most lifeless, dull, stupid specimens of humanity that 1 ever saw. One man hired a crowd of them to shock his wheat, but he won't let them stay
around his house. He carries them around his house. He carries them
back and forth between his house and town, in automobiles. He said he would not let those
sleep in his clean beds.
However, However, the Oklahoma peop sure do treat us Texas fellows good.
They think more of us than ever They think more of us than ever
