Persons May File For Homestead Exemption

BAIRD — Persons who wish to apply for a residential homestead exemption effective with the 1979 tax year may clip and complete the affidavit printed in this issue and return it to the Baird Independent School District Tax Office by April 30, 1979.

The form provided may be used to apply for exemption on either a rural or urban homestead. To be eligible for the exemption, the owner must reside on the property or have resided on it and be only temporarily absent, claiming no other homestead elsewhere.

A married couple may claim a rural homestead consisting of up to 200 acres of land, and a single adult person, not a constituent of a family, may claim up to 100 acres as a homestead provided the following requirements are met. The person making the claim must be an agricultural producer, residing on the land, and using the land to conduct his agricultural enterprise. The land may consist of several tracts provided the home is located on one tract and all tracts are used in the overall production.

Any homestead not used in agricultural production will be considered an urban homestead. It can consist of a lot or lots not exceeding \$10,000 in value at the time of designation as a homestead and may be claimed by a family or single adult.

The completed affidavit must contain the property

description (Lot and Block or Abstract and Survey numbers, etc), owner's name, address, sworn statement, signature, and date.

The \$5,000 exemption will be applied to the full value - not the assessed value of the property. It will provide a savings of up to \$36.00 on the tax bill if the present rate of \$1.60 per 100 valuation is adopted again next year.

Funds Available For Smaller Areas
