LEGISLATURE MAKES TIME

Special Session Threefourths Gone and Very Little Work Accomplished.

The special session of the Texas legislature has been supposedly working now for nearly three weeks. But little legislation has been done. The appropriation bill is still uncompleted. The lawmakers have passed the usual millage and per diem bill. The half million Standard Oil fine was the subject of wrangle until Treasurer Edwards placed it to the credit of the general fund.

If any sort of a blue sky law is passed it will be in mild form. This proposition is along the line of the Jim Hogg stocks and bond laws and the people are entitled to protection against wild cat boomers and extortioners. Land sharks and loan sharks ought to be put out of business and no man or set of men should be allowed to promote thieving propositions to fleece the unwary citizens. It ought not to take any great length of time for an intelligent legislature to pass a stringent law against such frauds.

It looks like a waste of time to go into further investigation of the mismanagement of the penitentiary system. The reports show that the business has been losing money and needs a different management. Two members of the old commission have been endorsed but there is probability that Chairman Cable will not be confirmed.

The Agricultural department and the hospitals and asylums are promised a fair fling in the appropriation while the legislature is getting almost nowhere in the constructive law making they are putting in good time working on political futures. Slates are being made every day and broken the next.

The law for direct election of senators is making slow progress and the law to prohibit shipment of liquor into dry territory may or may not pass and it is being predicted that if it should it will meet with executive disfavor.



THINKS STATE BEING WORKED

Delegate to State Institution Considers it Hot Bel of Graft. He Favors County Experimental Stations.

To the Snyder Signal:
As I was chosen one of the delegates to The Farmers' Institute at College Station at the recent session and as there are many people who would like to know what we saw and learned I take this occasion to say what I have to say.

After arriving there I was interested in seeing the dry method of farming. The method is alright. They have grown a very large stalk of cotton, but very few forms on them for the size of the stalk. I saw plenty of cotton that was better than the Station cotton although farmed in the old way. The stalk was not so large but it had the fruit on it.

Their corn is very good considering the dry weather. Oats were good, in fact everything they are experimenting with looks well for the conditions.

I will say I am glad I went, but can't say I am proud of what I learned, for the simple reason it is not what I thought it was. I wasn't there but a little while till I became satisfied that it has the wrong name. I should have been named grafting station, instead of College Station. It takes \$18,000 a year to run this station and I am sure, speaking for myself, it isn't worth 18 cents to me in this part of the state.

I am safe to say that I met and talked with at least 100 delegates, if not more, and that was the view they have of the station. When I meet as many men as I did and everyone says it is graft from start to finish there must be something in it. As the old saying goes, "Where there is smoke there must be some fire," but this is a big fire with but little smoke. The Bible teaches us that the whale swallowed Jonah and that he lay in his belly for three days and nights. That looks pretty big to us, but when it comes to a few sharks swallowing the state of Texas that is still larger.

Their stock down there are all fat and fine, but if we had our stock fed by the state and negroes to pull our wagons, they would look well too.

There are men there teaching agriculture that would not know to which end of an implement to hitch the team or when a machine needs grease or sharpening.

I think if the state would give me 1800 acres of land and furnish me means with which to work it, and then I had to call for \$18,000 a year, I'd think the state was soft and still softer, if I held my job.

I am not fighting the A. & M. College, although one delegate did say that the college turns out more grafters than any other class. I do not say that is true, but if it is, what good is it to you and me?

Anything that is detrimental to you or the state is not worth having. I am sure if the railroad people see it as I do, and as other delegates do, they would not haul any more of us down there free.

So the railroads as well as the state are being swallowed by sharks. When the oil companies got to grafting they were dealt with, but in this case we have no way of helping ourselves.

What can we do but dance to the music when the roll is called? I wish that every member of the Farmers' Institute could go down there and see for himself. Then he would be convinced.

I am in favor of experimental stations, but let every county have its own. What will do well in one place will not do well in another. I am sure if we had a station here in our own county it could be made to benefit us all, as far as that is concerned, we ought to make all our farms experimental stations and meet and discuss our successes and our failures. If we would all do that we would have better crops, better farms, prettier homes and would love each other better.

What we need now is an organized system of marketing so that these prolific crops will not go to waste or hang as a loss to the producers.

PETER RADFORD PROVERBS

(By Peter Radford, President Farmers' Union.)

Facts always have stubborn enemies. Money is the motive power of civilization. Those who surfeit can be as sick as those who starve.

We have learned how to produce, now we must learn how to market.

The two most powerful influences in agriculture are markets and credits.

Cheap money is one of the greatest ministers to human needs the world possesses.

The inventive geniuses are the most valuable farm hands we have and they perform an enduring service to mankind.

What is sometimes called an over-production is merely the clogging of the markets by bad system of distribution.

The farmer gets more out of a fair than anyone else. The fair to a city man is an entertainment; to a farmer it is educational.

An exhibition of perfect products of the soil stirs the genius in artists, and their purity furnishes models for growth of character.

The home dollar should take up the burdens of the hour rather than lie in wait to drink prosperity from the dripping wings of outside capital.

A farmer who produces a crop he can neither use nor sell at a profit is an unsuccessful farmer, regardless of the science he employed in production.

Colonel George Harvey is the editor of the American Review of Reviews. In a long article dealing with conditions in Mexico, Colonel Harvey says: "The best opinions in this country, however, is to the effect that our government has no possible reason for invading Mexico, and trying to establish order there. It is quite possible for American citizens who cannot live there in safety to return to this country. American investments are very great in Mexico but they were never guaranteed by our government and have always been subject to the vicissitudes of a revolutionary country." Colonel Harvey compliments President Wilson for his firm and cool-headed conduct throughout his administration in dealing with the Mexican question. Admitting all that Colonel Harvey has said to be true, the Record asks, is there any valid reason why the constitutionalists should not be given privilege of buying firearm and ammunition in the markets of the world? President Huerta and his followers enjoy this boon. Then why should it be withheld from the men who are fighting for liberty, law and justice in Mexico?—Fort Worth Record.

President Schaff of the K. & T. says his company will not spend any money for extensions or improvements until the state officers stop trying to take penalties in excess of valuations estimated by the commission.

THE TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE

The Signal has always been a friend to the A. & M. College, believing that institution was doing good work in the way of teaching young Texans how to get the best out of the farm and to raise the standard of farm life. Instead of doing away with the College Station plant, this paper has favored giving it opportunity for better work and at the same time it has insisted that such a school ought to be established in West Texas. There are lots of points to be learned about agriculture and the college is intended to give practical and scientific training along all lines of farming.

Scurry county sent a delegation of active farmers to the State Institute and what better can we do than accept the report that these men bring back?

Is the College a failure? We think not. The trouble may be that when men work for the government they learn to "throw off" and a board of regents, however honest, may possibly be led into engaging expert teachers who are not practical men. There is usually a tendency to want to make a show at a place like the A. & M. when visitors come and a teacher whose knowledge is in the books may not be as capable as many an ordinary farmer, who gains his knowledge from experience.

It may be well for the state to keep a close watch on the work being done at the college and see to it that the men employed there give honest, intelligent service instead of drawing big pay for no actual practical service rendered.

The Signal still believes we should give more attention to agricultural training, that we ought to have experimental schools all over the state and that agriculture should be given more attention in the public schools, and the A. & M. should be maintained as the central institution for training the young men in practical farming.
