GOOD RAINS REPORTED

Crop Making Showers in Most of the County. Prospects Grow Brighter.

A third of an inch of rain fell at Snyder Monday night and a half inch Tuesday night. A good rain fell at Fluvanna, Dermott, Arah and other territory north and west and a fine rain fell Tuesday night south and east of Snyder. Deep Creek came down early Wednesday morning filling the primary channel and spreading out over the second table lands showing that heavy rains fell higher up.

Bro. Werner was here Wednesday from Pleasant Hill and reported a fine rain there.

Soem sections would yet welcome a good ground soaker, but in the main, Scurry county is in good fortune as regards moisture and crops are up and growing nicely. A good general rain right now would insure a bumper crop of oats.

After the Galveston tidal wave had killed his two sons and four daughters, Meyer gathered together what remained of his \$30,000 fortune and started a chicken farm at Hickman, Ky. The flood there last month destroyed his chickens and he had but a few odds and ends left.

Therefore he started for Chicago. Crippled train service compelled him to travel by way of Cincinnati and he arrived here today with five cents and the determination to walk the rest of the way.

SCURRY COUNTY DEMOCRATS

Meet in Convention and Instruct for Woodrow Wilson. Favor Preferential Primary Election. Minority Report Rejected.

The democratic county convention met Tuesday in the District Court room for the purpose of expressing the choice of Scurry county democrats for presidential nomination and to elect delegates to the state presidential convention.

The convention was called to order by Chairman Barnes of the county executive committee and Horace Holley of Ira was elected secretary. E. B. Barnes was elected chairman of the meeting.

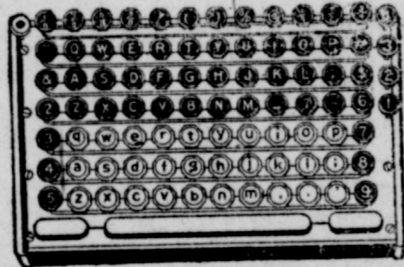

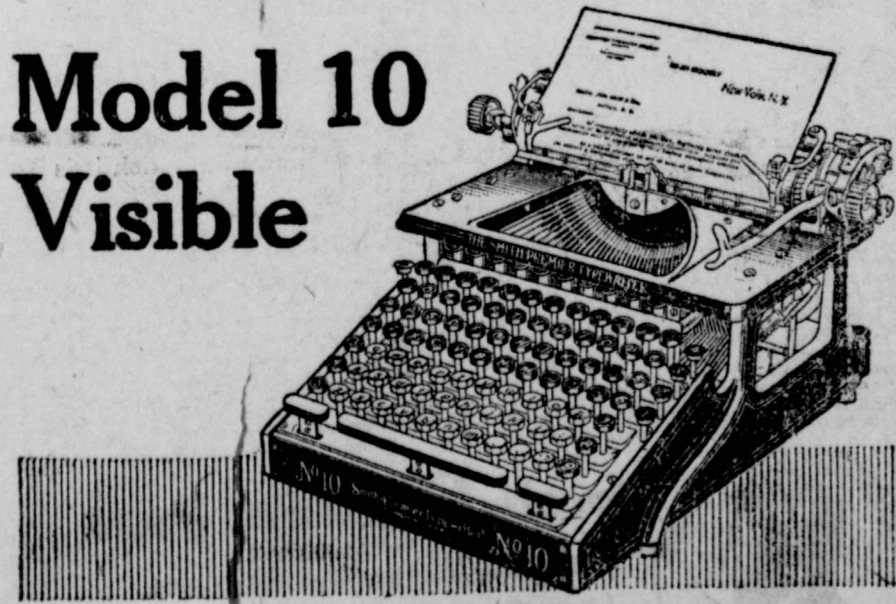

Ladies and Gentlemen: I have the honor and privilege of performing a duty this evening that no other living man has ever had. Gov. Colquitt, if our reception and treatment are not up to the standard, you have received elsewhere, you can account for it in the fact that we are amateurs at the business. Sir, you are the 24th chief executive of the state, yet you are the first one to visit this fair little city.

We have met tonight on this occasion, not as Democrats, or Republicans, not as prohibitionists or anti-prohibitionists, but as sovereign citizens to pay tribute to the chief executive of this great empire state—Texas.

The Chief executive of a state or

nation shapes the policies of that state or nation. A man's views on any fundamental question will be his monuments. Our state is one of only a very few which has ever tolerated the whipping of convicts. Now our Governor has abolished this act of cruelty. The pardoning act. If we have a man or woman whom we would want pardoned. We would freely justify the chief executive in exercising this right.

Democrats Instruct for Nomination of Woodrow Wilson for President.

Last Saturday was the day of presidential primary conventions throughout the state and right here it may be said that Woodrow Wilson was overwhelmingly endorsed for the democratic nomination for president of the United States.

Mexico Has Two Presidents.

El Paso, Texas, May 4.—The Mexican revolutionists are now no longer without a head to lead them on to victory. In the hope of winning the recognition of the United States, the rebel forces today established General Emilio Vasquez Gomez as provisional president of Mexico.

The present capital is the city of Jaurez. Whether there will be any resultant complications as a result of Gomez coming from Texas to Mexico is a question, which is as yet unsettled.

United States officials have been watching Gen. Gomez for several months at San Antonio, declaring that he would be arrested at once if he attempted to go to Mexico, but he slipped over today unmolested. Last night after retiring in El Paso, he was detained by the police, but the United States secret service men said that there was no charge against him and he was released. He spent the night in a cheap boarding house and slipped over to Jaurez this morning unmolested.

Gen. Gomez assumed the duties of the office of the president of Mexico at noon today and established himself in the Jaurez custom house, where a year ago May 10, 1911, Francisco I. Madero, present president of Mexico, set up his provisional capital from which he conducted his negotiations that led later to the resignation of Gen. Porfirio Diaz as president of Mexico.

Met at International Bridge. Gen. Gomez was met at the International bridge by a delegation of rebel officials and escorted to the custom house, where it was given out that he was held a prisoner pending the receipt of information from Gen. Orozco.

Monday was the big day for Snyder and other county seat towns, where the First Monday crowds do congregate. It was the day for the interchange of ideas and the exhibition of stock. There were several good horses shown here and it is easily seen that the interest in good stock is increasing and there is no country better suited than Scurry county for the raising of stock.

State Chairman, Sheb Williams, blames the prohibitionists with Harmon's defeat in Texas. Uncle Sheb has been bloated up with self esteem ever since he was named as state chairman and has never yet uttered a sentiment that has any weight with conservative thinking men.

O. M. Renfro of Venus, Texas is here on a visit to his father in law, T. J. Broxson. Mr. Renfro is in poor health and has come out to breathe the healthful ozone of west Texas and regain his health.

FLOOD BATTLE ALMOST HOPELESS

DWELLERS IN VALLEYS OF CENTRAL AND SOUTH LOUISIANA WARNED.

THE LEVEES GROW WEAKER

Government Engineers Practically Admit That There Is Slight Hope of Holding the Lines.

NEW ORLEANS, May 5.—A half dozen hours of sunshine in the lower Mississippi valley today gave some little relief from the tense anxiety of the past few days. Threatening clouds gathered at intervals throughout the day but the flood gates overhead held back the drenching rains that for a month have been adding to the already enormous volume of menacing flood waters piled high against the levees.

It was just a breathing spell, however, and the new hopes kindled today may be dashed tomorrow. The engineers who yesterday were almost hopeless, today said the prospect of saving the remaining levees were favorable. But the danger is not passed.

The weather bureau has scheduled still another foot rise in the river above present record—smashing stages which obtain from the Red river south. The crest with its accompanying increased danger of destructive crevasses, is not expected to pass Baton Rouge and points south of there for another week yet.

Will the big Morganza dike holding back a wall of water forty feet high hold? Will the threatened levees at Baton Rouge, at Grand Bay, at La Barre, Scott's Point and above and below New Orleans be impregnable?

The engineers say "they hope so" but no guarantees are given nor can guarantees be given in the face of the terrifying force of the Mississippi flood waters. While the engineers are battling and hoping against the greatest odds they have ever confronted in the flood history of the lower river, warnings are being sent broad cast to the people in the fertile valleys on both sides of the big stream to get their cattle to high ground and prepare themselves for a hasty exit.

The board of Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church are inclined to raise the ban of the church from over such worldly amusements as dancing, card playing and attending theatres and horse races. It looks like an admission that the hand of the world is stronger than that of the church.

Monday's primary returns increase Wilson's lead in Texas, yet Rice Maxey thinks Harmon will win out in the National convention. He is banking on the big influences that he expects to control the convention.

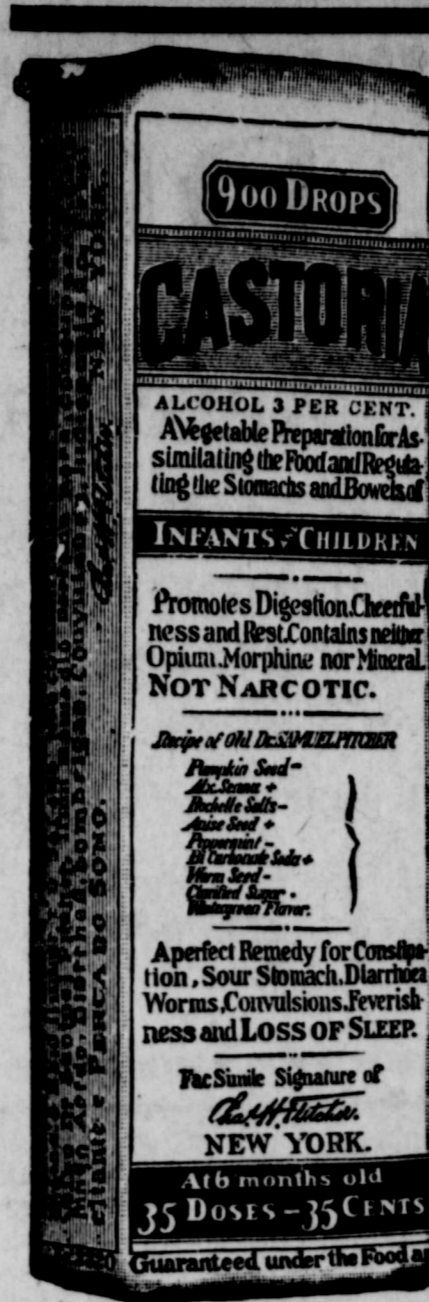

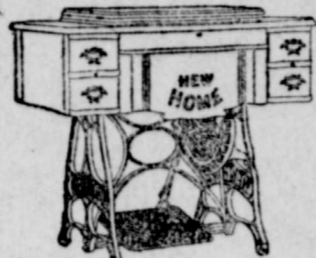

Two of Titanic Victims.

Much has been written of the tragic ending of the life of John Jacob Astor, who went down with the Titanic after seeing his young wife safe on a life boat. Of course it is sad to think of the fate of that noted character Astor is the man who some time ago divorced a wife who had gone with him for years and when she had begun to fade, he chose Adeleine Force a more comely and younger woman upon whom to lavish his attention and wealth. His marriage to Miss Force was considered so disgraceful that no respectable minister would consent to perform the ceremony.

On the same ship were Isador Straus and his faithful wife who had spent years together doing good to humanity with their vast wealth. The faithful wife refused to be separated from her husband. She said they had come all the way together and she would remain true to him in death.

The following beautiful tribute to this good old couple is clipped from the Houston Chronicle:

Isador Straus.

A friend of the friendless, a helper of the poor, a minister to those who were in need, a benevolent servant to the very lowliest and humblest and most helpless of God's children, a lover of his fellow man, one who recognized his obligations to society and unselfishly and with prodigal generosity performed them was lost to the city which he honored by his citizenship and to the world which was better for his having lived in it, when the freezing waters of the northern sea received all that was mortal of Isador Straus.

The friend of the poor children of the tenements, the man who used his wealth as a trust for the benefit of those who lived in hopeless poverty, who gave of it lavishly that little children might by pure food be saved from early death, went to his watery grave mourned by countless thousands.

He found no pleasure in ostentatious and vulgar display of wealth. He had acquired it honestly, and administered it nobly. Sensuous indulgence and bacchanalian revel had no charm for him. He lived as became a gentleman, and out of his abundance he helped those who most needed help.

When some with murderous avarice took from the poor dwellers in the tenements their hard earned pennies for poisoned milk, Isador Straus drove out the nefarious traffickers in the lives of children and gave the starving little ones milk which scientific skill, paid for by him, had made pure, and day by day, month by month, year by year, carried on the good work.

However rich in other benefactions his life may have been, that he provided the starving, crying children of the tenements will be longest remembered.

All men will be ready to believe that in so good a work he must have had the encouragement and sympathetic aid of the noble woman who was his wife, who, when she was bidden to enter the boat waiting to save her, turned to her husband and, placing her arms around his neck, said: "I will not go. We have lived too long together to be separated now." Hers was a love that was defiant of and out lived death, and she chose rather to die with than to leave the noble man without whom, in her sight, life was not worth living.

Isador Straus belonged to that chosen, historic race which for four thousand years has furnished the world great men and heroes in every field of human endeavor. He doubtless held to the teachings of his fathers, and kept the faith handed down to him from generations back in misty antiquity, but he lived in accordance with the teachings of that greatest of all Jews, the crowning glory and consummate flower of David's royal line, and in that day when all men shall stand before the bar of the unerring Judge and when they will be judged not by the splendor of their deeds, but by how they dealt with their fellow man, most fit will it be for Isador Straus to receive the plaudit: "Inas much as ye have done it to one even of the least of these ye have one it unto me."
