NOT WORTH THE COST.

If the United States ever had any inclination to recognize the rebel forces in Mexico, that idea was quickly dispelled when Gen. Villa proved himself a worse assassin at Juarez than Huerta has been.

His bloody butchery of prisoners of war may not be approved by Carranza but that leader admits that he cannot control his men, and that fact puts him beyond lines of national recognition. The why generally misunderstood the mission of Special Envoy Hale, Washington didn't send a messenger to Carranza to beg for anything. He was sent there to learn if it would be safe to trust the Constitutionalists with advantages, such as Washington had to offer.

The Carranza party were ready to accept aid, but proposed to dictate the terms.

It was quickly found that the rebels are an irresponsible people and entirely undeserving of cordial consideration. There is little if any difference in the temper of the contending parties in Mexico and no difference in moral standing.

The opinion is growing that since neither side has any regard for honorable warfare, it would be best even now, for President Wilson to wash his hands of the whole bloody affair and leave them to fight it out. Can we afford to do it? Why not? Our attitude has been, all the while as a peace maker, and since neither line wants peace, why fritter any more time in trying to settle the matter?

Even if armed intervention comes, there is nothing to be gained. We don't want the territory. Should a scope of country there come under control of the United States, it would take a century of time and a barn full of money to ever bring the people to a point of respectable citizenship.

They both oppose the policy of allowing vast bodies of land to be held for speculation. Now, the simple way to step that would be to find what price the owner puts on his land and then apply the full rendition law as it exists in Texas. Suppose a man owns a thousand acres of land worth ten dollars an acre, but which he is holding at thirty dollars an acre. Let the tax assessor turn this land in at what the owner says it is worth. He will soon be ready to put it on the market at its real value and instead of a vast domain lying idle, it would be settled up by producing farmers and every quarter section would be converted into a farm with big crops and happy families growing up all around us.

SUDAN GRASS.

Farmers who have grown the Sudan Grass are pleased with it and others are getting seed for next year. The grass has proven to be a great drouth resister, and has excellent feeding properties, and, unlike many other grasses, does not become a pest as it has to be planted each year.

This grass can be cut from two to three times a season, giving at least a ton and a half per cutting.

Sudan grass was imported into this country in 1909, and has been tried out by the United States government, and will undoubtedly become one of the mainstays of the farmers of this region for a hay crop.

Mrs. A. H. Griggs, of Dermott, was a pleasant caller at the Signal office last Friday. She is an old timer in Scurry county, having been in the county fifteen years.

Will Locate in the West.

G. L. Lyons was here last week from Ellis county looking about with a view to locating here. He said he wanted to rent a farm and try his luck in West Texas. He doesn't think there is any better farming country than his home county, but there are too many people there. They have to scatter out and he thinks it wise to come out where land is cheaper.

There are so many renters there that land holders are standing out for a third of the cotton as well as the corn and he is not willing to pay so much rent, when he can do better in the west. He is favorably impressed with Scurry county.

Samuel Gompers was re-elected president of the American Federation of Labor, defeating John Mitchel for that important office. There is an element opposite to Gompers every year but he always rallies enough supporters to land him.

THE NEED OF ACTIVE

COMMERCIAL CLUB

Snyder is suffering more and more every day because of no organized and financed commercial club. Secretary Anderson is going almost alone in his efforts to keep Snyder to the front. He is in constant correspondence with clubs in other towns and could accomplish good work if he had the money and the men at his disposal to keep something doing. There are valuable enterprises seeking location in West Texas and some of these could be brought to Snyder. A town must have factories if it would grow.

A regular pay roll here would put new life into all lines of business and factories would bring the pay roll. Men who withhold encouragement from coming industries are retarding development of town and country.

Towns that maintain active clubs are getting new industries and are attracting new people and new concerns. Let us hope that our days of inactivity are about passed and that Snyder will soon wake up to the importance of commercial activity.

Hampering State Progress.

Attorney General Looney insists that the Katy Rail Road has violated the letter of the State Constitution and therefore ought to be sued, and several thousand citizens who want to see more railroads built to develop the state think it is bad policy to thus handicap the country developers.

It might be borne in mind that an Attorney General gets a good size per centage of fines imposed in anti-trust suits and maybe Gen. Looney is anxious to lay up something for old age.

The people throughout west Texas have hoped for an extension of the Katy system but the Colquitt veto and the Looney suit have cheated us out of our calculations.

It may be held right to compel a corporation to obey the law, but is it expedient to retard the development of west Texas with a law suit based upon technical violation?

President Lewis of the Farmers' Union thinks it would be no crime if the mothers and grand mothers of Texas should get together in a state-wide meeting and select some good man for governor who could run the state government on less than \$13,000,000 a year.

These who live at home and eat the fruits of their own labors seldom have cause to grumble at short crops and hard times. The farmer who goes to the market and buys imported foodstuffs that could have been raised cheaper at home, is the man who finds the cost of living too high. Any crop will seem short, when it is depended upon to go so far in buying foreign grown supplies for his family and for the stock. Plant and raise your living at home, then raise enough cotton to buy that which you cannot grow in this climate. In other words, plant a few more hogs, chickens, eggs, milk and butter, sweet potatoes, pumpkins, peas, popcorn, etc.—Lubbock Avalanche.

Every man will admit the truth above stated and then most of us will go on raising cotton to buy a living.

Business and professional men at Sweetwater pulled off their coats the other day and worked the roads. They didn't quibble over age limit or any other exemption and didn't wait to see whether other men worked or not. The Sweetwater Reporter says: "Judge W. W. Beall, Jno. R. Cox, J. L. Ross, W. D. Beall, E. E. Ray and A. W. Goble went out on the Nolan road south of town Thursday and joined the people of the community in working the roads. Not an idle moment was spent and all returned weary, but feeling that some good work had been done.

Senator Culberson has always maintained his honor in public life. There has never been a charge of dishonor brought against him, but just now many people who have always supported him feel that he ought to stand aside and leave his friends free to send some one else to the Senate. His health is said to be broken and he has for a long time been physically incapacitated for duty, therefore he ought to voluntarily retire.

The Star Telegram man quotes an exchange as saying that a man who always takes his pay envelope to his wife without opening it never figures in a divorce case, and the S. T. adds—and he will never figure in anything else of much importance.

The people of Scurry county ought to see now the importance of making good roads, but in our opinion the surest way to get them is by voting road bonds.

The land renters' association which was born in Waco two or three years ago would have resulted in a movement of settlers to West Texas, had not the organization gotten into the hands of that peculiar political cult that is wearing itself out trying to whip land owners into their line instead of moving away and leaving the Ephraims with their gods.

Time was not far back when the boodler was called a statesman or, at worse, a shrewd politician. It is to the great advantage of this country that he is now known by his right name.—Stanton Reporter.

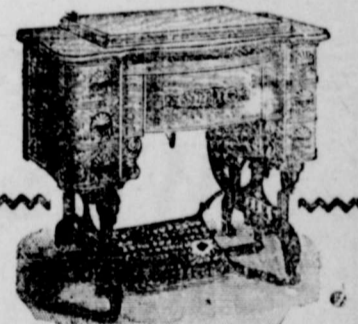

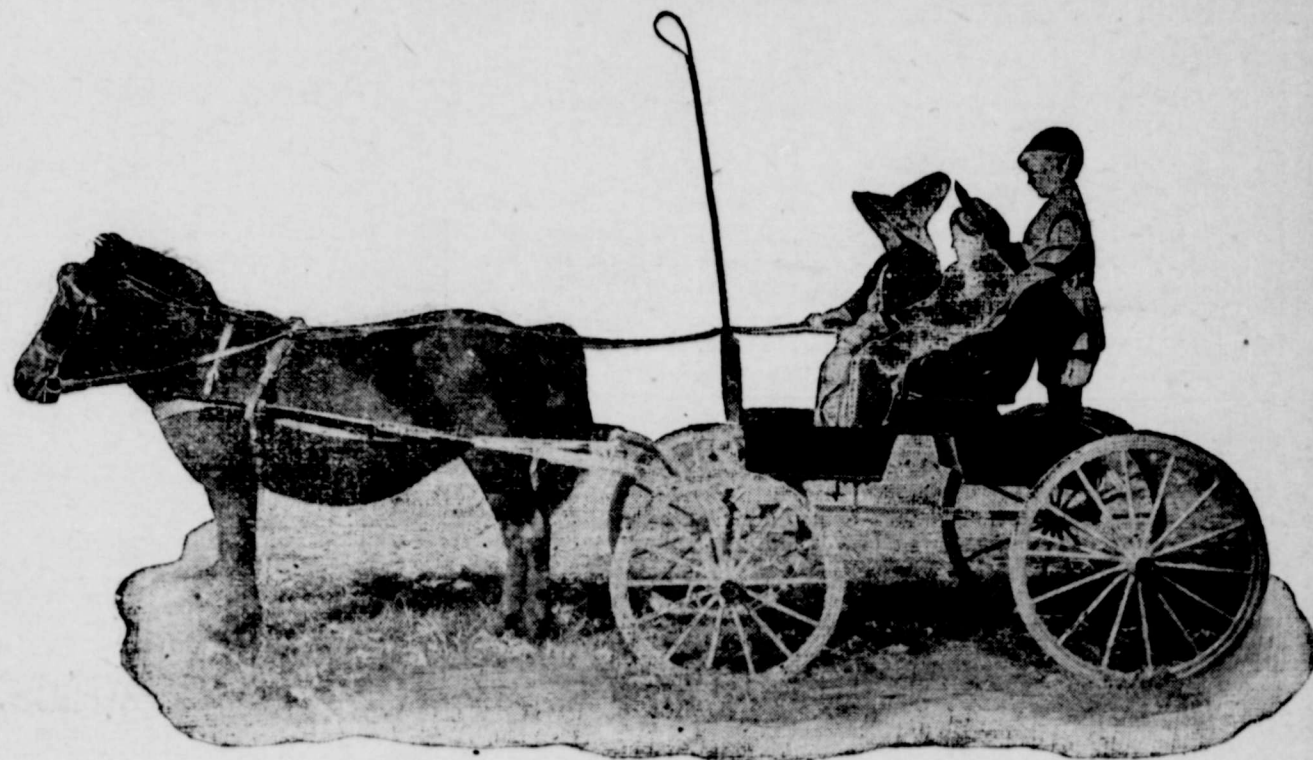

AUTOMOBILE SPEED CONTEST

From El Paso to Dallas by Way of Roswell, Over the Southern National Highway.

Arrangements are now being made for a speed contest in the near future over the all Southern route from El Paso to Dallas, under the auspices of the American Automobile Association.

This contest will be similar to the recent race from El Paso to Phoenix, and will be a demonstration of the practicability of the Roswell route as an all winter route, the race being arranged for mid-winter.

The entrance fee for participants will be \$100.00 and 36-hour controls will be established at Roswell and Sweetwater. It is expected that the run from El Paso to Roswell will be made in one day, from Roswell to Sweetwater in one day, and from Sweetwater to Dallas in one day. The prize money will be distributed as follows: Fifty per cent of the Roswell prize money to go to the car making the best time from El Paso to Roswell, 25 per cent to the second best, 15 per cent to the third and 10 per cent to the fourth. The same proportion will be applied to cars making best time from Roswell to Sweetwater, and the same from Sweetwater to Dallas, but no car will be entitled to any prize money which does not make the entire trip. Eighteen entries are promised by El Paso and several by Roswell.

The utmost publicity will attend the race and it will do more than anything else that could be planned to bring the Southern Highway into immediate use. The effort is now being made to enlist the interest and co-operation of the communities along the line, and the responses that have been received give encouragement to the hope that the race may be put on.

Mr. J. W. Stockard of El Paso, one of the vice-presidents of the American Automobile Association, has taken up the matter vigorously during his visit in Roswell, and local parties have joined him in presenting the matter to Sweetwater, Dallas, Texas, and other points along the line.—Roswell Morning News, Nov. 22, 1913.
