ALL EUROPE PLUNGED IN WAR TRADES DAY EVENT

LEADING NATIONS OF EUROPE ARE ENGAGED IN ACTUAL WAR-FARE.—STRUGGLEWILL BE TERRIFIC AND POSSI-BILITIES MORE THAN APPALLING.

PRESIDENT WILSON OFFERS MEDIATION

The Hope that the President's Offer of Mediation is Based On the Fact That Under The Hague Agreement They Can Accept Without Changing Military Status.—Bryan Calls Meeting.

Austria and Servia have been at war only a few days and the war which started between these two governments has involved Russia, Germany, England, France and Belgium in actual warfare with the possibilities of other European nations being involved. Russia and Germany are at war and several minor battles are being fought on the Russian-German frontier. The Germans are attacking the French on the Franco-German frontier, but the most desperate land fighting so far, it seems, is along the Belgian frontier and dispatches say that the Belgians have repulsed th Germans at several points along the border.

England declared war on Germany, Tuesday at 7 p. m. when the German government refused to recognize Belgian neutrality.

Engagements of considerable importance have been reported between British and German warships in the North Sea. The French destroy ed two German warships in the Mediterranean sea Wednesday and captured another. The German fleet repulsed a Russian fleet in the Baltic sea early in the week.

At present, Great Britain, France, Belgium and Russia are allied against Germany. Germany has called upon Italy to live up to her treaty obligations, which means that Germany expects Italy to become her ally, together with Austria-Hungary. So far Italy has been neutral and has signified her intention of remaining so. It is reported that Spain will remain neutral and Turkey has so stated, but her troops are being mobiliz-

It appears that Japan is coming to the aid of Great Britain in the event that England needs her assistance, complying with the terms of a former treaty.

All of Europe has become the scene of the most animated and active war operations within a week and the possibilities of one of the greatest wars in the history of the world are right now upon us.

President Wilson, Wednesday sent the rulers of the leading nations involved, a tender of his good offices to mediate. His message follows:

"As official head of one of the powers signatory to The Hague Convention, I feel it to be my privilege and my duty, under Article 3 of that Convention, to say to you in a spirit of earnest friendship that I should welcome an opportunity to act in the interest of European peace, either now, or at any other time that might be thought more suitable, as an occasion to serve you and all concerned in a way that would afford me lasting cause for gratitude and happi-ness.

THE LATHAM TRIAL AT ANSON

JURY QUICKLY SECURED-MANY WITNESSES TESTIFY.-PROSE-CUTION RESTS WEDNESDAY — DEFENSE INTRODUCED TESTIMONY AND RESTED THURSDAY AFTERNOON

EIGHT HOURS ARGUMENT TO THE SIDE

Evidence Was All In by 2:30 O'clock Thursday Afternoon.—May Probably be Late Today Before Case Gets to the Jury .- Plea of Self Defense Will be Entered .- Trial Consumes Week.

Quite a number of witnesses in the case of the State vs. Mrs. Minnie Latham, charged with the murder of John Y. Stewart, in Snyder, on January 20, 1914 have returned from Anson, where the woman is on trial in the District court. They report that the State rested its case Wednesday morning and the defense was introducing testimony Wednesday afternoon ad Thursday. The trial is taking up all the week.

The trial jury is composed of the following named Jones County citizens: C. C. Dansby, W. J. McClelland, L. L. Busby, C. W. Bartlett, C. L. Hamilton, J. M. Pittman, W. G. Anderson, R. J. Hodges, I. B. Dixon, W. A. Huling, J. R. Caldwell and N. B. Bigham.

Both sides are represented by strong legal talent. Judge Cullen C. Higgins of Snyder is conducting the the examination of witnesses on the part of the prosecution, and Judge Wright of San Angelo for the defense.

The testimony of the actual killing is practically the same as heretofore published in the Signal, how Mrs. Latham came to Snyder on the evening of January 19, in an automobile with her husband, how she went to the Maxwell hotel alone and registered as Mrs. C. C. Everts, Ft. Worth; of her nervous attitude about the hotel that night and the next morning; of the passing near the hotel just after noon of John Stewart from the east side to the north side of the public square, and of the shooting of John Stewart by Mrs. Latham a few minutes later in front of the First National Bank.

Witnesses have testified at the trial of seeing defendant and her husband travelling in an automobile in Dickens county, about the day before the tragedy and they were going in the direction of Snyder.

The testimony back of the killing has, in a great measure been kept from the public, except the woman's statement that deceased had wronged her and that her hosband had driven her from his home because of suspicions against her. 


