GIVES GOOD RESULTS

Self-Explanatory Letter to Commer cial Secretary, Shows the Great Advantage

Palestine, Texas

I have been given permission to give out for publicity after January 1st, any results of club work the past season. From our reports, as I have intimated before, Earl and Oran Davis of Palestine have made the two best records, and Sterling C. Wood of Bess May, third. According to Earl Davis' report his corn was planted on three and one half foot rows on deep alluvial soil, about three feet deep and eighteen inches apart in the drill. Yield one hundred twenty two and one half bushels. Yield on similar nearby cultivated under ordinary methods, fifty bushels. Cost of growing one acre, \$11.50. Value \$91..87. Total gain \$87.50.

Oran Davis' corn was planted on similar land, rows same distance apart and corn same distance in drill. Yield 116 2-3 bushels. Total cost \$11.50. Value \$87.50. Gain \$76.00.

The third best record was made by Sterling Wood. Distance apart of rows five feet. Distance apart of corn in drill eight inches. Planted on creek bottom sandy loam. Yield 111 bushels. Total cost \$38.00. Value \$111.00. Gain \$73.00. Mr. Wood used 700 pounds of cotton seed meal as fertilizer.

There were other good records made but all were under one hundred bushels. I have sent out statements to the press in regard to the above. I suggest that you give as much publicity as possible to Anderson County's record. Any way I can be of any assistance to you I will be glad to do so.


