IRON AND STEEL TO FREE LIST

Transfer of These Materials Favored by Majority Members of Senate Committee.

The transfer to the free list of the tariff bill on iron and steel raw materials with an estimated dutiable value of more than \$600,000,000 an. nually, was approved by the majority members of the Senate Finance

Committee. This increases the Senate's additions to the Underwood free list to an annual loss of \$2,000,000 in revenue, making a total loss of \$27,-000,000.

Chairman Simmons of the subcommittee announced to day that every item of the metal schedule would be reduced. He said that the administrative features of the bill would be acted on Monday and the bill would be ready for the caucus Wednesday or Thursday. He predicted that the caucus will make few changes and that the debate will begin in the Senate June 25.






