural high schools, prescribing rules for their establishment and conduct, and creating a board of education in each county. This board is to consist of five members. The commissioner court is to appoint this board for the present, and the members will hold office till the general election, at which time the people will elect the members. The law makes provisions as to eligibility with reference to residence and moral and intellectual qualifications. The object is to raise the standard of education and to provide for the co operation of two or more districts in maintaining high schools in the country where the pupils may have the same facilities for the high school education that are now provided in the independent districts embracing the larger towns. This is a fine opportunity for educational advancement and the county board of education should be made up of men made awake to the importance of higher education, and possessing constructive ability to properly organize such schools, and have them started out along practical lines. If the first work should be done in a bungling way so as to prove unsatisfactory, the people would be disgusted with the plan, and let it fall into disuse. If the work is properly started, it will grow in popular favor and the rural high schools will do a good work in the education of the boys and girls in the country districts.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, John xiv, 15-27.
Memory Verses, 25-27—Golden Text,
John xiv, 16—Commentary Prepared
by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

As Israel's penitence and God's pardon, according to Hos. xiv, the regular lesson for the day, can only be by the Holy Spirit, we will consider briefly that lesson, but give most of the time to the gospel lesson. It is as they shall look upon Him whom they have pierced, when they shall see Him coming in glory, that the Lord will pour upon the house of David and the inhabitants of Jerusalem the Spirit of grace and of supplication, and there shall be a national mourning and a national forgiveness (Zech. xii, 9; xiii, 1). Then shall Hos. xiv be fulfilled, and after that He will pour out His Spirit upon all flesh (Joel ii, 27, 28).

It is only by the same Holy Spirit that believers in this present age can know the meaning of sin and righteousness and judgment by knowing Jesus Christ as the great sin bearer and by seeing in His sufferings how hateful sin is to God. Jesus Christ can only be a great Saviour to such as have seen themselves to be great sinners. Paul saw himself to be the chief of sinners, and to him Jesus Christ was such a great Saviour that he could think or talk of no one else. It will be just so with his people Israel, and after their conversion there will be a nation of Pauls to make Jesus Christ known to all the world.

In this present age if every believer was filled with the Spirit as our Lord Jesus would like us to be then the world that seeth not and knoweth not and cannot receive the Spirit of truth would see something of Jesus Christ in His people, and many would want to know Him. The Spirit always testifies of Christ, teaches things concerning Him, guides into all truth, shows us things to come and brings to remembrance what we have read or heard about Jesus (John xiv, 16, 17, 26; xv, 26; xvi, 7-13). He is specially "the Comforter" (parakletos) and is so called four times in these verses just referred to.

So we have a comforter in the presence of the Father and a Comforter dwelling in us, but more wonderful still, according to verses 17, 23, Father, Son and Holy Spirit all dwell in us if we are true believers and make our bodies their abode, or mansion, for the word translated "abode" in verse 23 is the very same word which is translated "mansion" in verse 2, and it is used nowhere else, although the verb from which the noun comes is used a great many times and is variously translated—abide, remain, dwell, continue.

It is impossible to fully grasp such a truth, and yet it is stated again and again in such words as these: "Christ liveth in me," "That Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith," "The life of Jesus made manifest in our body" (Gal. ii, 20; Eph. iii, 17; I Cor. iv, 10, 11). In verse 19 of our lesson He seems to say that He expects that the world will see Him in us. His life at the Father's right hand, where He ever liveth to make intercession for us, makes sure our life, and if we would more steadfastly behold Him and not people or circumstances we would be more manifestly changed into His likeness by the Spirit (I Cor. iii, 18). He longs to reveal Himself to us and through us, and He does this by His Spirit and His word (I Sam. iii, 21; Ps. cxix, 420; I Cor. iv, 6; John vi, 63; xiv, 21-23).

We must not only read His word and memorize it, laying it up in our hearts, but we must eat it, appropriate it, make it our very own, according to Jer. xv, 16; Job xxiii, 12; Ezek. iii, 1-4; Rev. x, 8-11. Thus only can we know the peace which He alone can give. He is the Prince of peace, the God of peace, the peace of God, our peace (Isa. ix, 6, 7; Heb. xiii, 20; Phil. iv, 6, 7; Col. iii, 15; Eph. ii, 14). By the blood of His cross He has made peace, and when we truly receive Him we have peace with God and may be filled with joy and peace in believing (Col. i, 20; Rom. v, 1; xv, 13), but the peace of God will only keep our hearts when we commit everything to Him in prayer and rely on Him to see to it.

As to neither being troubled nor afraid see also verse 1 and compare Matt. xxiv, 6; Luke xxiv, 38, and notice how He closed this discourse in John xvi, 33, with the assurance that we must expect tribulation. If any one else had said you shall have trouble, but do not be troubled, we would think them very unbalanced, but He was God (verse 1), and He is God and is unceasingly caring for us and making all things work together for our highest good, assuring us that all our afflictions are light and but for a moment comparatively and are all working for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory (Rom. viii, 28; I Cor. iv, 17, 18).

It is only in trial that we can really manifest that He is living in us, for almost any one can be lovely and pleasant when all goes well. May we learn to glory in all things that His power may rest upon us (I Cor. xii, 6, 10) and have always that whole hearted, unbounded confidence in Him that shall say, "Even so, just and true are Thy ways; I know that Thou art righteous; Thy way is perfect."

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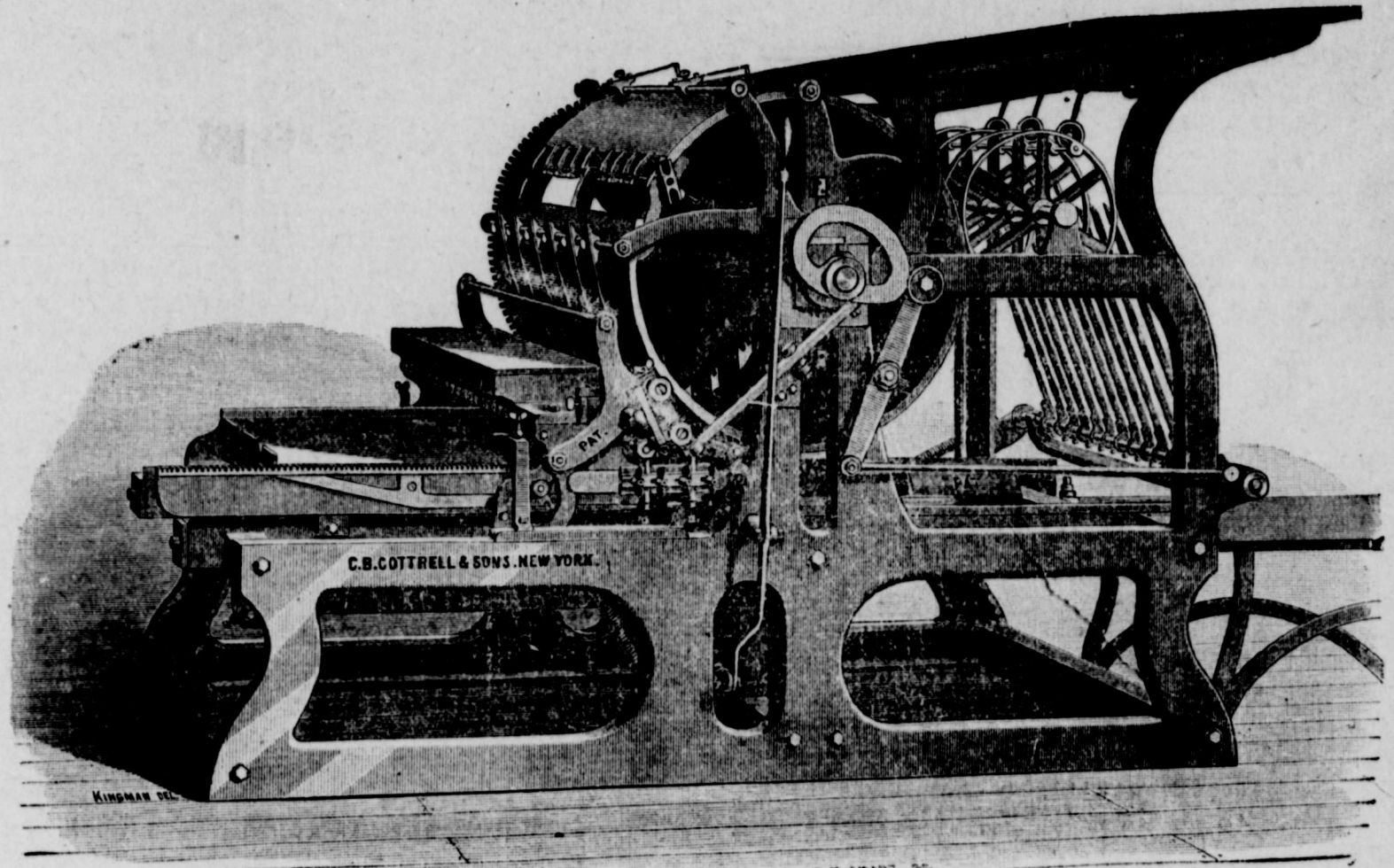
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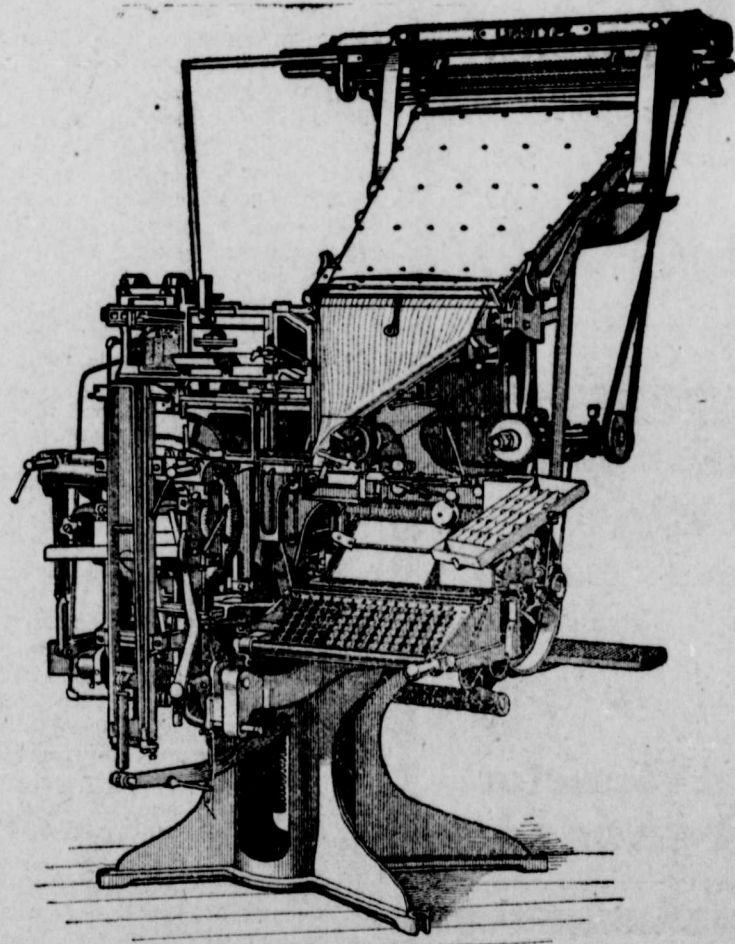
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
