## IS IN THE COAST COUNTRY

Interesting Letter From a Citizen to The Snyder Signal.

Matagorda, Tex., Feb. 15. Dear Editor and homefolks:

As I sit this afternoon and look at the broad expanse of the water of Matagorda Bay and watch the howling wind toss her to and fro, I am reminded of the wind that blows through the whiskers of the boys in Scurry county. Last night the wind blew, the rain fell and it fill me with fear. Then I wished to be in Snyder where I could hear a kind voice say, fear not father I think the worst is over. Now don't gather from this that I am a coward, but I am a believer in the milk house dug in the ground, and large enough to accommodate a few visitors too.

Matagorda is the third oldest town in the state (so claimed) and there are here some of the old houses (residences) that were built during the slavery times and they are in a fine state of preservation.

The town is small, only about five or six hundred population, I would guess. The people appear to be a good easy going people, don't think they are over flowing with energy.

I have been in this country from the north to the south and from the east to the west and find but very little of it under a general farming system: i. e. cotton, corn, ribbon cane etc., but instead, they have in year's past, had the greater part in rice farming and that did not prove profitable and was given up. About ninety per cent of the land in the county is level prairie and in my opinion is not susceptible to general farming, from the fact that there is not a sufficient natural drainage.

The greater part of the land is black, sticky, clammy soil, very tough and hard to work.

Palacios is a thriving little town of about two thousand population on Matagorda bay and the people are boosting their town and the country; they can show you (on paper) the wonders of their soil and the productiveness and some times they make good money on truck farming, but when they raise a bumper crop, there is no market for it and it will not pay for the gathering and the freight, so the farmers tell me.

## LAST TERRITORY BECOMES A STATE

President Taft Signed Arizona Statehood Proclamation.—Is the Forty-Eighth

Washington, Feb. 16—President Taft has signed the proclamation admitting Arizona to the Union. Thus was added the forty-eighth star to the flag and brought within the sisterhood of States the last bit of Territory within the confines of Continental United States.

To perpetuate the scene for future Arizonians, the moving picture man invaded the White House for the first time.

The President's office was filled with officers of the new state, government officials and other interested.

## INSPECT THE SANTA FE LINES

Railroad Commissioners Mayfield and Wortham With Engineer to Make the Trip

Austin, Texas, Feb. 16—Traveling in General Manager Pettibones private car, Chairman Mayfield and Railroad Commissioner Wortham and Engineer Parker will make a thorough inspection of the Santa Fe system in Texas, commencing at Galveston and then proceeding to the various points covered by that road and its various branches and other properties including the Pecos and Northern Texas Railway.

The terminals at Galveston will be first inspected. The trip will cover over two thousand miles and is for the purpose of getting at the physical condition of the system in Texas.

### Post City's Cotton Mill

The surveyors have been busy this week, laying out the ground plans for the one hundred thousand dollar cotton mill at Post City. The actual construction is to begin next Monday. The main building is to be seventeen hundred feet long and the floor space will cover thirty five acres.

### Santa Fe Farm Train Coming

The Santa Fe diversified farming train will arrive here at eleven o'clock on March 2, and will remain here two hours. There will be four lectures delivered by experts in their lines and the farmers are invited.

The train will be at Dermott from 9 a. m. till 10:30 and at Hermleigh from 1:30 p. m. till 3 o'clock. It is hoped that all the farmers in the surrounding country will hear the lectures and that the business men of the town will turn out in full force.

The train will be made of five cars. Four coaches for lectures and one business car. No exhibit cars will be carried, such exhibits as are needed will be carried in lecture cars.

Diversified farming will be the general theme of the speakers. Every talk will be practical and right to the point. The main subjects to be discussed on this train will be:

1. Better Farming.
  2. Profitable Hog Raising.
  3. Our Farm Poultry.
  4. The Need of More Dairying.
- Everyone visiting this train will have an opportunity to hear every talk.

The train will come rain or shine. Be there on time.

## SHOOTING IS RESULT OF DEMAND FOR APOLOGY

Wichita Falls Men in Trouble Over Language Used in Presence of Women

Wichita Falls, Feb. 15—W. J. Haynes, a prominent cotton dealer and Manager of the Wichita cotton gin is dying tonight from two bullet wounds in his stomach, fired from a thirty eight calibre revolver.

The shooting occurred at the shooting occurred at home of S. B. Parker who lives next door to Haynes in a house owned by the latter.

Parker surrendered to the officers immediately after the shooting and turned over his revolver. He is a freight conductor employed by the Fort Worth and Denver. Haynes in a dying statement said that he went to Parker's house to demand that he apologize to Mrs. Haynes, for language alleged to have been used in her presence.

A fight ensued during which Mr. Haynes was shot.

## CANADA LOSS BY RECIPROCITY

Commission of Thirteen Members of Senate Will Study What Might Have Been

Ottawa, Ont. Feb. 16—A commission of thirteen members of the Canadian Senate will determine exactly what the dominion lost by the rejection of reciprocity with the United States. The Commission was appointed on motion of Senator Edwards, a Liberal of Ontario. At the suggestion of one of the Western members it will also report on what Canada gained in defeating the proposed trade pact.

## WOMAN IN HER OWN DEFENSE

Mrs. Streight Tells Story of Death of Her Husband—Case is Hurried Through

Gatesville Feb. 15—The case of Mrs. Minnie Lee Streight, charged with the murder of her husband, Editor T. E. Streight of the McGregor Mirror, which has been on trial since last Thursday is nearing a close.

Mrs. Streight took the stand in her defense and for two hours gave direct testimony and was subjected to four hours cross examination and was recalled this morning for a short while.

The defense admitted the good character of Mr. Streight as a citizen and business man which did away with about thirty witnesses that were character witnesses.

The defense rested its case just before noon adjournment and rebuttal testimony is being taken.

It is thought that by noon tomorrow the evidence will be all in.

### Arbor Day Proclamation

Whereas, the Revised Civil Statutes contain the following provision

"The 22nd day of February of each year, the same being a legal holiday, is further set apart and designated as 'Arbor Day,' to be devoted to the planting and cultivating of forests, shade and ornamental trees, throughout the State and to be observed for the purpose in such manner as may seem best to the people of each community.

The planting and cultivation of trees is a matter of very great importance to the people of our State and ought to be encouraged.

"Let us plant a tree by the wayside. Plant it with smiles and with tears. A shade for some weary wanderer. A hope for the coming years."

Trees are going to be needed in our great and prosperous State, and will be even more helpful in the coming years.

Now, therefore, in order that all the people of the state may be prepared and act together in the planting of trees, I do hereby issue this my Proclamation and earnestly ask and recommend that the young and the old unite in observing "Arbor Day" by planting trees, shrubs and flowers around the home, the school house, in the parks, along the high ways, on the farms and ranches, and wherever else they may be made to grow.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State of Texas to be affixed hereto.

## TWO FACTIONS UNITE IN BIG WILL CONTEST

Sister and Common Law Wife of Millionaire Ranchman to Fight Together.

SAN ANGELO, Feb. 14.—The fight over the \$1,200,000 estate left by Ed. Jackson developed a new and somewhat surprising phase today when Mrs. W. L. Aldwell and Mary Luna Jackson, through their attorneys entered into an agreement of their respective interests as to the division of the property and will file a joint contest of the will. Mrs. Aldwell, sister of Jackson recognizes the right of Mary Luna Jackson as common law wife to a half interest in the property. Each recently filed a separate contest, claiming the entire estate. An effort will be

made to probate the will next Wednesday. San Antonio, El Paso, Sonoro and San Angelo lawyers will clash in the legal battle. The Jackson will left the bulk of the estate to the Catholic church of America.

Culberson for Wilson. Washington, February 15—Senator Culberson of Texas, a supporter of Woodrow Wilson today gave out a statement favoring a presidential primary in Texas.

He based his advocacy of such a primary on the fact that it "would strip the bosses of their authority in nominations for this great office.

## Our City Campaign

There is more interest than usual being manifested in the election of Mayor this year, and it is right. Heretofore many people have not given attention to that important office and to the selection of Alder men. The fact that these positions are not good paying jobs, has caused men to not rush for them, but to wait until somebody urged them. Often the people have not known who would be before the voters until the tickets were printed and no candidate was asked to give any sort of an outline of policies.

The government of the city is just as important, as far as it goes, as the government of a State and the Signal believes that men who would have aspirations for office ought to tell the people of the policies for which they stand. There are several questions now of interest to a growing city like Snyder. One of these has recently been suggested which would strike at the life of the town—the suggestion of a desire on the part of some to have the corporation dissolved and abolish the municipality. That is a proposition that should put every citizen to thinking. A very considerable element of the people will consider such a step a vital mistake and a move backward instead of forward. Snyder is gradually but surely coming into prominence and attracting notice abroad and great care should be exercised to avoid a retardation of progress. As the city grows in population and business there will be new problems to be solved, new city adjuncts to be supplied and new expenses to be met.

The Signal is not finding any fault with the manner in which the city council has conducted the business—they have done well, they are good business men and they have done honest work, yet in the selection of Mayor and Aldermen, the

people ought to be thinking of suitable and available men for the places to be filled. Snyder needs men who believe in civic progress along all reasonable lines. At least it would be according to the approved lines of publicity for the city candidates to tell for what they stand.

The Roscoe Times is suspicious that Roosevelt is playing to the hand of Taft.

The withdrawal of Morris Sheppard from the Senatorial race is a disappointment to a long line of friends, but it greatly simplifies the situation unless some other fellow comes in to muddy the waters.

Congressman Sheppard has announced his withdrawal from the race for the United States Senate. Now, if Campbell, Johnson, Ousley and the rest will stay out we will see a pretty race between Randell and Wolters.

Mr. Bryan said at Phoenix the other day that he sees no reason why he should again be a candidate for President. Well, certainly, the rest of us don't know any.

There are indications of a real war between H. Clay Pierce and the standard oil people. In that case, if Pierce doesn't know where to find a lawyer, Mr. Francis may be able to suggest one.

No one but a pessimist will doubt but that we will get rains here this year through the growing season, and with the magnificent season now in the ground we feel like Snyder county was never in a better condition than now.

Jake Wolters hastened to tell the newspaper reporters that he is in the race for Senator to stay, but as developments unfold, he may have another bank coming. It need not surprise anybody, if within thirty days Wolters is out of the race and Ousley in.

The people of Texas who believe in prohibition will certainly not support the very chief of anti-forces for the United States Senate and the big liquor interests will not care to honor a man who cannot account for campaign funds placed in his hands.

Senator Bailey says Woodrow Wilson is not fit to president and if it becomes necessary he will campaign Texas against him. He probably means to do the campaigning before the National Convention meets. Senator Culberson says Wilson is a real democrat and deserves the support of the Democratic party.

## Watch for Political Jugglers

There are some politicians in Texas who would like to set aside the matter of choosing a United States Senator by primary election and leave it up to the legislature and they may manipulate the convention to that end.

There was a time in Texas when a representative was abused if for even good reasons he refused to vote as instructed and some of the very fellows were were sticklers for

obeying instructions are ready to justify a Senator who refuses to obey the platform demand of the National Convention.

It is well enough for the people to know who they send to the State legislature.

## People are Coming to Texas

The flood of people Texasward during the month of January was the heaviest reported for years.
