

6. Germany's proposal to give immunity to American ships without contraband, and to four belligerant ships under the American flag is rejected, with the emphatic assertion that the acceptance of the suggestion would amount to an admission of Germany's right to set aside the American contention that neutrals may travel anywhere on unresisting ships of any nationality, even though they may carry contraband. It is indicated that the future conduct of the German submarines may determine the responsibility for friendly relations between the two countries.

***** JAPAN WILL NOT ACCEDE TO ENGLAND'S DEMANDS

Tokio, July 21-Great Britain has been informed by the Japanese Government that she will be unable to accede to Eng land's request to prohibit trading in the far east with citizens of hostile nations.

England recently gazetted a regulation prchibiting all trading between Germany and Austria in China, Siam and Persia. Up to this time the decree has not been obeyed and England has been awaiting assurances from Japan that the empire of the Rising Sun would take steps to see that the decree was onforced. Japan's reply to Great Britain has caused no little com ment from war critics who are wondering what the next move between England and Japan will be.







Whereas, there will be submitted to the voters of Texas on the 24th. day of July A. D., 1915, a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 2. Article 5 and known as Senate Joint Resolution No three, providing that the Supreme Court of the State ly was commuted to life imprisonshall consist of a Chief Justice and ment, was attacked by another prisfour Associate Justices;

And whereas, the Supreme Court of this State now consists of only three members, a Chief Justice and two Associate Justices, which number of said Justices is insufficient to keep up with the business constantly coming before that court:

And whereas, the said Supreme Court, as now constituted, is more than two years behind with its docket and is constantly falling further and further behind with the business coming before it:

And whereas, in our opinion, the only manner practicable for the relief of this congested condition in lights were out at the time. Creen said court, which condition is hurtful to the best interests of the State creted in his clothing. and to the litigants coming before that court, is by increasing the members of this Court:

Be is resolved that we, the undersigned members of the Scurry County Bar Association, respectfully submit to the voters of Scurry County the aforesaid facts, and earnestly request the voters of said county to support this amendment by voting in favor thereof on the above date.

LEO FRANK ASSAULTED

Fellow Prisoner Cuts Frank's Throat With Knife Made of File

Milledgeville, Ga., July 17.-Leo M. Frank, whose death sentence for the murder of Mary Phagan recent-

oner at the state prison from here tonight and seriously injured by being cut in the throat.

Creen, who is also serving a life term for murder. Frank's recovery is said to be doubtful.

The attack on Frank was made shortly after 11 o'clock, a knife being the weapon used. Frank's jugular vein was cut but neither the spinal cord nor windpipe was injured.

The attack on frank was made in the dormitory which all the prisoners occupy in common at night. All is alleged to have had the knife se-

So quick was the attack that no guard had time to interfere. Frank fell backward to the floor uttering a cry of pain, the lights were quickly switched on and the guards saw him prostrate upon the floor, blood spurting from his wounds while a prisoner was trying to make his way back to his bed.

A knife that had been made of a file and which the convicts had used in killing hogs during the day was found on the dormitory floor. How the knife was smuggled into the prison is a mystery.

Dr. Geo. B. Compton, the prison surgeon, was immediately called but before he could reach the prison dormatory two surgeons who are serving terms in prison were at Frank's side, administering first aid. "I guess they've got me," Frank

is quoted as having said to the dectors when they reached him. He did not lose consciousness.

ORGANIZED FIGHT AGAINST TRANSCIENT VOTE MEASURE

Of all the six amendments to the constitution to be voted upon on the 24th inst, the hardest and most thoroughly organized fight is being made against the franchise amendment. Dr. Barton, head of the Anti-Salcon League and two German-American Societies in Dallas are lined up a; ainst the measure. This amendment proposes to permit traveling men to vote away from home under such restrictions as would remove danger of repeating, furthermore it proposes to require that a man must be a citizen of Texas and be able to read and write the English language

before he may vote. The resolution to submit this a-

mendment went through both houses of the Legislature by nearly a unanimous vote, but since then forty seven members have been induced to admit that they were caught off their guard and they are now appealing to the people to repudiate their slipshod work. Surely a Texas lawmaker is a funny concern.

Gov. Ferguson has been besieged with letters urging him to state his position on the amendments. The writers probably had it in mind that Texans may be influenced by knowing hew the Governor stands, but the real citizen of the state will be more independent. The half fledged citizen may probably fall under the influence of men higher up.

Of course Mr. Ferguson gives his position. It is not like him to hide out. He has a habit of standing out where everybody may see him. AS IT LOOKS IN OKLAHOMA.

A letter from Henry Tate to His parents.

As soon as school was out, at Waxahachie, Texas, Henry went out to find work for the summer. He joined himself to one Mr. Laboen who was planning to operate one of his threshers (as he did last year) in Kingfisher County, Okla. The following is the news part of a letter written to his parents, and dated, Hennessey, Okla., June 30.

I am at Hennessey with the thresher, however, it has been raining so much we have not been able to thresh any yet. We will try to start Monday. The country is floeded with hands. I call them hands, but really many of them are nothing but bums and tramps. I am confident that I have seen as many as sixty riding on one freight train. The other day I heard one brakeman ask another brakeman how much he made on that run; and the latter replied, "I only made \$156 on that run." These socalled harvest hands are thick. They lay all around over town and at the depot, water tank, stockyards and in box cars. They are the most lifeless, dull, stupid specimens of humanity that I ever saw. One man hired a crowd of them to shock his wheat, but he won't let them stay around his house. He carries them back and forth between his house and town, in automobiles. He said he would not let those lousy fellews sleep in his clean beds.

However, the Oklahoma people sure do treat us Texas fellows good. They think more of us than ever (they were highly complimented last year). Boys could not expect to be treated nicer than we are. When decent looking men come to Hennessey, they generally find work. The country is in need of good hands, and farmers have taken decent looking men, that look like they would make good hands, and fed them three and four weeks so they would have help when they needed it.




