## Industrial Education the Mean lem in the South

Boston, June 12 -The Regeneration of the colored populatiton in the Rural South was the subject of an address by Miss Rosa B. Cooley, Superintendent of the Penn Normal, Industrial and Agri
cultural School of St. Helena Island, S. C. before the National Conference of Charities and Correction here this evening. Miss Cooley's address was the nature of a report on an experiment she has been making
for several years, with a population of six thousand negroes and nify whites included in the con-
munity of St. Helena Island which lies off the coast of South Carolina. She has employed negro farm demonstrators, has provided educational facilities for the children and has made the sehool a social
settlement. She concluded that negroes are needed in the rural South and that if conditions are they will remain. Due to its isolation, this community has been en-
abled to develop naturally and has made great progress toward
iodustrial efficiency. Miss Cooley concluded that sim
