One or two seemed to think the Signal was not "fighting these concerns like it should." The Sgnal acknowledges for the past few months that it has had little to say about the mall order houses, and we trust that those who are guilty will be equally as frank and acknowledge that they have spent very little with the Signal, either in advertising or job printing. If the Signal is expected to fight foreign mall order concerns, it should be supplied with the sinews of war by those most interested, and not be forced to bear the burden alone. "But," says one, "times are too hard, and money is so scarce to do much advertising.' Well, let's see: <br> It is an acknowledged fact that the mail order business is growing in Scurry county. It is almost double that of last year, we are told. Why? Simply because the mail order houses ' are good rustlers and have flooded the country with advertising matter telling of the wonderful bargains they have to sell. Not a single order would they have received from this community, if they had not spent some money in printer's ink, and persuaded the people to buy. The home merchant can do the same if he will go at it in a systematic way. The majority of our people prefer to buy from the home merchant, and would do so, if the home merchant would show them he wanted their trade, by publicly and privately soliciting it. <br> There are some men doing business, or more correctly speaking their store building is opened regularly every morning for business they don't get that haven't spent a dollar in advertising for the past two years. Such men are usually the loudest knockers. <br> There are others who will put an ad in the paper now and then and expect it to create a panic among the people in their mad rush to get Into his place of business. About the only panic it causes is in the composing room among the printers, who are so afraid that the order will be countermanded before they get the ad set up, they work themselves into a state of mind we call the "figits <br> The Signal, not many months ago turned down yearly contracts at a good price from two mai! order concerns. It did this for the benefit of the town and the home merchants. It is to our interest and to that of every other eitizen to.buy as much as possible everything we eat | and wear from our home merchants -our friends and nelghbors. We have many times in the past tried to impress this fact upon the minds of our readers and get them to throw the mall order advertising in the fire and keep their money at home. <br> As stated above the very fact that mail order business prospers, even in as hard a year as at present, is proof positive that advertising pays at all times. Some seem to think that unless they can take a blg space in the paper that it wont pay them. Experienced advertisers say that it is best to take a small space regularly, and see that it contains fresh trade news each week. Such an ad is worth twenty times as much as a spasmodic splurge now and then of a big space. <br> The Signal is not affected with a case of "grouch," it simply wants the record kept straight. It is very thankful to those who have stood by us in a business way. We believe they received their money's worth consideration of these advertisers we expect to continue to advocate the patronizing of home industries.
