College Station, Nov. 2, 1914 Dear Sir .--- In the present cotton situation in Texas, it behooves all classes of citizens and all commercial interests to render "First Aid to

the Injured." Several Commercial Clubs have begun already to address their energies to the encouragement of substitute money crops and I am taking the liberty of reciting briefly for your information the experience of the Bryan Commercial Club.

The club first invited some 75 representative farmers to an informal conference and luncheon when there was a free discussion of what should be done in the way of substituting other crops in part for cotton. Then a mass meeting was called in the name of a few representative business men and a few representative farmers.

Nearly 300 farmers responded, and whole day was spent in discussion. A carefully selected committee considered the crops best suited to Brazos County and the selection was approved. It was made clear that by organization and co-operation for selling in bulk, by carload or in large lots, other crops than cotton can be sold, as witness the success of tomato growers, pea growers, onion growers, and Sudan grass seed grow

ers, in other parts of the state. If farmers can be convinced that other crops can be sold, they will grow other crops. If business men will lend their aid, the crops can be sold. It is all a matter of organization, and this is a matter in which ommercial clubs are skilled.

After full consideration the Bryan Mass Meeting effected a temporary organization, selected men to work up school house meetings and adjourned to a day two weeks later. At the second mass meeting a permanent organization was effected

and committees were provided on: Crops and Methods of cultivation, whose duty it will be to study and give advice, to secure lecturers, etc.; Marketing, whose duty it will be to compile figures on precise acreage

and probable yield of each crop, to obtain information in advance of harvesting and generally to direct the work of group selling;

Education. Organization and whose duty it will be to organize clubs at each school house to hold periodical meetings, to secure acreage

In the absence of any state agency equipped with funds to carry on such work of organization, I am appealing to commercial clubs to undertake this task for which they are so well equipped. There is no service that the clubs can render at this time which will do so much for general prosperity. Indeed, it is possible by this means to convert the present cotton situation into a great blessing to the commonwealth. Farmers will now diversify if you will only help them to market their crops, and we can emancipate our state from cot-

ton slavery. Instructions have gone out to 100 county demonstration agents, working under the joint direction of the Federal Department of Agriculture and this department, to give their energies to organization along these lines. This department has issued a bulletin on substitute money crops and it will be sent to you as soon as it comes from the state printer. The heads of departments at the College will be glad to furnish further information upon any particular subject or problem, and we will be able occasionally to spare a man to address meetings, though our funds for this purpose are extremely meager.

Ganzer of Denton and Lang Aycock; the Reporter man had the pleasure this morning of making a visit to the splendid farm of Mr. Aycock, just north of town. Mr. Tilden Polk has the farm in charge and has one of the best crops grown in this country this year. He has a large acreage of cotton and the yield is excellent. He is now picking the thirty-fifth bale and from appearances of the amount of unopened bolls, together with that which is now needing to be picked, Mr. Polk will get nearly or quite as much more.

This farm has been thoroughly terraced under the supervision of County Agent W. C. Calvert, and if anyone is yet doubtful concerning the wisdom of terracing a visit to this farm will easily convince him that it is the proper method. Lying adjacent to the hills and mountains to the North an enormous amount of water dashes down upon the farm which before it was terraced did much damage, in that the soil was constantly impoverished and was being constantly washed away. As it is now, not only is the moisture conserved for the growing crops, but the rich soil is preserved. The splendid results obtained from terracing on this farm exactly coincides with the good results of others who have tested the method.


