Kennedy has breed champion

HOUSTON — Muleshoe High School sophomore Ky Kennedy had the champion Main Anjou Feb. 28 at the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo.

The 15-year-old son of Muleshoe veterinarian Steve Kennedy earned breed champion with a 1,246-pound middleweight steer.

Kennedy's steer was one of 16 steers in the championship drive in what organizers call the biggest livestock show in the country.

The steer brought \$42,000 in the sale.

Brice Foster of Lazbuddie had the reserve champion Main Anjou after winning the lightweight class and Josh Tooley of Maple had the heavyweight champion.

Kennedy's steer was bred by Tommy and Angie Lewis of Morton.

The Journal will be doing a more detailed story about how local competitors fared at state livestock shows in the future.



Osbend death ruled homicide

Autopsy reveals County woman

died of blunt trauma

Ella Mae Osbend's death has been officially ruled a homicide, based on an autopsy report released last week.

Osbend died as a result of "blunt trauma and dehydration" according to an autopsy report from the Forensic Pathologists Associates of Lubbock.

Bailey County criminal investigator Benny Clifton said Monday the 54-year-old mentally-handicapped woman suffered "severe head injuries and multiple rib fractures and other related injures."

Clifton said he could not be more specific on the contents of the report until the case goes to trial.

Osbend was found dead Jan. 18 by county deputies in her home about a mile west of Muleshoe.

Andrew Lee Shaw, 42, was arrested five days later and in-

dicated by a grand jury last month on one count of manslaughter and two counts of injury to a disabled person.

He has been in custody in the county jail on \$50,000 bail since his arrest Jan. 23.

Shaw was the live-in caregiver for Osbend and her 49-year-old brother Bobby D. Raybon, who is also mentally handicapped.

Raybon, who was found in "extremely critical condition," was hospitalized with hypothermia, dehydration and malnourishment. He was later released.

Clifton said the autopsy concluded that Osbend's injuries were systematic and occurred over a period of time.

Clifton would not comment on whether fists or a weapon was used to inflict the injuries. He did say that no weapon that could be used as evidence was recovered at the scene.

Shaw is scheduled to appear in court March 21.

fourth in the district.

"She matured quite a bit over the season when she realized that the way she went was the way the team went," Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey said. "She really took over as a leader on the floor and in the locker room."

Wilhite was a force at times during the district season, averaging 10.4 points and 6.8 rebounds a game while shooting 50 percent from the field. The 5-10 post scored a seasonhigh 32 points at Perryton.

Lady Mules set 4 records at Morton

MORTON—Muleshoe had a record-breaking day Saturday at Last Frontier Days Relays.

The Lady Mules set four meet records en route to the team title. Muleshoe nearly lapped the eight-team field with 200 points. Farwell was second with 128 points and Denver City third with 96.

Muleshoe junior Kendra Benham set records in the 100 meters and the shot put and also ran a leg on the Lady Mules' record-setting 400meter relay team.

Benham ran the 100 meters in 13.05 seconds and tossed the shot put 33 feet and four and one-quarter inches.

Brandi Harrison, Megan Harland and JoBeth Gilleland joined Benham to set a new mark in the 400 relay with a time of 54.46 seconds.

Freshman Stacy Locker set the fourth record by winning the 800 meters in 2:34.

Gilleland and Cari Faver were also double winners for Lady Mules.

Gilleland won the 300-meter hurdles (51.72) and the triple jump (32-2) while Faver won the 1600 (5:50) and 3200 meters (12:56).

Muleshoe switched to the Frontier Relays late in the week after learning that Littlefield was the only girls team that was coming to the Muleshoe Invitational.

Toast to Texas celebrates 152 years of independence

With a cup of pure Texas water, DeShazo fourth graders saluted 152 years of Texas independence.

More than 130 fourth graders crammed into the courtroom of the Bailey County Courthouse for the Toast to Texas, a yearly event sponsored statewide by Texas Highways Magazines.

The Muleshoe Jennyslippers sponsor the event locally. Along with the toast, they also present a special show each year to fourth grade students from DeShazo Elementary.

This year's show focused on state and local law enforcement. Muleshoe Acting Police Chief Jay Livingston, Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks, and Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper L.T. Kirk each introduced themselves to the children. They each gave brief messages about their role in local law enforcement.

Texas Ranger Dusty McCord told the children about the role of the Texas Rangers in helping the Republic of Texas gained its independence from Mexico in 1845.

He also told them about the role the Rangers play in Texas today.

When the presentation was over, McCord answered questions from the kids. Most kids were curious to know if McCord had ever used a gun as he enforced Texas law.

District Clerk Nelda Merriot has spearheaded the local Toast to Texas for the past several years.

Each year, Merriot organizes a program to turn the Toast to Texas into a learning experience. Past programs have focused on Bailey County history, armed services, and the election process.

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
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Springtime in the Rockies

Littlefield sprints to Relay title

Boasting its usual strength in the sprint events, Littlefield won the Muleshoe Relays Saturday at Benny Douglass Stadium.

Littlefield captured the 100 and 200 meters, both hurdles and the sprint relay to edge Olton and Muleshoe.

The Wildcats finished with 107 points, Olton was second with 104 points and Muleshoe third with 103.

Muleshoe won just one event, but finished second in five others.

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
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
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Hill hopes nightmare wakes up Mules

Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on unuary 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office...or you may draft a similar form.

property by April 15th.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income — such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- → You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- → You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- → You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1996. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1997.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 1997 renditions is Tuesday, April 15. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing, you can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 15 deadline.

Johnson encourages the students to look hard at their motives for taking leadership


"I can teach students all kinds of things about first impressions, speaking effectively, and making good decisions," Johnson said "But they are the ones who have to decide what kind of person they will become.



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

> Under the CRP the government entered into 10-year contracts with landowners to remove highly erodible cropland from production in return for an annual rental payment. "Other environmental, supply management and income support objectives were also included," Dr. Jackie Smith, a professor from Lubbock.

> Under the new policy, each parcel of land deemed eligible for CRP will receive a bid cap, or maximum rental payment to the landowner, based on its environmental and production characteristics, Amosson explained.

> Some 36.4 million acres of U.S. farmland were enrolled in the program during the first 12 sign-ups from 1986 through 1993. Texas enrolled 4.1 million acres, more than any other state and 11.4 percent of the national total.

"The CRP enrollment in Texas was concentrated in the western part of the Panhandle and South Plains," Smith noted. He said 25 of the 31 Texas counties with more than 50,000 acres in CRP are in that region. "Just those 25 counties account for over 2.2 million acres of CRP, or almost 55 per-




