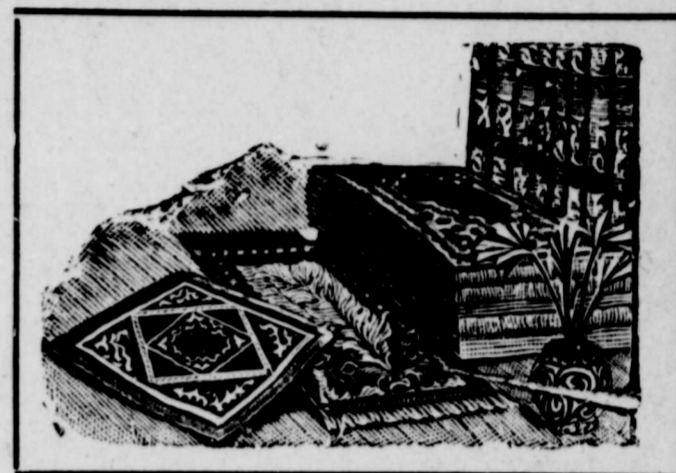

K. Tideman & Co. lost 6,000 bales of cotton in a fire at Galveston.

Did you do any cleaning up? No? Too busy at other things, eh?

Abilene has shipped ten cars of eggs since Feb. 15.

Nolan county farmers will meet at Sweetwater March 17 to organize a farming and marketing association.

W. R. Nelson, editor of the Kansas City Star is reported mortally ill.

The equal suffrage resolution lacked four votes of the two thirds in the house to submit the constitutional amendment.

A. W. Bennett, editor of a Socialist paper at Chickasha, Oklahoma shot himself. He requested friends to leave him alone. He wanted to die. No cause for the act is stated.

The Austin Statesman thinks that the efforts of Germany and England each, to keep the other from getting our food stuffs, amount to little except to muss up Uncle Sam's business.

Cotton went up three-eighths of a cent Monday and brokers were amazed. They say there is no reason for it. Just the same, we fellows at the other end of the gun have contended all along that there was no reason why cotton should go so low.

President Wilson has been severely censured by a French politician for letting German people have something to eat. Looks like a fellow almost has to declare war to maintain neutrality.

Of course we had a spell of pretty cold weather. A twelve inch snow was reported in Kansas and rigorous winter prevailed in north Texas and Oklahoma, to say nothing about how cold it was at Amarillo and Lubbock.

Representative Hill told his fellow law makers in Austin the other day that if the penitentiary is ever made a self sustaining institution, common business sense must be put in the place of sentiment, so that convicts may be made to do a full days work.

The Tenant Farmer bill has been signed by Governor Ferguson and is henceforth to be the law governing rental charges in Texas, and though a farmer may move to town and rent his well fixed home place out, he must get no more for it than does the man who rents a field with a two room dwelling and a calf lot.

SINGLE TAX BILL BEFORE THE LEGISLATURE

The Houston Post raises a strong note of warning against the passage of a measure introduced by Representative Dixon, at the request of Mr. Pastoriza, of Houston which measure proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize cities to exempt from taxation for municipal purposes, all building and improvement and tax only the value of the lots.

The Post says this is a part of Socialism and is the Henry George land tax theory, pure and simple. The Post says further that if the proponents could get this measure through they would then carry the Socialistic plan of taxation to all the state and the burden of taxes would then fall heaviest on the lands of the farmers of Texas.

LEGISLATURE PLUGGING AWAY

Compulsory education in Texas is endorsed by the Texas house of representatives, which passed finally by 94 to 11, the bill of Representative Baker of Scurry county. Members who had opposed it in its earlier stages got busy on the final vote and cast their votes for it. The bill requires attendance of all children between the ages of 8 and 14 and becomes effective September 1, 1916. For the first year attendance must be for sixty days, second year eighty days and thereafter 100 days. Parents who keep their children from school will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and will be punished accordingly.

The bill creating a system of farm credit banks, also by Representative Baker, of Scurry county was engrossed and will almost surely take its place in the commercial field.

The equal suffrage resolution has a slim chance of final adoption.

The Life Insurance Companies that fluffed up their tail feathers and went out of Texas rather than invest some of their earnings here, have now agreed to invest \$35,000,000 here within five years if they may come back and Gov. Ferguson is ready to sign a bill to let them come back.

A good woman went before a legislative committee in Austin last week and urged the passage of a law to prohibit people from walking on railroad tracks or suffering children to play on railroads. Lawmakers were impressed with the importance of penalizing parents who let their children get killed by railroad trains.

Prof. Barton of Waco has been chosen as Superintendent of the anti-Saloon League and he says he will make Texas dry in three years. None of us will attempt now to deny it; in fact if he had been in the lead the state might have gone pro long ago. Strange that such an efficient leader has been so long under cover.



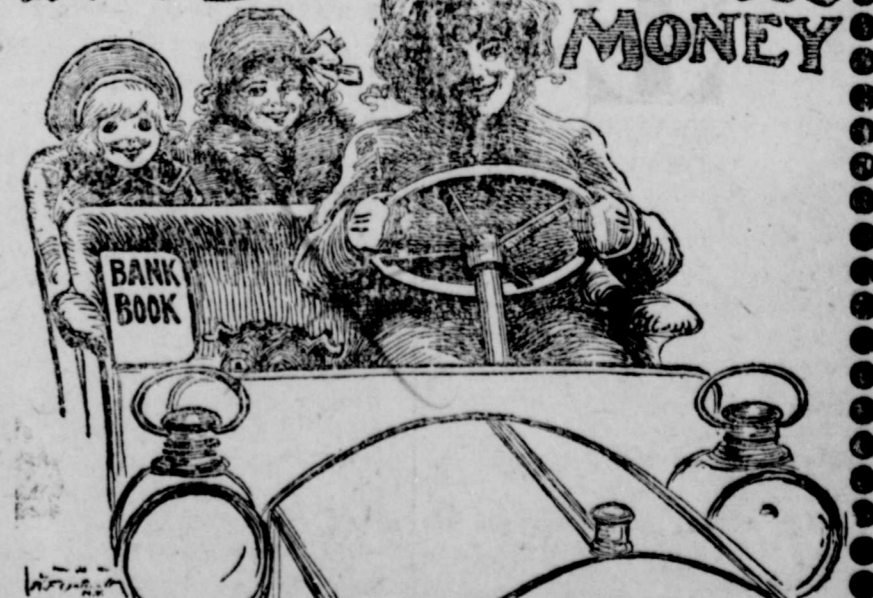

First Christian Church Notes

Missionary day was a great day in every respect. The weather was ideal and the congregation was excellent.

The address on the world's need and an appeal to all to be partakers in the great service of saving all nations. To those who argue that "charity begins at home" and that the first thought should be for the "heathen at our own door" it was shown that no less than one million were doing distinctive Christian work at home and that there were 150,000 ministers. For every missionary the church sent abroad it kept fifty four at home. Nearly \$200,000,000 spent in running expenses for the churches each year and of this 94 per cent spent at home and six per cent spent abroad.

The Christian church had missions in Africa, China, India, Japan and the Philippine Islands. There were twenty-two hospitals and dispensaries; 115 colleges and schools; three orphanages; 154 churches; 308 Sunday Schools; printing presses turned out 292,000 pages of sacred writings yearly. There were 181 missionaries and 805 native helpers. The income of the Foreign Society last year was \$464,149 and the sum of \$500,000 was asked for this year.

The appeal was that the Master's command "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth," should be understood and responded to and that all should become co-workers with the Master in his desire to save the whole world.

The offering which was taken at the close of the address nearly doubled the church apportionment and the membership rejoices at this fact and realizes that there is truly a great expansion in the heart and vision of the church.

The night congregation was good and great interest was shown in the address from 1 John, 3, 2. "Now are we the Sons of God."

The Sunday School had an attendance of 118. The Pastor began the ten minute Bible Outline talks. These will continue each week. It will be well for all the scholars and teachers to take up the study.

We were glad to have Bro. Walling at the services. He has labored faithfully in the Gospel in Texas for nearly forty years and we felt honored by his presence.

The officers meeting last Sunday afternoon was well attended. All reports were interesting and showed all departments moving forward. The financial report showed all bills paid and a balance on the right side.

The ten sermons will show God revealing himself to man through the ages and will be illustrated with about four hundred pictures from the world's best artists. 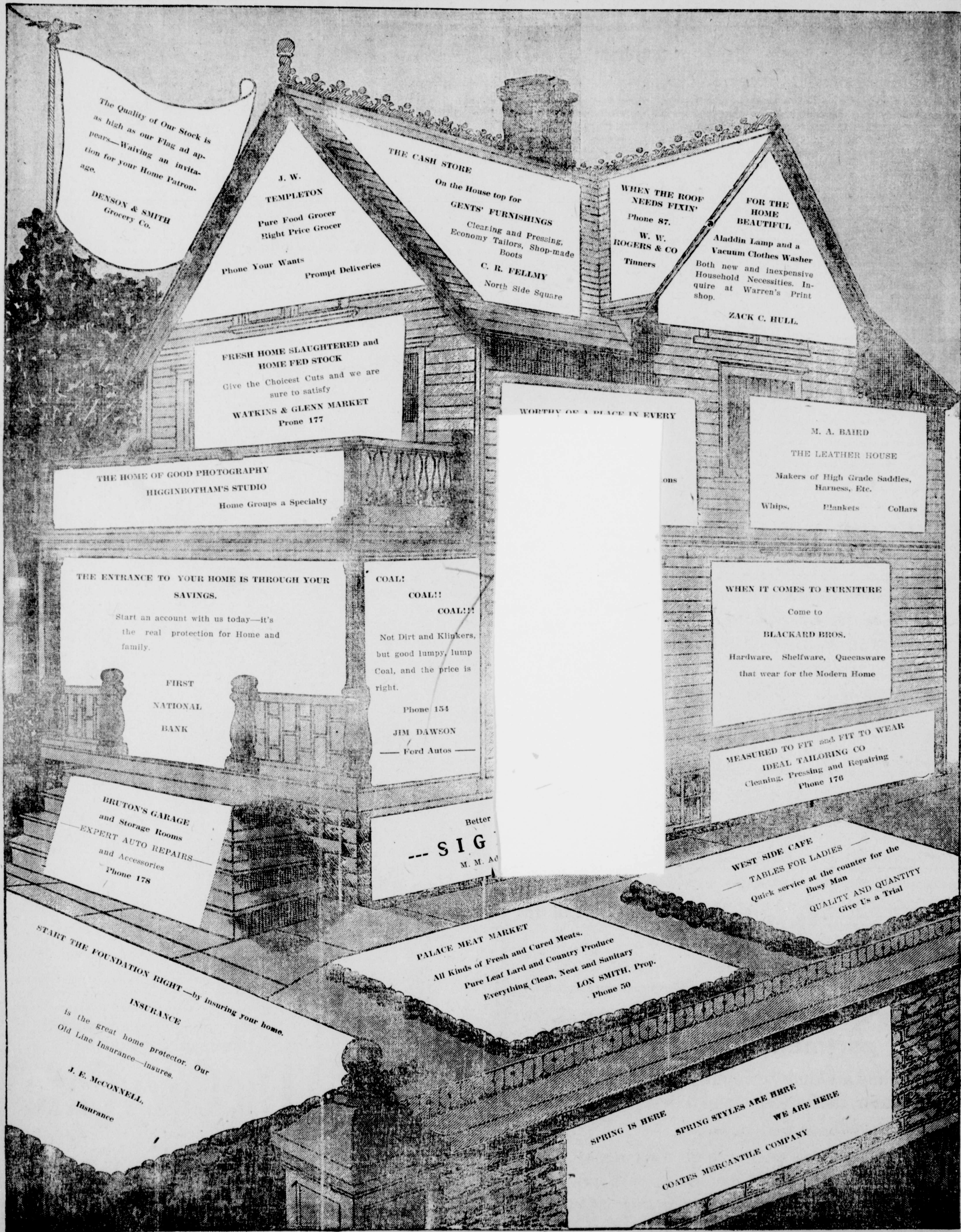
