OUR QUARREL WITH BRITONS

Indications of Trouble Sent out On day and Denied the Next

The following message was sent out from London on Monday:

London, Sept. 2-It is officially announced that the British Government will make a formal demand up on the United States Government for Arbitration of its claim that the Panama Canal Toll Act as passed recently by the United States Congress violates the Hay Pauncefote

Nothing definitely is known here beyond the brief official announcement that the formal demand will be made, but it is believed that instructions are already enroute to the British Embassy at Washington concerning the situation.

The British demand will be made under the arbitration convention of 1908. Great Brittain's contention will be that the question at issue does not affect the vital interests, independence and honor of the United States, and that, therefore it is clearly within the scope of the 1908 convention, since the matter to be arbitrated is not an act of Congress, but an interpretation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

On the following day, a flat denial was sent out ofthe Monday story. It is charged that news agencies coined the story.

London, Sept. 3-A complete disavowal is given this morning by the British foreign office of the so-called official announcement that the British Government will formally demand arbitration on the Panama canal tolls question.

"The lines of action which lie before the British government are now being considered and any announcement of this kind is premature."

This is the full text of the foreign office this morning in reply to requests for details as to the reported demand for arbitration.



TROUBLESOME WEEDS.

Millers Do Not Care to Handle Wheat that Contains Weed Seeds-

It is practically impossible to elimnate bind-weed from the soil once it has become established. It gets its start from weed seeds introduced in grains of various kinds. These vines twine around and over whatever may be within their reach, and in the case of plants usually smother them out. SEED BED FOR WHEAT.

Wheat Should Have a Firm, Well-Compacted Soil—Early Plowing Frequent Cultivation.

By Prof. W. M. Jardine, Agronomist Kansas State Agricultural College.

[National Crop Improvement Service.] Experience has taught us that an ideal seed-bed is a firm, well-compact-

A firm seed-bed is absolutely necessary if the subsoil water is to be utilized by the young wheat plant. On loose, poorly packed soil there is such poor connection between the soil particles that moisture cannot be raised by capillary attraction from the subsoil. Under this condition the soil may be well supplied with subsoil moisture and the wheat fail to germinate because of the loose condition of the soil, which prevents the rise

Concerving Moleture. A firm seed-bed is only one of a

number of benefits that result from the early preparation of the soil. Moisture is conserved and plant-food is made available in this way. The conservation of moisture results from the killing of the weeds that sap the ground of water. The cultivation of the soil after packing rains forms an earth mulch which prevents the loss of moisture by evaporation.

TRYING NEW VARIETIES.

[National Crop Improvement Service.]
Do not waste your time in sowing new varieties (except on a small tract as an experiment), unless your state experiment station recommends them. You cannot afford to take the chances. Let the state experiment station do the testing of new varieties, and learn the results from them.

Fly Pests in Central Texas.

The people in North and Central Texas, embracing a scope of about twenty counties have been plagued this summer with a scourge of flies. Those people have grown so proud of their rich black lands that they had begun to feel that they had the edges on Egypt, and like old Pharoah, they were inclined to scorn the residents of other regions, and it was probably a very appropriate thing to visit them with fles. Horses and cattle in some localities have been worried to death by the pests. The State department sent an entomologist to North Texas to see what could be done to relieve the situation. He found millions of larvae and maggets in the straw stacks and in accumulated trash and then went away to think of some sort of a remedy. Meantime the farmers are using such antidotes as they could get and by the time the expert gets ready to apply his dope the chances are that the plague will be over. Those people ought to come to West Texas anyhow where the people have no flies on them.



Here they not only hatch their young, but they bring on plagues of mites and blue bugs and otherwise lay the foundation for diseases. They pick at the fruit, eat up the young garden truck and it is admitted that they make the pestiferous blue bug that is such a stubborn pest to chicken raisers and if the country can get rid of them it should be done. The bulletin referred to, No. 383

Late Sowing as a Means of Combating This Pest.

[National Crop Improvement Service.] Nothing can be done if a field once becomes badly infested with the fly, though heavy fertilization or manuring will greatly assist the plants to resist the attack. It is best, there-

Any farmer may establish a safe date of sowing for his locality by noting the time of seeding and the degree of infestation for a few years, or by writing to his state experiment station, or he may ask his state entomologist for this information.

SEED WHEAT VITALITY.

Millions of Dollars Lost Annually From Sowing Wheat of Unknown Vitality.

By L. M. Smith, President Seed Trade Reporting Bureau.

[National Crop Improvement Service.] There are millions of dollars lost annually from sowing wheat of unknown vitality.

Scientists throughout the country, both state and national, have spent a great deal of time and money in the introduction and breeding of cereals suitable to the various climates of the United States. However, the underlying factor in crop production—that of vitality-has been sadly neglected. While a high vitality of seed grain is desirable, yet, it is not always obtainable, and the only way to counteract the low vitality, and obtain a maximum outturn, is by increasing the by the people to take care of the amount of seed sown according to its disability to grow.

How Grain is Damaged. There are many factors which influence and destroy vitality. Probably the most common are immaturity,

heat or weather damage. It is also a well known fact that it these defects; consequently few lots of seed, green when tested for germination, will grow 100 per cent. If a certain lot of wheat be sown under ordinary conditions which tests only 50 per cent, it means only 50 per cent of a crop can possibly be produced. If this same wheat is tested before sowing and found to grow only 50 per cent, then twice as much seed should be sown, and a maximum out-


