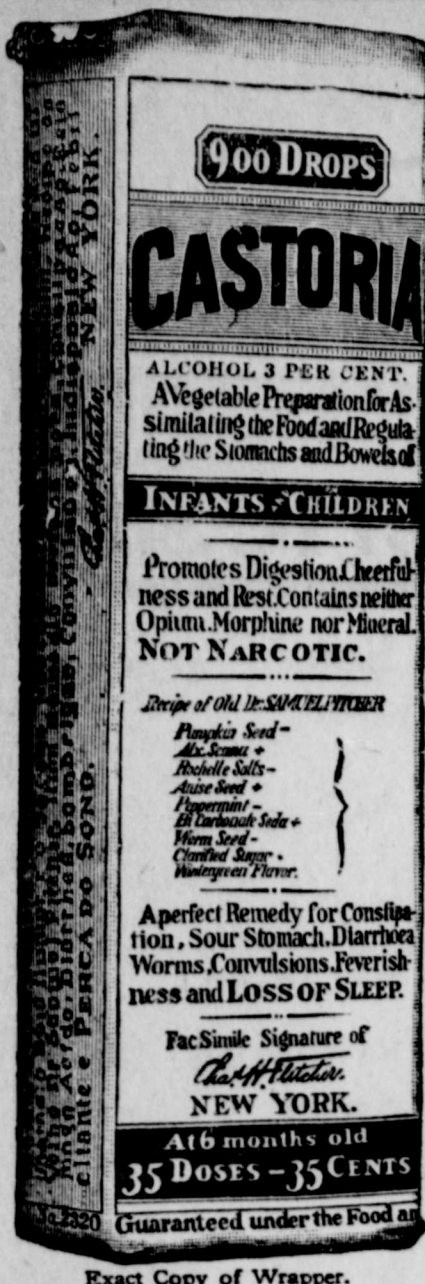

### Jack Rabbits and Patriotism

Farmers from all over the Western Country report a great damage to crops by Jack Rabbits.

It looks like the finest opportunity in the world for people to have plenty of sport. Men go for the time to come to shoot quail during the open hunting season and parties are made up to get out and kill the birds. It is not admitted that this is done to get the birds to eat, but the fun of hunting is the supposed incentive.

Now what could be more exciting than to start a Jack Rabbit on the run and shoot at him. That sort of sport would be doing some good.

There has been a suggestion that the authorities might offer a bounty. That is like a man finding an article of value and keeping the fact a secret until a reward is offered.

People who are troubled with rabbits ought to encourage rabbit killing from the double standpoint of fun and profit.

Brown county offered a bounty of five cents for rabbit scalps and within a short time there had been 23,000 of the pests killed. The boys got very busy as soon as they saw a nickel init, but there is no record of their doing anything from a patriotic motive.

The boys drew on the treasury so heavily that the Commissioners had to withdraw their offer and now the rabbits will have a picnic.

It ought to be established as an American principle that the government will not do for the citizen the common place services that they can easily do for himself.

### Direct Mail Line Needed

J. G. Carreker was here Saturday from Dunn and was wondering why a mail rout cannot be established from Snyder, to Dunn, thence to Ira and Sharon and back to Snyder.

By that means the people of the South part of the county would get the Snyder Signal never later than Saturday, as our mail facilities are now, the Signal leaves Snyder Friday evening, goes to Roscoe and Colorado and then comes back on a mail back to Dunn and Ira, twelve and fourteen miles from the starting point.

This inconvenience effects not only the Signal but all other mail matter. Mr. Carreker says he can send a letter to Ft. Worth or Dallas and get response quicker than from Snyder. The mail service from Ft. Worth to Sweetwater is convenient—coming in just right to connect with the Santa Fe so that mail leaving Ft. Worth might reach Snyder at 8:45 in the morning and with a mail line out of Snyder the Ft. Worth papers and other mail could be delivered to Dunn and Ira by 2 or 3 o'clock.

This is a matter of so much importance to Snyder and Scurry county that our people would do well to take it up with the department and try to get a more satisfactory mail system.

### Wilson Selects His Manager

Seagirt, N. J. July 12—Governor Wilson has made up his mind, he says as to whom he will select for National Chairman, but will make no announcement of his choice except to the committee.

He put the final touches today on the message which Robert S. Hudspeth will carry for him to the Democratic National Committee in Chicago next Monday.

The suggestions were discussed with him by Judge Hudspeth, Wm. McCombs, Edward E. Grosscup, New Jersey State Chairman; Col. Robt. Ewing, National Committeeman from Louisiana and other leaders.

Col. Ewing said that he had stopped on his way to Chicago merely to shake hands with the nominee.

He added that they had discussed the National Chairmanship and that he had told Gov. Wilson that he favored William F. McCombs for the place.

"Among the committeemen I have talked with—and I have talked with more than half of them," said Col. Ewing: "I find no opposition to Mr. McCombs."

Col. Ewing said that he believed that it would be advisable to appoint a small committee to direct the details of the fight, if necessary he said, this committee might be selected outside the ranks of the National Committee.

Constable Lillius yesterday arrested one Ed. Nichols, colored on a charge sworn out by a colored woman who claims that Ed committed an aggravated assault upon her a few nights ago.

The attack, it is alleged was committed near the Christian church and the colored woman's face shows the result of some Jack Johnson blows. —Abilene Reporter.

### Cotton Conference at Atlanta

Atlanta, July 12—Representatives of the Governors and Commissioners of Agriculture of several states met here today at the call of Gov. Brown to discuss the cotton situation with special reference to marketing. It is proposed to decide upon a course by which the planters can place their cotton to better financial advantage, and also to do away with waste.

The meeting was suggested by Geo. Dole Wadley of Macon, head of the Southern Cotton Corporation.

## The Correct Election Ticket.

The Attorney General's office has ruled that the names of the democratic electors must not be printed on the primary election tickets. The law is plain that nothing shall be printed on the ticket except the names of the candidates to be voted for and the names of the offices and anything else will vitiate the ticket.

It is held with reason that the naming of electors by the State convention puts them beyond the jurisdiction of the primaries.

There has been a conflict of opinion on the point and some of the tickets have been sent out, bearing the names of the electors. Now it is held that if any of these tickets are used they will be illegal and are to be thrown out.

The authorities should get busy and rectify their blunder. They should call in or have destroyed all the illegal tickets and supply the election officers with correct ballots.

The error was discovered in ample time to avoid trouble and it should be done.

It is stated that Lorimer is the first man ever expelled from the United States Senate for alleged corruption. The compromising assertion several times uttered that Lorimer did no worse than many another may be shamefully true, but it is not a valid reason why he should have been left alone to enjoy his tainted honors.

## LORIMER LOSES SENATE SEAT.

By Vote of Fifty-Five to Twenty Eight Illinois Senator Removed Saturday.

Washington, July 13—United States Senator William Lorimer of Illinois was unseated by the Senate Saturday afternoon at twenty minutes past one o'clock. The vote which unseated the Illinois Senator was fifty five to twenty eight.

At the conclusion of the roll call, and when it became known that one of their number should go from the body, some of the Senators were deeply moved and later burst into tears.

Lorimer walked from the Senate chamber to the coat room, Senator Smoot walking beside him, with his arm about Lorimer's shoulder.

Hoped to Change Votes by Delay: A well defined belief gained some headway in the Senate in the morning session Saturday that the friends of Lorimer were working to delay the vote on his case in the hope of changing several wavering votes to the Lorimer column.

The anti-Lorimer forces practically conceded that Lorimer's appeal of Friday had changed the attitude of two Senators heretofore against him.

Lorimer speaking Saturday declared of the alleged conspirators against him:

If all the people knew the full story they would drive that band of conspirators out of the country and they will know if God spares me—they will know it from one end of the land to the other."

Senator Bailey voted for Lorimer, but Senator Culberson was paired against the Illinois Senator.

There was discomfort throughout most of the country except in the northwest, New England and middle Atlantic States where somewhat cooler weather prevailed.

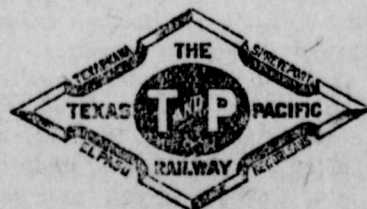

He is considered a peaceable citizen. Thompson is known by several people here. There are rumors as to the cause of the trouble and the facts will likely be developed soon.

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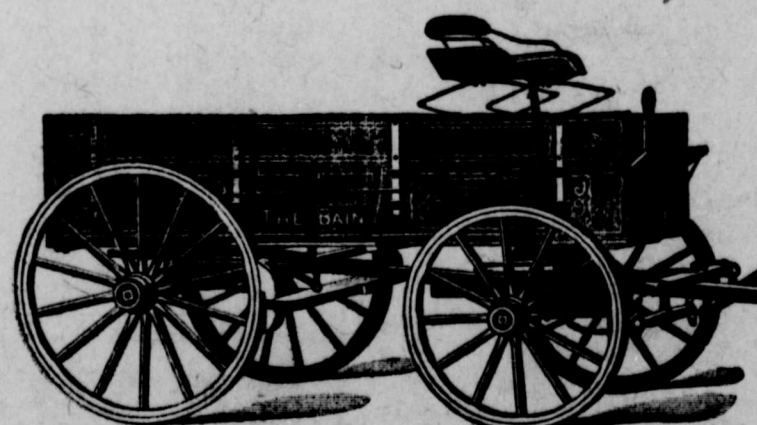

MAY DEPOSE THEIR CHIEF

Rebel Army Scattered Along the Mexican Northwestern Railroad Toward Sonora.

EL PASO, Texas.—Evidence in the hands of the Mexican Government of officials here tend to show that Emilio Vasquez Gomez will soon be asked to resume the provisional presidency and Gen. Orozco who repudiated Gomez will be deposed and succeeded by Gen. Daza de la Fuente.

Rebels who have for their object the consummation of the new revolution are holding daily sessions here at Douglas, Arizona.

Gomez is in San Antonio, while Gen. Fuentes has gone to Baltimore for medical treatment.

There will probably be a meeting between them at San Antonio within a few days.

That Orozco's days at the head of the present revolution are numbered is indicated by developments at Juarez during the last few days.

The entire rebel force has been dispatched to points along the Mexican Northwestern railroad, leaving only a garrison of 15 men at Juarez.

The furniture in the home of Col. Orozco, Sr. where the rebel chief has been stopping, is packed for moving.

It is rumored that Gen. Orozco will soon join his family in California.

LATER—Gomez has declined the leadership.

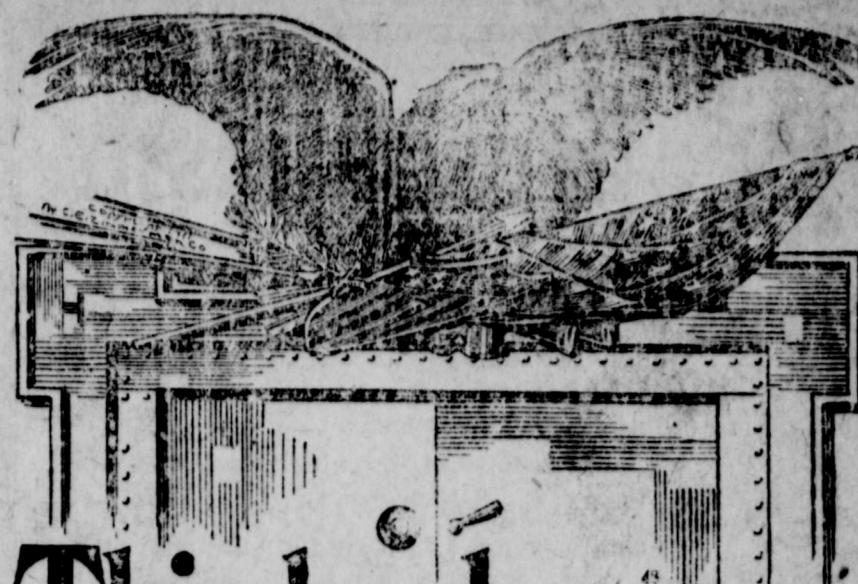

### THE EIGHT HOUR LAW.

Employer Cannot Require Employee to Work Longer, But Latter Can do it of His Own Volition.

AUSTIN, July 11—Attorney General Lightfoot today in an opinion to Ed. H. McCuiston, mayor of Paris construes the eight hour law. The attorney general does not attempt to pass upon the constitutionality of the act, but holds that for any employer to require an employee to work over eight hours per day on any city work would be a violation of the law, but if such employee voluntarily desires to do such work he may do so without being in violation of the statute.

The full text of the opinion, which is rather important as it affects labor generally over the State is as follows.

"Austin, Texas, July 10—Hon. Ed. H. McCuiston, Mayor, Paris, Texas—My Dear Sir: We have under consideration your letter of June 15, asking for a construction of the eight hour law passed by the thirty-second legislature, as same applies to employees of your city in its fire and water departments and trash haulers. Answer has been delayed somewhat because of the great difficulty in the conclusion as to the scope of the act.

The language of the act is not as specific as it might have been and many difficulties are encountered in

applying its provisions to the various classes of employees in the state, county and city governments.

"I will not discuss the constitutionality of the law as it has always been the uniform policy of this department not to pass upon the constitutionality of acts passed by the legislature except where the act is void upon its face, but in all cases where a construction can be given it which comports with the constitution such course has been followed.

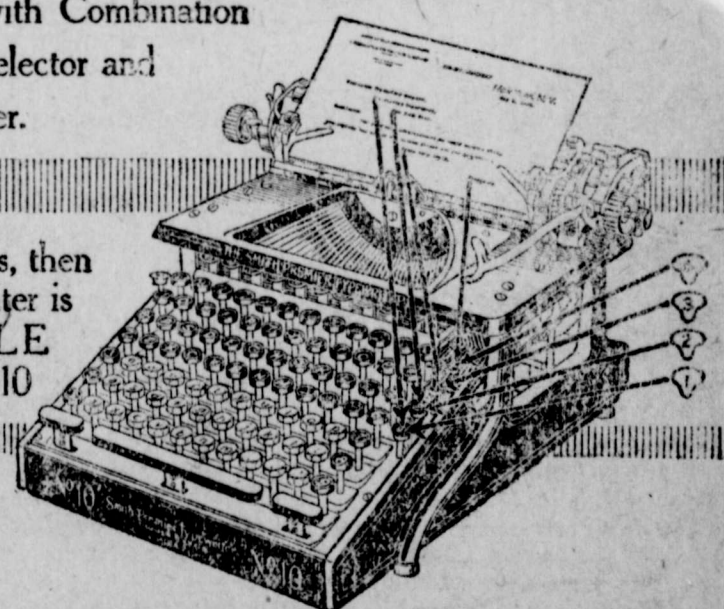

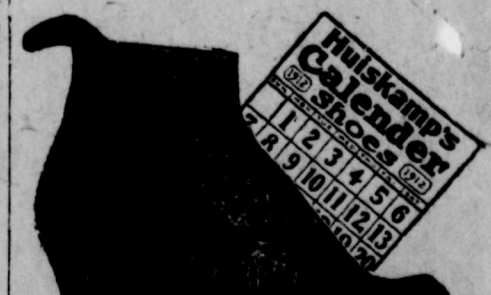
