It is ordered that the order of the court made in July 1914 authorizing payment of accounts for road work when such accounts are approved by the commissioners for whom the work was done be and is hereby revoked and no accounts for road work will be hereafter be approved for payment by this court except for expenditures upon roads included in the list of roads for which apportionments have heretofore been made or on road work which the court has previously ordered to be done.






