SCARLET FEVER.

Its Prevention, Restriction and Suppression.

Scarlet fever is some times called scarletina, scarlet rash, etc., is a dangerous, contagious and infectious disease of more importance in our State be cause of a higher death rate than yellow fever, cholera or small (scarletina, etc.) were used to designate mild attacks of the former, and some physicians, who were not willing to believe that a disease so malignant at times could be so mild at other times, persisted in believing that they were separate and distinct diseases. We now know them to be one and the same disease. A malignant case is not infrequently developed from a milder one. The mild, walk ing cases are sometimes a prolific source of spreading the infection, thereby increasing the mortality in spite of efforts of the health officers. During the prevalence of the disease in any community frequent inspections of schools should be made by the health officer. Suspected cases, especially when scarlet fever is prss. ent in the neighborhood. should be promptly isolated until it is determined by the physician whether the disease is scarlet fever or not. The public and not the individual is entitled to the benefit of doubt. One attack usually renders one immune to subsequent infection.

A Disase of Childhood.

Infants under one year of age rare ly have the disease, and under three months of age it seldom occurs. Thus it often happens that other children in a family may have scarlet fever and the infant escapes it. It is almost wholly a disease of childhood, and the person who escapes it until adult life is not likely to become infected with i tat all-there are occasional exceptions.

Cause of the Disease.

The cause of scarlet fever has not yet been discovered, but we have good erason to believe that it is due to a specific germ. Therefore, every case of the disease is dependent upon a pre-existing case, although the latter may not be detected. The poison may retain its infecting power for months unless destroyed by proper disinfection. It has been fully and conclusively proven that it is entirely prevented by means at our command.

How Transmitted.

It is transmitted through direct exprosure to another case, or through the medium of infected objects. Un_ the discharges from the body of a men. person having the disease.

In another instance two children who had the disease in a very mild form had access to the milk room, and thereby caused the infection to be distributed to eleven families in the milk route.

It is believed that the disease may be communicated by a person recover ing therefrom so long as the usual subsequent scaling or peeling of the skin continues, which sometimes is not completed before the lapse of seventy or eighty days. The poison may also remain in clothing, etc., for a long tima possibly for years, espedrawers or trunks.

Period of Incubation.

The period of incubation or period between the time of exposure and a beaut'ful co-operation. the appearance of the disease is usually four to seven days. This has been known to vary, however, from one to fourteen days.



> feet below the surface, entirely surrounded by earth, well tamped in place and the top of the tank must be below the level of the lowest pipe line in the building used in connection with the equipment. (b) If impracticable to locate storage tanks outside of the building, they may be buried two (2) feet below the level of the basement floor embedded in the earth, and covered by at least 2 feet of earth and coacrete. (c) All tanks of 560 gallons or under shall be made of at least twelve (12) gauge galvanized steel or at least 1-4 inch black open hearth tank steel. All tanks exceeding 560 gallons capacity shall be made of 3-16 inch gal vanized steel or 1-4 inch black open hearth tank steel. All tanks made of steel must be carefully riveted and soldered and coated on the outside with tar or other rust resisting mate. rial. All tanks made of black steel must be riveted carefully and caulked and coated on the outside with tar or other rust resisting material. No tanks shall have openings or pipe connections except on the top thereof and shall be properly vented and shall not be connected either directly or indirectly with any public or private sewer, drain catch basin, or pit. (d) Filler pipes must be made of galvanized iron pipe 2 inches or more in diameter entering at the top of the tank and extending to the bottom of the same. The upper end of said filler pipe must terminate in a screw cap securely locked. Where tanks are located under the building the filler pipes must run to the outside of the building and terminate in er of said filler box to be securely locked. 




