It is believed that the new pistol will be of importance for policemen as they may be able to overcome rowdies or even unmanageable crowds effectively without killing any body.



### QUAINT ENGLISH CEREMONY

Investitiure of Britains Future Ruler in Historic City of Crnervan Amid Quaint Welsh Surroundings

Special to Signal.

Carnarvon, Wales, July 15-The most interesting event ensuing on the coronation is to occur on July 15-namely the investiture of the young Prince of Wales amid quaint Welsh surroundings and at the very birthplace of the first English Prince of Wales, Edward, son of King Edward I and Queen Eleanor.

A Tradition connectd with the an cient Welsh castle of Carnarvon, where the ceremony is to take place, says that after Edward the First's conquest of Wales, the Welshmen refused to obey any prince appointed by the king as regent of the principality, unless he was born on its soil. Queen Eleanor shortly afterwards gave birth of a son in the eastleof Carnarvon and thereupon the King, calling the chiefs of the Welsh nation together, askedthem whether they would obey a prince nominated by him, as he was compelled to leave the country. They replied in the affirmative on condition that the prince was a Welshman. Edward then named his own son born only a few days before and the Welshmen were satisfied.

The prince was afterward shown to the nation, or as many of them as could getnear enough to see him, from what is known as Queen Eleanors gateway.

It is from this gateway of the castle, which had been prepared for the purpose, that the new princeof Wales, after his investiture today, shows himself to his subjects who are to gather to the number of 15,000 or 20,000 in this vicinity.



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### Problems of the Fireside

The American home is the throne and fountain head of greatness and the destinies of the human race must depend upon the wisdom of the fireside. Politicians may make party platforms; legislatures may pass laws, but the fundamental questions of public importance must be finally settled by the man of toil as he quietly sits by the fireside after the day's work is over.

The Struggle for Power.

The outstanding ambition of the human race today is power. Financiers, with the inventive genius of an Edison. are seeking to associate capital in such a way as to multiply power. Labor, with the mighty trend of a nation marshaling its army, is seeking to arrange its forces so as to increase power. The farmer, with the patient and honest endeavor typical of his occupation, is seeking by organized methods to gain power. Each is endeavoring to combine two or more economic units of their class in such a way as to increase the power of both. The purposes are laudable, but the methods each must employ present problems in which all humanity is involved and they must be finally settled at the fireside.

### The Problems Upon Us.

We are well into these problems with capital in the foreground, Numerous solutions have been suggested, but the most primitive one is that of prohibiting by law the extension and multiplication of power through organized effort. This solution is manifestly impracticable. No one would for a moment tolerate a law that would prevent the invention or use of an appliance which would multiply the power of steam or any other potential energy, because perchance it might also increase the danger-in growth the element of danger always increases at the same ratio as other component parts. To destroy or limit power is to strike down progress and return to the dark ages, and is an acknowledgment of our incapacity to cope with human affairs. We must quickly recede from this position or pass rapidly on to government ownership.

To acquire the highest degree of efficiency in civilization, we must develop every pound of energy and power for usefulness there is in all things and multiply this power as many times as human ingenuity can devise, minimizing, as far as possible, the element of danger without weakening the source of power.

The problems in the industrial horizon today are gigantic and their solution awaits the patriotic and careful consideration of men of noble minds and big hearts as they sit by the fireside.

### The Texas Banks

Money is the blood of commerce and our banks are the heart of our financial system. They are a necessary and powerful factor in the state's development. Sam Houston was opposed to banks and at the first Constitutional Convention introduced the following resolution: "No banking institution or office of discount and deposit or any other moneyed corporation or banking establishment shall ever exist under the constitution of Texas." General Houston defended the resolution on the floor of the convention, but lost. Since then our banking institutions have been growing rapidly.

### Our Bankers.

The patriotism, ability and conservatism of the Texas bankers have protected, built up and directed the state's material growth, placing under our business institutions solid, substantial foundations and the financial fibre of the state is strong, vigorous and sufficiently elastic to care for our big problems in development.

### Our Banks.

We have 527 national banks, 626 state banks, 174 private banks and five savings banks. The combined capital of the state and national banks is \$63,-483,500, surplus \$26,135,031, undivided profit \$9,383,505 and the deposits on June 1, 1910. \$279.580,541. The figures on private banks are not of record and are, therefore, omitted in the above data. The amount on deposit in our banks is equal to \$70 per capita.

"There is no question but that Summer or early fall plowing will pay. Deep plowing will pay far better at this time than shallow

"We have learned by experience that our deep plowing must be done as long before planting time as possible to plow deep just before planting time often lishes a moisture connection be means filure for that season. Prac tically all of our crops require a plow early enough to give the ground time to settle before planting."

July and August planting is ad visable. The question is asked "Why is early plowing advisable?" This has several answers. The question might be asked Why do we plow at all? "We plow to kill weeds, conserve moisture, bet ter the physical condition of the soil, make plant food available, give to the plant roots larger area to draw from, etc."

"By diseing small grain ground as soon as possible after harvest the moisture can be saved so that the plowing can be done at any desired time thereafter."

"July and August, deep plowing will do more to insure crops for us than any other method or time of tilling. It is at this time of the year that plant food is man ufactured faster than any other time. This is especially true of soil that is well worked and kept in proper condition. We must remem ber that plant food is manufactur ed in our soils in the presence of good cultivation with moisture, heat, sun light and good ventila




