

NECESSITY FOR ADEQUATE PAY FOR OFFICERS

The peace and dignity of the state cannot be well preserved and protected without an active and adequately paid constabulary. While it is doubtless true that the fee system in Texas has opened the way ficers have taken advantage of the teed. opportunity, it has been asserted that any sheriff who properly polices his county is often forced to pay heavy expenses out of his private means. The welfare of the country calls for wide awake peace officers, but there are few men who are willing to pay their own expenses in running down criminals. In shaping the anti-fee law the legislature should be careful to guard against weakening the means to that of the freedom loving spirit for enforcement of law. Certainly an officer should not be permitted to charge full milage each for serving a dozen processes on one and the same merely the gleaming tide of tourist trip, but abuses like that may be easily avoided.

Where milage is allowed, it would be easy to require a sheriff to make affidavit to the miles actually traveled. Abuses of the fee system in other offices could be easily hedged against so that officers would get pay for work actually performed. In that way the office would pay according to amount of work done, while on a salary basis some officers are apt to receive too much and others not enough.


