## WAITING FOR A BACKHANDER

**Bexar County Sheriff Placed a Decoy to Catch the Criminal.**

San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 12.—Sheriff Tobin is lying in wait for a blackhand to attempt to cash a check for \$3000 on the First National Bank of San Antonio.

This check was left at a point designated in a black hand letter received recently by Louis Kaufman, a prominent dry goods merchant of this city, demanding a thousand dollars.

Sheriff Tobin dropped on the ruse of making a check payable to "cash." This check was placed at a point designated, in the brush two miles north of the city. The check has disappeared from the hiding place and it is hoped to catch the culprit when he goes to cash it.

**Turkish Sentiment is Strained**

**Walsh Not Paroled.**

Leavenworth, Kan., Oct. 12.—The first list of Paroles granted

by the Federal Parole Board at its last meeting does not contain the name of John R. Walsh the Chicago banker. Walsh and his friends had expected clemency for him at this sitting.

**Interstate Meeting Endorsed**  
Austin, Oct. 10.—Governors of five Southern States wired their endorsement of the suggestion made by Gov. Colquitt for a consultation over plans to prevent the decrease in cotton prices. It is expected that a time and place will soon be announced.

**Estimate of Texas Crops.**  
Dallas, Texas, Oct. 9.—Reports received by the Texas Industrial Congress from eighty nine counties in the state, amply justify its work during the present year in advocating the adoption of better cultural methods. Notwithstanding an unfavorable season and the prolonged drouth, the combined average yield (estimated) of corn per acre, raised by the contestants for the prizes that were offered by the Congress is thirty-one bushels and an estimated average yield of 58-100 bales of cotton per acre. It is of course impossible for us even to approximate the average yield of the State, but it is not probable that the corn crop will average over fifteen bushels and cotton over 1-3 bale per acre. The Congress will hold its third annual convention in Dallas within the next ninety days as soon as the winners of the ten thousand dollars in prizes can be ascertained.—Texas Industrial Congress.

## FREIGHT MOVING ON RAILROADS

**Strike Conditions Continue to Improve on Lines Around Fort Worth**

Continued improvement in the Strike situation on the Houston and Texas Central and the Katy affecting Fort Worth was reported Wednesday.

The Katy traffic is better than that of the Houston and Texas Central and it is reported that all freight trains are moving on schedule again. Fifteen freight trains moved from Fort Worth on the Katy Tuesday and fifteen or twenty will be the total number sent out today.

No hose cutting was reported in either the Katy or the H. and T. C. yards here Tuesday night. Twelve strike breakers are at work in the Katy yards and four in the H. & T. C. yards.

Ample guard protection is still maintained.

The police were accompanying the wealthy veterinary to Fort Worth for identification by the police of that city when he slipped off of an interurban ear and not been located since.

## TEXAS INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

A conference was held last week at Honey Grove relative to the proposed interurban from Sherman to Paris and possibly to Clarksville. Secretary Ragland of the Paris Board of Trade and J. F. McReynolds of Paris attended. A decision was reached whereby the necessary money is

to be raised to secure the commercial survey and the matter will then be referred to the railroad builders for action.

A new school building will be erected on Prospect Hill in San Antonio at a cost of \$45,000.

The Leyhe Piano Company of Dallas has increased its capital stock from \$100,000 to 210,000.

A charter has been secured by the Texas Land and Lumber Company of Houston with a capital stock of \$310,000.

During the past twelve months according to statistics just compiled by Wharfmaster Maurice Murphy of Houston, 2,064,871 tons of freight valued at over forty-six million dollars were shipped on the Houston Ship Channel from points within the city limits.

An election is to be held at Fairfield in Freestone county for the purpose of voting \$150,000 for building good roads.

The right of way terminals, permanent surveys and estimates of the cost of construction, together with subscription of \$350,000 has been secured for building a railroad from Smithville to Deepwater at Aransas port.

With the completion of the survey of the Neches river from Beaumont to its intersection with the Sabine-Neches Canal and of that canal from the river to the Sabine Pass, the practical work of making a twenty-five foot channel from Beaumont to the Gulf, will have begun. All of the work of the survey will be completed this week.

## TRADES UNIONISM IS PUT ON TRIAL

**McNamara Case Will Test Attitude of Country on Federated Labor.**

From the line of questions asked the prospective jurors yesterday it appears that there will be many clashes between the opposing sides as to the questions put to the jurors.

The friends of trades unionism have an attorney in the case and efforts will be made to determine the question of union labor. It will be the purpose of the defense to put unionism on the defensive. The probabilities are that it will require a long time to secure a jury acceptable to both sides. Any shade of sympathy for or against union labor will be challenged by the opposite side.

## STABBED IN HIS BED

Watch and Money Missing—Police Say Man Was After Valuables.

Fort Worth Record:

While lying in bed asleep at the San Antonio rooming house at Fifteenth and Houston streets Saturday night, Emmett Leech, an employee of the Ft Worth Light and Power Company of the white way construction department was assaulted, beaten and perhaps fatally stabbed.

The purpose of the assault is believed to have been robbery as the money and watch of the man could not be found.

Leech was stabbed in the upper part of the abdomen and almost bled to death before the arrival of the police ambulance in which he was hurriedly taken to the Medical College Hospital. He also sustained three deep scalp wounds.

According to Leech's story he was awakened by a sharp pain in the abdomen and looked into the face of the man bending over him. He could hardly realize what the man was about until the pain became more acute and he saw the man withdraw his hand and hold a knife in the air ready to strike again. He caught the descending arm just in time and the man dropped the knife and began to use his fists, throwing Leech from the bed and kicking him in the face.

A crowd downstairs in the saloon heard the struggle and ran to the scene in time to see a man disappear through the hallway.

They found Leech moaning and bleeding from his wounds. He was unable to throw any light on the identity of the assailant, other than that he believed that the man assaulted him for the purpose of robbery. A search revealed that the room had been ransacked, but why the man stabbed the sleeper is a mystery.

A newspaper man at Wichita Falls criticised a district judge

for one of his official rulings and the said judge had the offending journalist brought before him and proceeded to commit him for contempt. We wish our judges were too wise to make mistakes, but since none are to be so considered, what are we to do about it?

## Parts of Colorado and New Mexico Suffer Heavy Loss of Life and Property.

Denver, Colorado, Oct. 10.—Property losses from the floods in Northern New Mexico and Southern Colorado are estimated today at five million dollars.

There are rumors of heavy loss of life but this has not been verified.

The death list so far as is complete is small.

It is reported that twenty persons were drowned at Shipwreck Agency at Navajos.

The entire hamlet of Araboles was destroyed and some towns are cut off from railroad service. These places have been isolated for at least two months and it will be some time before such places are accessible to travel except by stage coach and that will be uncertain and haphazardous.

## REPORT OF STATE GINNERS

September Ginnings are Large.—Season Shows Million and a Half

Austin, Texas, Oct. 10.—The state ginner's report issued today places the number of bales of cotton ginned in September at 1,004,868 in the State.

This estimate is counting round bales as half bales. The total count of ginnings in Texas for the season is 1,443,243. This quantity is nearly half of a normal crop.

## Italians Make Landing

Rome, Oct. 10.—The first Italian expedition for Tripoli made a landing today at Tobruk east of the city a few miles. It consisted of infantry, artillery and an engineering corps.

## BRIDEGROOM COMMITS SUICIDE

Army Officer Enmeshed Matrimony Ends Trouble Six Hours After Wedding

San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 9.—Lieut. John R. Lynch of the 3rd Cavalry aged 25 years was married at one o'clock last night to Miss Gladys Caruthers and killed himself with a pistol at seven o'clock this morning at the officer's quarters at Fort Sam Houston.

He was not with his bride at the time of the tragedy.

He confided no secret to any one, but had said to friends "I am up against it."

He had seemed despondent ever since the marriage ceremony was performed.

Whatever was in his life to move him to the rash act so soon after his marriage, may possibly be developed later, but up to the present time it is a sad mystery.

The lawyers sat around with nothing to do today. The County Clerk picked up a bunch of Bro. Hunt's Exhorters and passed them around. Two lawyers went into a primary Sunday school room and studied the map of the East to try to locate Tripoli and another disciple of Blackstone said he had read numerous ideas about the location of the garden of Eden and he wanted to find it with his own eyes. Just then Sheriff Boles announced the Court duly and constitutionally open and the lawyers left off all public research and came back to the precincts of jurisprudence.

Judge Smith stated that he had received letters and telephone messages from men in every section of the county saying that the whole year's labor is at stake.

That their cotton is open and must be gathered now or lost and begging that they may be permitted to stay at home and work, accordingly the Court addressing the attorneys made the following announcement:

"Gentlemen of the Bar:

This Court after due consideration and upon his own motion is going to continue every case on this docket until the January term, 1912 and in so doing I do so without prejudice to any one. All cases now on file will stand on the docket, just as though they had been filed for the regular January term.

Mr. Sheriff, you may notify the regular draw jury for this term that they need not come, but stay at home and attend to their crops.

Gentlemen of the Bar, you get busy and notify each and every witness at once that they are not needed, and not to come. I will hear all default cases on the docket and all pleas of guilty that may be wanted to be made, but any case calling for a jury or witnesses is now continued, on my own motion.

Gentlemen, I do this after due consideration and think that I am warranted in so doing. This is the first crop that the farmers have made in four years and they are needed in their crops, their time at home is worth more to them now than at any other time of the year. Let them stay at home and gather their crops. Take twelve men out of their crops for jury service and the number of witnesses that would have to come here and stay away from day to day would work a great hardship on them. You may not agree with me in this matter, but I believe it is right.

The Court therefore makes and enters this, the following order:

"On this the 10th day of October, 1911 in open Court, the Court makes and enters this the following order: It is ordered by the Court that each and every case on the Criminal, Civil and Probate Docket of the County Court of Seurry County, Texas, be and the same is hereby continued to the January term, A. D. 1912, without prejudice to any one. The cases not contested and pleas of guilty will be heard at this, the October term of Court. It is further ordered by this court that the jury be and is hereby discharged for the term."

### FRITZ R. SMITH,

County Judge, Seurry County, Texas.

The Court then proceeded to hear such matters as default cases as might be presented and all contested matters were passed over to the next regular term of the County Court.

### Bassenger's Premium Chickens.

A. L. Bassenger, who lives 8 or ten miles south of town sent a bunch of brown leghorns to the Nolan county fair at Roscoe last week and brought back three blue ribbons and two red ribbons. The bunch consisted of a cock and five hens and they are beauties. Mr. Bassenger has about seventy-five hens of this strain and he says his egg crop is a great source of revenue. The Leghorn is the greatest rustler in the fowl kingdom and as egg producers they have no superior.

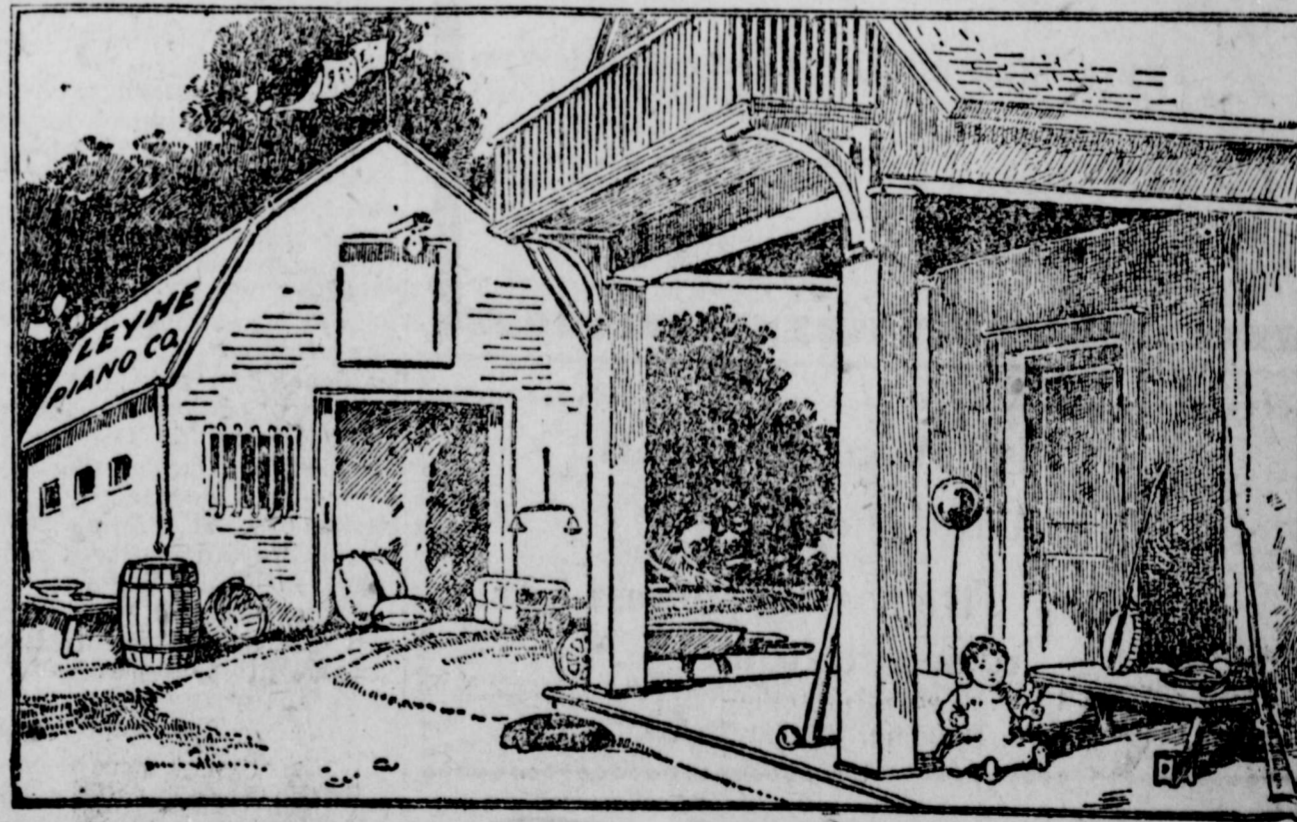

**POPULATION DRIVEN TO HILLS**

**Big Dam Breaks and Town of Falls Submerged—People Need Food and Tents**

LaCrosse, Wis., Oct. 7.—The town of Black River Falls is overflowed from the unusual rise.

More than two thousand people have been driven to the hills and they spent last night without food or shelter and watched the waters of Black river overrun their homes and sweep away their belongings.

The river is swollen from the recent heavy rains and burst thru the dam at Hatfield and swept out over the town and surrounding country.

The people had ample warning to get themselves out, but without extra clothing or opportunity to move any of their goods and chattels.

The rains stopped yesterday evening and there will be less exposure, but it will be several days before the water recedes.

There are no reports of loss of life.

Mayor McGill has issued an appeal for help, saying that all that his people need are food and tents in which they can live, as they rebuild their ruined homes.

**FALL RESULTS IN DEATH**

**Scalp Wound and Broken Arm Result From Accident. Injury Proves Fatal.**

Fort Worth, Texas.—Charles Chamberlain, aged thirty four years died Sunday last at his home on First and Throckmorton streets as a result of injuries received Saturday night when he fell down a flight of concrete steps.

According to information received at the police department, Chamberlain, his wife and a friend were together Saturday night and while on their way home Chamberlain stepped off the side walk at Throckmorton and 8th to rest on a flight of steps that led to a basement. He lost his balance and fell to the bottom, a distance of fifteen feet. His scalp was wounded and one arm was broken.

The scalp wound resulted in his death. He was a carpenter by trade, had been in Fort Worth, two years and was a Knight of Pythias.

The body is being held in Fort Worth undertaking parlors pending funeral arrangements.

**ACCIDENTAL TRAGEDY**

**Walter Porter, Nineteen Years Old Was Instantly Killed Near Tahoka**

Walter Porter, 19 years old, who live ten miles east of Tahoka was accidentally killed while getting wood. He and his younger brother were together and were eating dinner. Walter took hold of the barrel of a gun to get it out of the way and struck the hammer against the wheel of the wagon, the shot passing through his body, killing him instantly.

The material is being hauled out to Ennis Creek, to Round Top and to Camp Springs for the three new steel bridges at those places.

**REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY**

To Hon. John B. Thomas, Judge of the 39th Judicial District of Texas—

We, the Grand Jury, organized at the September Term 1911, of the District Court of Scurry Co., beg leave to report to your honor that we have diligently inquired into all violations of law that have come to our knowledge and having completed the work before us as such grand jury, we hereby ask to be discharged.

Pursuant to the obligations resting upon us as such grand jury, we have true presentment made of all persons against whom sufficient evidence could be obtained to show that a violation of the penal statutes of our state had been committed.

We have learned of comparatively few misdemeanor violations that have not been acted upon by our local officers who are charged with the duty of enforcing the laws against crime, and most of the violations of law of the grade of felony that have come to our knowledge had previously been acted upon by our local officers and the defendant placed under bond to await the action of this grand jury.

We desire to commend the Sheriff's department of our county for its vigilance and activity in detecting and ferreting out criminal offenses and will say that it is our opinion that such vigilance and activity have resulted in lessening our labors and in reducing many violations of the law to the minimum.

With the exception of one particular class of offenses that appears to us to have been committed within our county, we believe the fair name of Scurry county has but few tarnishes upon its bright escutcheon. It appears that a wave, as it were, of this particular class of criminal offenses has recently reached our vicinity and we believe a strict enforcement of the penalties of the law and a prompt punishment of the guilty offenders, whoever they may be, are necessary for the protection of society and for the preservation of the high standard of morals that has heretofore existed in our midst. Good citizens have long boasted of the high standard of morals prevalent in our county, and truly so, but if this high standard is maintained and the purity of our society is upheld, our courts and

active public opinion must demand it, and the libertine, the adulterer, the vagabond and the prostitute must pay the penalties of a violated law.

A very large part of the time of our present session has been consumed in the investigation of facts connected with this character of offense.

We have examined into the finances of our county and the administration of its affairs by our County and Precinct officers so far as it seemed necessary or practical for us to do so. It has now been nearly two years since the appointment has been made of a finance committee to audit the accounts of the several county and precinct officers of the county and we recommend that the appointment of such committee should be made with instructions to make report at the next term of our district court.

We find from our investigations that the laws for the enforced collection of delinquent taxes have not at all been well enforced in our county and large lists of such delinquencies have been passed by the Commissioners' court of our county. We especially call attention to the insolvent delinquent list. We find upon this list of names of persons and firms that should not have been placed there by the tax collector nor approved by the Commissioners' Court for the reason that such parties were not insolvent and the taxes that they are owing to the State and county can be collected by the issuance and placing in the hands of the Sheriff of Tax executions. We find that little if any effort has heretofore been made by the sheriff and tax collector to enforce collections of taxes on personal property about to be removed, or already removed from the county and we suggest that instructions from your Honor to the officers charged with these duties would be productive of good and the better enforcement of the law provided in such cases, for we believe that this apparent negligence of duty on the part of such officers is the result, largely of not understanding correctly the powers conferred upon them by the laws of our state.

**FAMILY SPAT CAUSING RIFFLE**

**Fight Between Edwin and Frank Gould Over Cotton Belt Railroad**

St. Louis—Frank J. Gould's effort to gain representation in the directorate of the St. Louis, Southwestern railway, against the wishes of President Edwin Gould will come to a head at the Company's annual meeting.

Edwin may be present as is his custom, but Frank will be represented by R. Lancaster Williams of Baltimore.

Two attorneys representing Edwin Gould registered at a hotel here tonight when Mr. Williams registered earlier. It is reported that Edwin was at first disposed to grant Frank Gould representation and permit the election of a man named by him, but now it is said that the president of the road is opposed to the idea and that with the votes of the other Goulds he will prevent Frank from getting a sufficient number of proxies to elect a director, even by cumulative votes.

Friends of Edwin Gould expect Frank's representatives will file some kind of a suit and are prepared for a contest at law. While he would not admit that action in court was contemplated, Mr. Williams would make no denial.

The suit it is reported will not be filed until Frank Gould fails to gain representation on the directorate. In railroad cases, the report was passed that the entire Gould family is opposed to Frank J. Gould in his efforts to obtain a further recognition in the Gould properties.

Edwin Gould's attorneys refused to be interviewed tonight.

**The Docket is Crowded**

Washington, D. C. Oct. 9.—More than eight hundred cases are now on docket awaiting consideration by the United States Supreme Court.

This is the heaviest docket noted for twenty years.

**EDITOR GASTON IS SENTENCED**

**Held for Contempt at Abilene For Publishing Forbidden Matter.**

Abilene, Texas, Oct. 9.—H. W. Gaston, editor of the Wichita Daily News was arraigned before District Judge Blanton here today on a charge of contempt, in connection with the publication of matters in the recent criminal trial which had been forbidden and the editor was sentenced to thirty minutes in jail.

The Judge said he could have imposed a more severe sentence, but he had so much admiration for the young man's spirit that he would make the sentence light.

Gaston's bail was set at \$300 pending appeal to the higher courts.

**FEW LABORERS ARE INJURED**

**Explosion Occurs Sixty Feet Underground—Were Working in Solid Rock.**

New York, Oct. 9.—While men were engaged in digging a new aqueduct in Central Park today, at a depth of sixty feet underground an explosion occurred seriously injuring four laborers.

Rock when the drill struck a buried explosive and several tons of rock were hurled through the shaft.

**Mexicans Rally to Madero.**

San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 9.—Because of the presence of Gen. Reyes in the city, the friends of President Madero of Mexico are getting all the new members they can for their Madero Club. They are today planning a big mass meeting in honor of their new national president and in every way possible booming his cause.

**16 Years Ago Today**  
From the News 1895

**Midnight Revel.**

Last Thursday night the grand jury attended the negro minstrel show and after it was over returned from the school house thru the soft moonlight and the softer breezes, called back to their mind the water melon patches of other days. The juvenile juice seemed to be in their veins. Morpheus had wrapped his dimpled arms around the citizens of Snyder. The merchant dreamed of his four hundred per cent, the lawyer of the spoony young couple that rode in his buggy and the spoonier young man that has never left any money to feed the horse with that he drove, the politician dreamed of 16 to 1, that is sixteen votes to the one of his opponents and the newspaper man dreamed of his hard struggle for existence and the long lists of delinquents that are on his books. But alas, Bob Pyron was not dreaming. We know not what scoundrel stole his sleep or his bed, misery loves company and Bob must have company. He was foreman of the grand jury so he roused up a man and sent for Dave Nation to hurry to the livery stable that he needed a buggy. Dave asked no questions, but hastened for he saw the glittering gold that Mrs. Carlisle had given our bonds for coming home to keep up the Nation reserve fund. The boys with Bob received him with open arms. They laughed at David for his pains, he treated and they immediately resolved that they needed company. Pyron ran down and told Sheriff Wellborn that his presence was badly needed at Nation's livery stable and to be quick. Wellborn was quick. He came in his undershirt and pistol belt and at every jump saw Bill Cook and his pals in possession of the town. He had in his mind's eye a desperate fight, he could hear the rapid shots, the cold dull thud of the highwayman as he fell under his determined and law-abiding gun. But his gun failed to fire. He rushed in where the angels feared to tread, and the boys said hold up, we will take cigars and then our sheriff tumbled and set 'em up. C. E. Steel our District Attorney was the next target for fun. Mr. Pyron went over to the grand jury room and struck a light and sent for him. He came with visions of plots deep and felonious. He smiled a sickly smile and said the cigars and apples. Judge Hammer informed Mr. Steele as he left the hotel if he needed him to send for him and he was sent for. He came, we know not what the thought, but from the expression after he arrived, he must have for in this district. He treated and some one said A. C. Wilmeth was the next victim. The sheriff hurried to his residence and told him to come to the court house immediately. Wilmeth hurried to the scene of action and when he got half way was captured by the grand jury mob. He looked dazed for a minute and asked if they wanted to eat, drink or smoke and they smoked and wanted to know where the drink was, but the crowd has never told us where the drinks came in or where the tap is.

E. K. Smith was the next unfortunate. The boys wanted to know in the race till the election was over. He was slow to come, but he came. His first expressions were like he had lost a friend, but as the boys explained to him that they just wanted to know how he felt as to running through, he became more placid and they got him warned up to where he actually talked and before he got through you would, to have heard him, decided he was elected for he very cheerfully said, set 'em up and the gold of the Transvaal passed from E. K. to the home merchant. While the boys were waiting for Smith, Clint Nation slipped over to the gin yard where Dave Jones and W. H. Kimzy were sleeping. Climbing to the wagon, he called Kimzy to come quick there was a man dead up town. Both sprang from their bed and went to help the oycers of law. Rushing by where J. W. Shaw was sleeping they found him with one arm in his breeches leg and one arm in the other vainly trying to put them on; also informing the boys that he would help hang the villain that committed the crime. The first aroused men ran up and captured the supposed criminal, in the person of the sheriff, Harry Nelson was the next sent for. He was one of the bondsmen of Sam Sims and the

boys sent Ed Thompson down to tell him Sam wanted to see him at his back door. Harry came sockless and hatless and as he passed across the square he was called by Judge Hammer who explained to home that Sam did not have time to go around and see before he left and therefore left word with the judge that he could settle with him. Harry took it seriously. He did not seem to size up the situation. It was 2 a. m. and he could not tell if that grand jury was a real grand jury and court on, or was it a bonafide mob with a determination to punish him for what Sam was charged with. He took a seat and looked as if all his relatives had died and left him to pay the funeral expenses. He finally said yes, smoke if you like it and they began to think of a new victim. Lamar was dispatched to bring L. J. Nichols to the front. Lamar told him that if he would come to the store he would buy six harps for the boys were on a serenade and they must just have them. Nichols thought of the sound rattle that silver would have regardless of Carlisle's pleas ure and hastened to comply. He came and as the boys laughed and hallooed and the sun was climbing the Atlantic slope, the boys and grand jury sought slumber and left Nichols thinking how near and yet how far.

Dot Keagans, aged twenty-three years, brother of J. M. Keagans of Snyder, died at his home in Abilene, September 27th at 8 p. m. of typhoid fever.

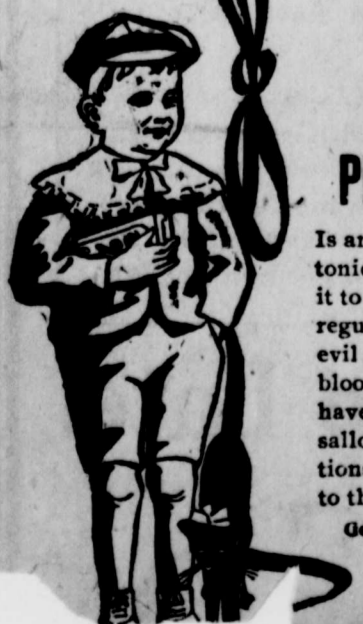

## FARMER IS RUN DOWN BY TRAIN

J. C. Morris Instantly Killed By Texas and Pacific Passenger Train. Body Mangled

J. C. Morris, aged about sixty five years, living southwest of Trent was run down and instantly killed by Texas and Pacific eastbound passenger train No. 4 one mile west of Trent. The body was horribly mangled. It was picked up by No. 4 and taken to Trent and an inquest was held by Justice of the Peace Cobb of Merkel.

Train No. 4 was run by Engineer A. B. Deason. His fireman was B. F. Lender. Conductor Bennett was in charge of the train.

Engineer Deason's account of the tragedy is as follows:

We were running a mile west of Trent on time and were making ordinary time. An old man was walking along the path near the track, sat down on the left rail with his back to the engine. We were about sixty five or seventy yards away at the time. I let the whistle loose, and tried to stop in time, but the pilot struck him in the back, jerking his head back against the coupler. He fell across the track on the right side and the wheels passed over his body. I could do nothing to avoid the tragedy.

## JUSTICE HARLAN DIES TODAY

AGED JUSTICE PASSES AWAY AT HIS HOME IN WASHINGTON

## MORE THAN 30 YRS ON BENCH

Was a Member of the Court When Samuel J. Tilden Was Deprived of Presidency

Washington, D. C., Oct. 14.—As associate Justice John M. Harlan of the Supreme Court died here this morning at home of acute bronchitis.

He was taken ill with a severe cold last Monday and his condition, despite the best of medical attention, gradually grew worse.

He had been a member of the Supreme Court for more than thirty years.

He took part in the proceedings of the court in which Samuel J. Tilden was deprived of the presidency.

Judge Harlan's great ambition was to serve until next June, when he would have exceeded length of service of any man who ever sat upon the United States Supreme bench. As it was, his service extends over a longer period of any, except Judge Marshall and Stephen J. Fields.

## NO SELECTION BEFORE MONDAY

ATTORNEYS WRANGLING OVER TECHNICALITIES OF LAW

## THE COURT HOLDS DECISION

Time of Court Taken Up in Argument at Qualification of Jurors.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 14.—It begins to look very much like there will be no selection made in the McNamara jury before next Monday.

The time of the court is being taken by the attorneys in argument as to whether statement of prospective jurors who had formed an opinion on what they had heard or read about the dynamiting of the Times building, would bar them from serving on the jury.

Interest has centered about venireman Nelson, the defense claiming that his opinion of the case as expressed yesterday was sufficient to disqualify him; the prosecution, however, is contending that the juror can lay aside these prejudices or opinions and be governed by evidence.

Judge Bardwell has reserved his decision on the question raised by the attorneys until Monday.

His decision will, it is expected, settle the most important feature of this trial.

**McNamara Case Involves Union Labor—Juror Nelson is Challenged.**

Los Angeles, Calif., Oct. 13.—When District Court this morning resumed the work of selecting a jury for the trial of James J. McNamara, charged with murder in connection with the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building. General interest is centered on the examination of Talesman Z. T. Nelson, a ruddy faced farmer 62 years old.

The questions and the court rulings had been planned to establish a basis for questioning all other prospective jurors on their attitude toward labor unions.

District Attorney Frederiek announced that he would withdraw his objection to the juror answering whether he believed a great majority of officers of Labor Unions are lawless men. That question had been put directly to Nelson. He replied "I don't believe I can answer that question. I do not know anything about the officers," but finally he said he believed a great many labor officials are lawless men and a great many are not lawless.

Nelson later said that he had formed an opinion on the case, based on what he had heard and seen and his knowledge of public opinion in the matter. The defense challenged the juror for bias and the prosecutor resisted the challenge.

Several hundred anxious fans stood in line all night in order to gain general admission. The early betting favored the Giants 6 to 5.

Both teams played championship ball, but New York proved the strongest and won by a score of 2 to 1.

### H. J. Camp.

Warren of Sparta, Tennessee, settled there and engaged in farming, lumbering, stock raising and trading. Having accumulated a considerable fortune he came to Texas and located in Scurry county in 1881. Here disease and misfortune followed fast and faster and by 1884, he was comparatively a broke man. He had however an optimistic faith and supported with the most inspiring and faithful helpmate that ever fell to man's favor he turned to his avocation of his youth and sought again for the smiles of dame fortune. He was the first surveyor of Scurry county, sought the County judgeship and lost by only three votes. He became the first surveyor of Borden county and the first surveyor of Kent county. Surveyed the county lines of all those counties, returned to Scurry, was elected and served two years as assessor. Since which time he engaged in the land agency business, up till some time three years past, he became too feeble to follow with success.

He was a member of the Christian church and a blue lodge Mason. He was blessed with many children, all of whom have resided in Scurry county and took part in its development.

They were: Mrs. Sam Wilson of China Grove, Sam Camp, deceased, Will Camp of Pecos, Jo. Camp, deceased, Dr. Ed. Camp, deceased, Mrs. Maggie Blankenship of Portales, N. M. Mac Camp Pecos, Mrs. Mary Wilmeth, Los Angeles, Cal., John Camp of Pecos. All the living children except Mrs. Wilmeth are here.

Mr. Camp was enterprising and brought the first high grade sheep to Scurry county, paying \$7.00 per head in Vermont.

In the affidavit, Hyde said that the offer was made May 16, 1910, while Hoffman was conducting him from the jail to the court room. Hoffman, Hyde said, told him to say nothing to his attorneys about it, but to leave the matter to him (Hoffman). The physician however, did tell his attorneys all about it and they at the time, he said, advised him to keep the offer quiet.

But the pleasant memories cling around me still.

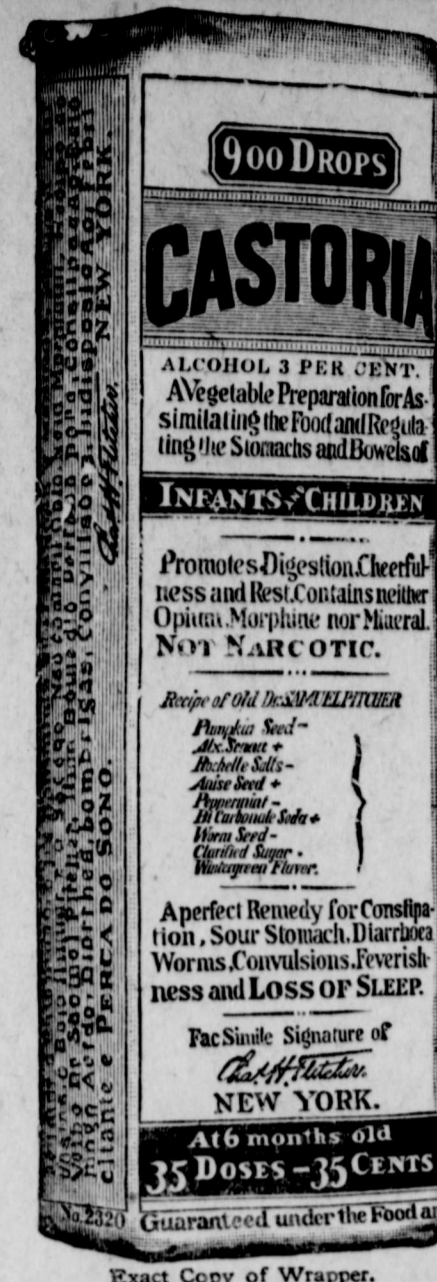

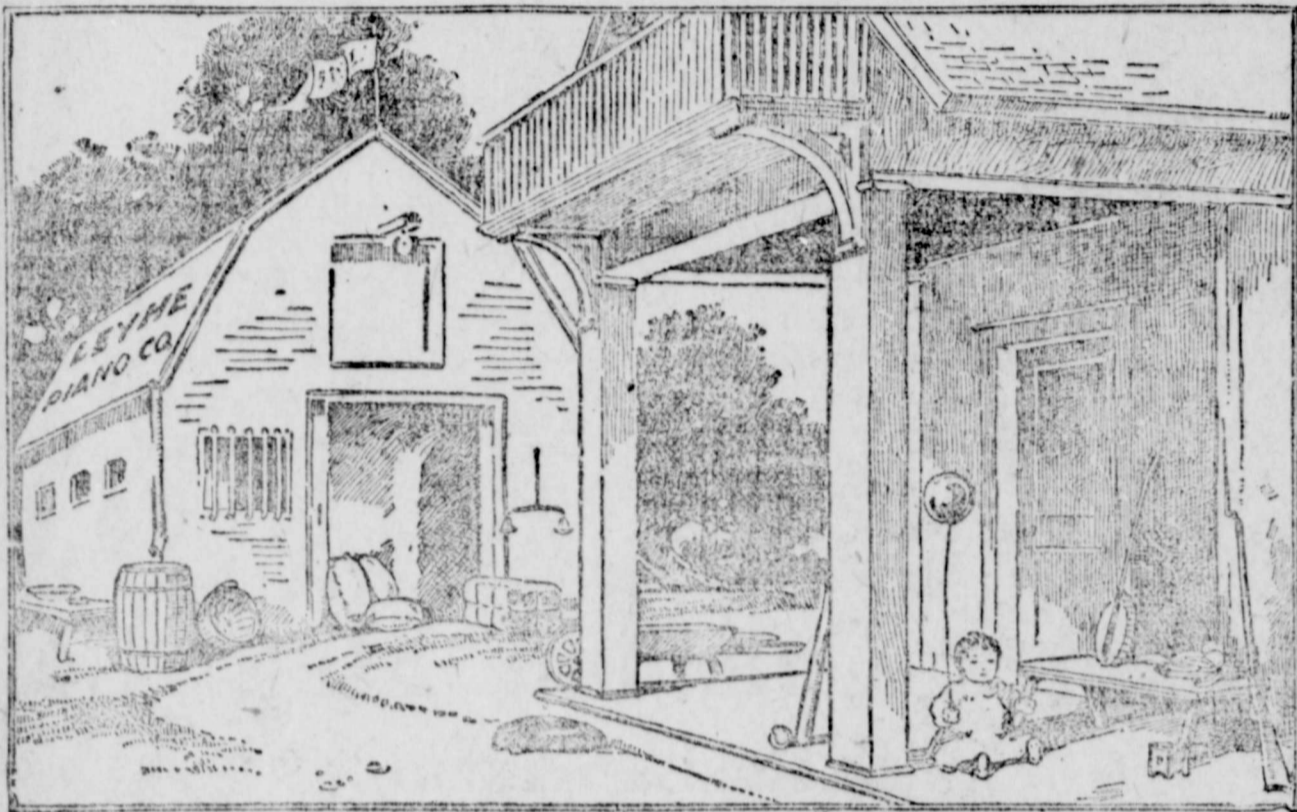
