FULL RENDITION THE SOLUTION.

The Jacksboro News and the Graham Leader have been having an argument over the graduated land tax proposition. It is hard to tell which knows the most about it. They both oppose the policy of allowing vast bodies of land to be held for speculation. Now, the simple way to stop that would be to find what price the owner puts on his land and then apply the full rendition law as it exists in Texas. Suppose a man owns a thousand acres of land worth ten dollars an acre, but which he is holding at thirty dollars an acre. Let the tax assessor turn this land in at what the owner says it is worth. He will soon be ready to put it on the market at its real value and instead of a vast domain lying idle, it would be settled up by producing farmers and every quarter section would be converted into a farm with big crops and happy families growing up all around




