DESTRUCTION OF DOGS AND RABBITS

ERNEST G. HOLT OF BUREAU OF BIOLOGICAL SURVEY VISITS SNYDER OFFICIALLY

COUNTY ASKED TO CO-OPERATE

The Matter of Furnishing Poison by County Subject to Petition of the Citizens

In response to an appeal from the Chamber of Commerce and citizens of the County, the Federal government has sent a representative to Snyder to inaugurate a campaign for the extermination of the prairie dog and jack rabbit, which abound in this part of the state and which are two of the worst pests that the farmer has to contend with.

Mr. Ernest G. Holt, of the Bureau of Biological Survey has been in Snyder several days and has investigated the conditions in several districts in the county, and will continue his work until the 13th of this month when he leaves for Alabama on a short vacation, covering the Christmas season. Up to his leaving he will cover as many parts of the county as possible and demonstrate the best methods for the poisoning of the dogs and rabbits.

Already Pleasant Hill, White Bluff, Ira, Dunn and Plainview have been visited and arrangements have been made for Fluvanna, Knapp, Crowder and other places.

On Monday, Mr. Holt met the Commissioners Court and laid the plans of the government before them with a view of getting their co-operation in supplying the poison either free to the farmer or at cost. The commissioners discussed the matter and determined to put it up to the people to ascertain their wishes in the matter. Petitions are being signed and will be presented to Commissioners asking them to act in the matter and supply the poison either free or at cost as they may determine.

Mr. Holt is being accompanied on his visits by Wm. Pearn of the Snyder Chamber of Commerce. Any information on the work being done can be obtained by communicating either with Mr. Holt, Mr. Anderson or Mr. Pearn and anyone desiring a visit can see Mr. Pearn who has the arranging of meetings and demonstrations. After the vacation Mr. Holt will return to Snyder and spend a month in extermination work and it is hoped that every farmer and land owner will co-operate and destroy the dogs and rabbits.

CHANGE OF EXPRESS AGENTS IN SNYDER

TREATY MAKING TO BE BIG PROBLEM

MANY TREATIES AWAIT THE ACTION OF UNITED STATES SENATE

COLOMBIAN TREATY DOUBTFUL

Foreign Policy of United States Will Be Second in Importance Only to National Defense Program

Washington Nov. 27.—Treaty making the most delicate and difficult of diplomatic tasks, is today a stupendous field facing the state department and the United States senate. Uncle Sam's family affairs in the international family of nations promises to engross public attention for many months. Foreign relations of this country, it is admitted, will occupy many weeks before the senate during the coming session of congress. Foreign affairs, it is conceded, will take only second place to national defense in congress' business program.

A dozen treaties if not more, await the action of the senate. The State department is negotiating others, which may be ready for congress when it meets. In addition, diplomatic negotiations and international disputes due to the war may result in still others. Ratification by the senate is necessary to make them binding upon the United States or effective with the signatory nations.

To Take Up Old Ones.

As unfinished business, left over from the last session of congress, the Colombian and Nicaraguan treaties probably will be taken up immediately by the senate early in December. Both have met and are expected to meet strenuous opposition.

The Colombian treaty, proposed by former Secretary of State Bryan, proposes payment to Colombia of \$25,000,000 as compensation for her loss of Panama when this government was involved in the Panama revolution, which ultimately gave the United States the Panama canal zone.

The Nicaraguan treaty proposes payment of \$3,000,000 in exchange for an exclusive grant to the United States the right to use the Nicaraguan route for canal purposes.

General opinion here is that the Nicaraguan treaty probably will be ratified, but there is grave doubt regarding the Colombian treaty. It is hinted in official circles that Mr. Bryan was personally insistent upon the Colombian treaty and with him out of the cabinet the administration may not so vigorously insist upon its ratification.

Also pending for final conclusion are the so-called Bryan peace treaties with Germany and Austria. The Teutonic allies have never ratified these conventions although approving their principle.

To Settle Fish Disputes

Settlement of the fisheries boundary waters dispute with Canada by treaty is another serious diplomatic problem pending. This treaty would fix rights of Canadian and American fishermen in boundary waters, affecting principally commercial fishermen along the Great lakes and in New England. This treaty also failed of ratification at the last session of congress.

Another dispute with Canada to be settled by treaty is to regulate commercial power site uses of Niagara Falls.

For years the two countries have negotiated and had commissions working, also with New York State, to preserve the Falls and yet permit use of its waters to generate electric power.

Operation of the La Folette seamen's law is also expected to result in more treaty making. Over a score of treaties bearing upon life saving labor and other shipping conditions are affected by the new law.

The postmaster general is negotiating a number of new postal conventions, reducing postage and parcel post rates, principally with Latin-American countries.

Other Pan-American treaties, with South and Central American countries, to extend commercial relations are under consideration.

OFF TO WASHINGTON, D. C. AFTER NATIONAL CONVENTION

A few days ago Mayor Noble received a letter from the Mayor of Dallas asking that a representative citizen of Snyder be sent with the Texas delegation to Washington City to meet the National Democratic Executive Committee to urge that the National Convention be held in Dallas.

After consultation with a number of men the mayor appointed Mr. J. P. Chambliss of the Snyder Signal to go with the crowd and take care of Snyder's prestige.

Mr. Chambliss left Wednesday evening for Dallas where he will line up with about 150 other representatives. They will make the trip over the Cotton Belt, leave Dallas December 3 at 9 a. m. by special train via Memphis, Birmingham, Atlanta, Chattanooga, Knoxville, Roanoke, Lynchburg arriving in Washington at 1 p. m., December 5th. The Convention will be in session Monday and Tuesday, December 7 and 8.

An Old Citizen Here.

Squire B. F. Wilks an old time citizen of Snyder, but now loaned for awhile to Post City was in Snyder Saturday visiting his son, C. W. Wilks, and incidentally paid an appreciated visit to the Signal editor. Bro. Wilks is a loyal Ex-Confederate veteran and always enjoys meeting old friends and recounting incidents of former years.

Mr. J. A. J. Jones one of the most solid citizens of the Fluvanna country and Mr. H. H. Haynes the popular and faithful station agent at Fluvanna were in Snyder Saturday and visited the Signal office.

AUTOMOBILE HITS FARMER'S HORSE

Last Saturday as Mr. T. H. Green was returning, riding horseback, to his home near Dermott, he was met by an automobile which ran into him and broke his horse's leg. The car bore the number of 422. The driver said his name was W. L. Jones and that he lived at Sweetwater.

Sheriff Merrell took the matter up with Sweetwater parties and is informed that such a man is not known there and that the number on the car is higher than that county goes. Mr. Merrell has learned from responsible sources that the man was not from Sweetwater but from Lubbock and that his name is not Jones. The sheriff has the correct name of the Lubbock owner of No. 422.

WILSON TO ASK LAW TO PUNISH FIRE PLOTTERS

Washington, D. C.—President Wilson's address to congress next week not only will treat upon greater preparedness for national defense, but will call to the attention of Congress to the explosions and fires in American industrial plants.

The President intends to recommend that the Sherman law be amended to include severe penalties for such restraints of trade. Any division in the ranks of American citizens whose sympathies with the warring belligerents may have led to excesses will be emphatically condemned as un-American by the President.

In several recent speeches the President has spoken of "America first" and called upon Americans to stand united. That he considered the situation of sufficient importance to bring to the attention of Congress however, had not generally been realized.

The President is expected to refer to the subject in his address in connection with a general statement that the United States can be really prepared only if all its citizens stand together and repel outside influences.

A. J. GRANTHAM BURNED TO DEATH

MANAGER OF LARGE MERCANTILE CONCERN AT GREGORY, TEXAS

SNYDER RESIDENT 25 YEARS

Active in County and City Affairs—Was Superintendent of Methodist Sunday School for 21 Years.

The people of Snyder were deeply shocked Thursday when a telegram was received here from B. A. Eubank, of Corpus Christi, which said: "Mr. A. J. Grantham burned to death this morning at 3 o'clock when their home burned. Burial this afternoon. Signed: B. A. Eubank."

Mr. Grantham was a resident of Snyder for about 25 years and moved from here to the Corpus Christi country about three years ago and has been manager of a large mercantile house at Gregory, Texas.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Grantham and two brothers, L. D. and Roscoe and a sister, Mrs. D. P. Strayhorn still live here.

A. J. Grantham was a prominent and active citizen. He served a term as County and District Clerk, was a member of the city council and of the board of school trustees for several years. He was superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School for twenty-one years and never missed being on hand every Sunday when in town.

He was engaged much of the time in merchandising and was manager of the Snyder Mercantile Company when that big institution was burned a few years ago.

The Signal joins the many friends of the sorrowing relatives in their bereavement.

COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD ELECTED

COMPOSED OF CITIZENS FROM OVER COUNTY, ONE MEMBER-AT-LARGE

DISCUSS PURCHASE OF POISON

Matter of Furnishing Poison for Eradication Purposes Referred to People of County.

The County Commissioners' Court was in session Monday. There were present County Judge C. R. Buchanan; Commissioners G. W. Brown, B. F. Dargitz and J. B. Autry. The Court proceeded to elect a county board of school trustees whose duty it will be to have general supervision of the educational affairs of the county. The new board consists of W. A. Kincanon of Snyder, W. B. Dane of Fluvanna, A. Rhoades of Ira, A. C. Tate of Hermleigh and E. C. Dodson for the county at large.

E. C. Dodson and A. C. Tate will hold their place until the general election of trustees in April 1916 and the other three members will hold office until the general election of trustees in April 1917.

Application was made to the Court with request that they purchase poison with which to kill prairie dogs and jack rabbits, but since the law does not command the court to incur this expense, the court preferred to have the matter carried to the people of the county to get the trend of public sentiment. To that end petitions are being circulated for signatures of citizens asking the Court to purchase the necessary poison for the extermination of the pests. The court adjourned without taking further action in the matter.

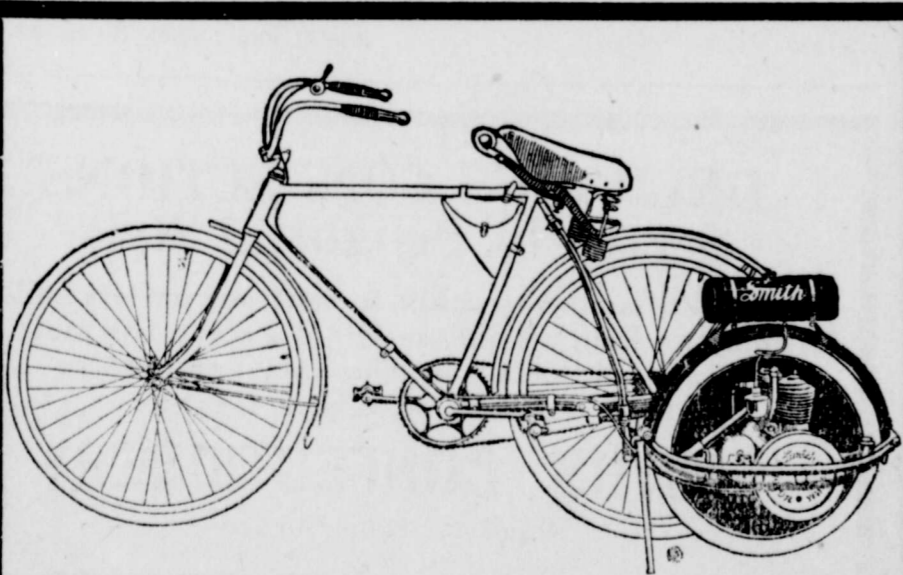

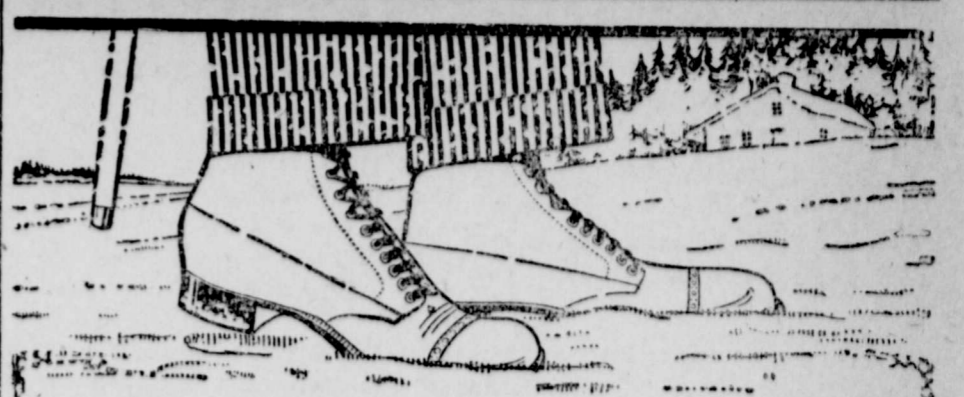

TOM WATSON IN COURT.

Thos. E. Watson of Thompson, Georgia, is on trial at Augusta in the Federal Court on indictment charging that he had in 1911 and 1912 sent obscene matter through the United States mail. Watson is editor of The Jeffersonian and has been making a hard fight against Catholicism. It was in certain strong editorials that he is accused of printing and mailing the objectionable language.

Watson is a lawyer and is acting as his own chief attorney in the case.

He assures the court and the jury that he had been for seven years making his fight against the Catholic church similar to that of Martin Luther, John Knox and other reformers known in history.

The prosecuting attorney said the reason the exact language complained of doesn't appear in the indictment is it is so obscene, vile and improper that it was not fit to be read in court. Watson said early in the case that the objectionable words were exact quotations from books on Roman Catholic religion. The jury is made up of middle aged men, none of whom are Catholics. Watson's articles have been read with much interest by readers of the Jeffersonian and the outcome of the trial will be watched for by thousands of people.

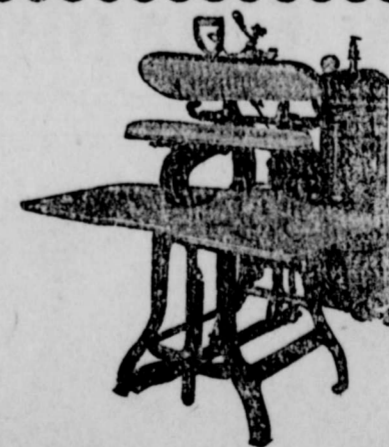

The county superintendent has no authority to excuse any one.

We extend our thanks to Superintendent Watson and the Snyder School Board for the privilege of using Mr. Watson and some of his ablest teachers on our program, and we have used this privilege unstintingly.

We insist that every teacher of the county make careful study of the program, and we expect and demand thorough preparation by each teacher of the particular work to which he is assigned on the program. Excuses are usually confessions of carelessness or weakness.

The chief purpose of the Institute is to raise the standard of teaching. Let's keep this in mind with an altruistic love for the profession and the great work in which we are engaged.

Where an order of the character referred to is presented to the Tax Collector without necessary revenue stamps attached and cancelled, the Tax Collector is forbidden to recognize it.

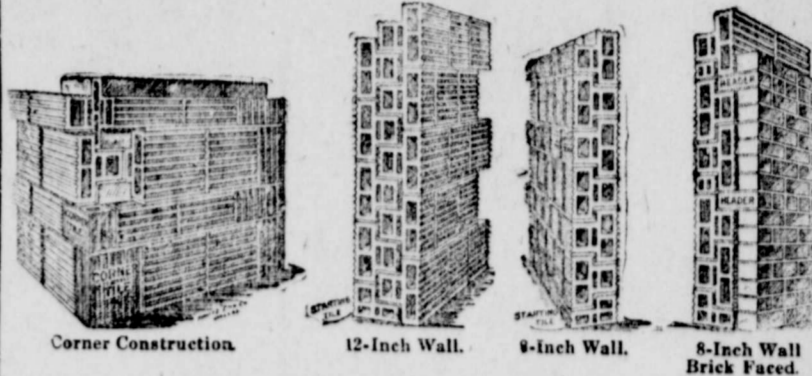

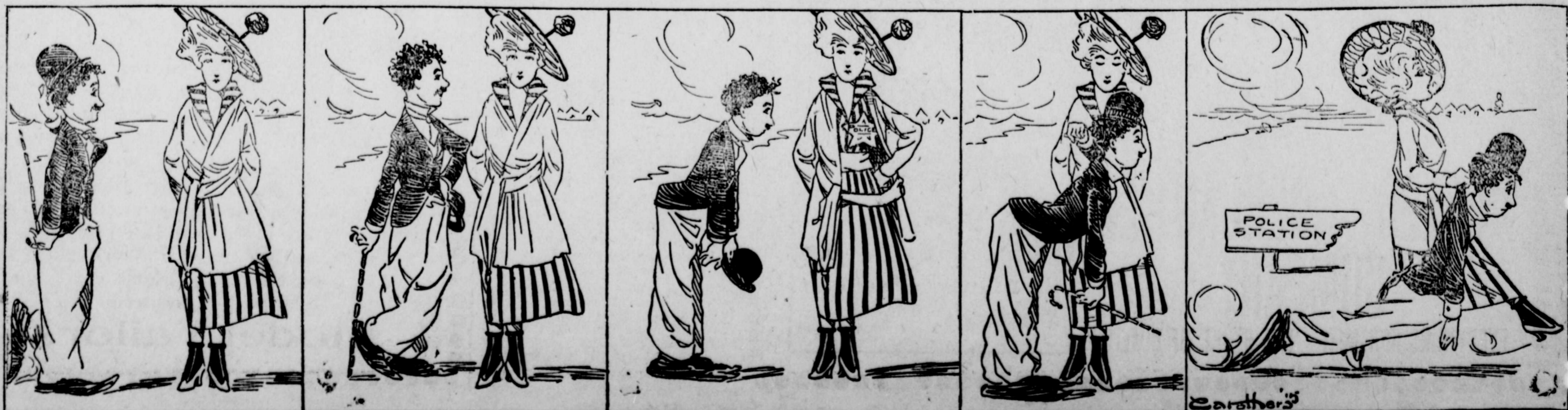

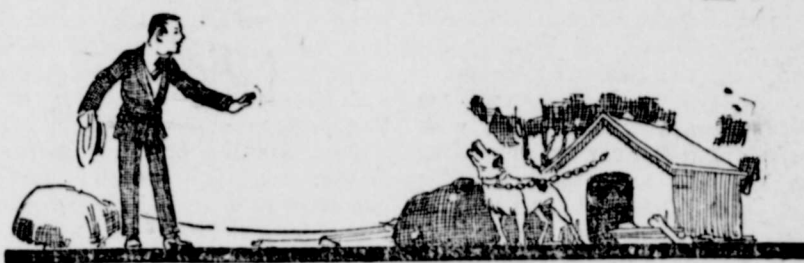

554 CASES OF DIPHTHERIA REPORTED IN STATE OF TEXAS

The Sanitary Report made by City and County Health Officers to the State Board of Health for the month of October shows 554 cases of Diphtheria.

59 Counties out of the 252 counties in the State made reports of contagious diseases. 53 counties reported Diphtheria. The largest number of cases in any one county was 41.

If 15,000 units of antitoxin on an average was given to each patient, 8,310,000 units were used during this month. At \$12.50 for 10,000 units (the usual price), this quantity of serum would cost the people of Texas \$10,387.50, but if bought under the new contract made by the State Board of Health in September, 1915, at \$4.00 per 10,000 units, costs only \$3,324, showing a saving of \$7,063.50.

The State Health Department, including the Maritime and Border Quarantine Service, costs the State \$4,220 per month, leaving a difference in favor of the tax payers' pockets of \$2,843.50.

Many people did not get the advantage of this saving as the plan of distribution has not become generally known.

By the State Board Contract, distributing stations were established in every County Seat and all those central points where a druggist would accept a contract. This serum is inspected and passed by the U. S. Inspectors, with the same care and precision used as in the case of other Laboratories which sell their products at three times the price. If the people care to save this loss, the state Board of Health has made it possible for them to do so.

Section 1. That prairie dogs are hereby declared to be a public nuisance, and the owners of lands in any county in this State upon which prairie dogs exist shall, within two years from the date this Act takes effect, kill, or cause to be killed, all dogs on land so owned by them.

Section 2. It is hereby made the duty of the county commissioners of

any county in which prairie dogs exist, to investigate and determine whether owners of lands in their respective commissioners' precincts have complied with the provisions of Section 1 of this Act, and if any such land owners have failed or refused to destroy the prairie dogs on their land, it shall be the duty of said commissioner to immediately notify the sheriff of his county of such failure, and the name and postoffice address of such owner, or his agent and said sheriff shall immediately mail, by registered mail, a notice to the said owner, or his agent, that if he shall

fail, within thirty days from and after the date of mailing of notice by sheriff, to comply with the terms of Section 1 of this Act, that the sheriff shall proceed to destroy all prairie dogs on said land.

Section 3.—After failure of any owner to comply with the provisions of Sec. 1 of this Act, and the terms ordered and said owner has not, within the time provided for in Section 2, destroyed said prairie dogs, it shall be the duty of said sheriff to immediately proceed to destroy the dogs on land of said owner, and to use the practical and economical meth-

ods in general use. And he shall report his action, together with an itemized bill of expenses under oath, to the first term of the commissioners court of said county, which court shall examine said account, and if found correct and reasonable, shall allow and cause the same to be paid, and, by its order duly entered, assess said amount against said owner and enter same as a lien against his land if being provided, however, that the commissioners' court may compensate the sheriff in the sum of not exceeding five dollars (\$5.00) per day for each and every day the sheriff shall have performed actual services in the matter of supervising the destruction of said prairie dogs.

Section 4. If the owner of any land against which said costs and expenses have been assessed by the commissioners court shall fail to pay the same within thirty days after notice of such assessment, it shall be the duty of the county attorney of such county to bring suit in any court of competent jurisdiction to enforce the payment of such costs and expenses; and the county attorney shall, in each suit brought by him for said purpose, be allowed a reasonable fee, to be fixed by the court trying the cause, which fee shall be taxed as costs in the case, and upon the rendition of any judgment for such costs and expenses, execution and order of sale shall issue and be executed as in cases of other judgments.

Section 5. All laws and parts of laws in conflict with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Section 6. The fact that prairie dogs are very damaging to the lands of West Texas and the near approach of the end of the session create an emergency justifying the suspension of the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days, and the same is hereby suspended, and that this Act take effect from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

(Note.) H. B. No. 28 passed the House May 25, no vote given. Passed the Senate, with amendments, May 26, no vote given. House concurred in Senate amendments May 27, no vote given.)

Approved June 3, 1915.
Effective 90 days after adjournment.

Presbyterian church and has lived a consistent member for more than fifty years. She was a faithful Christian. The husband, children and friends have the full assurance of her being called to her reward.

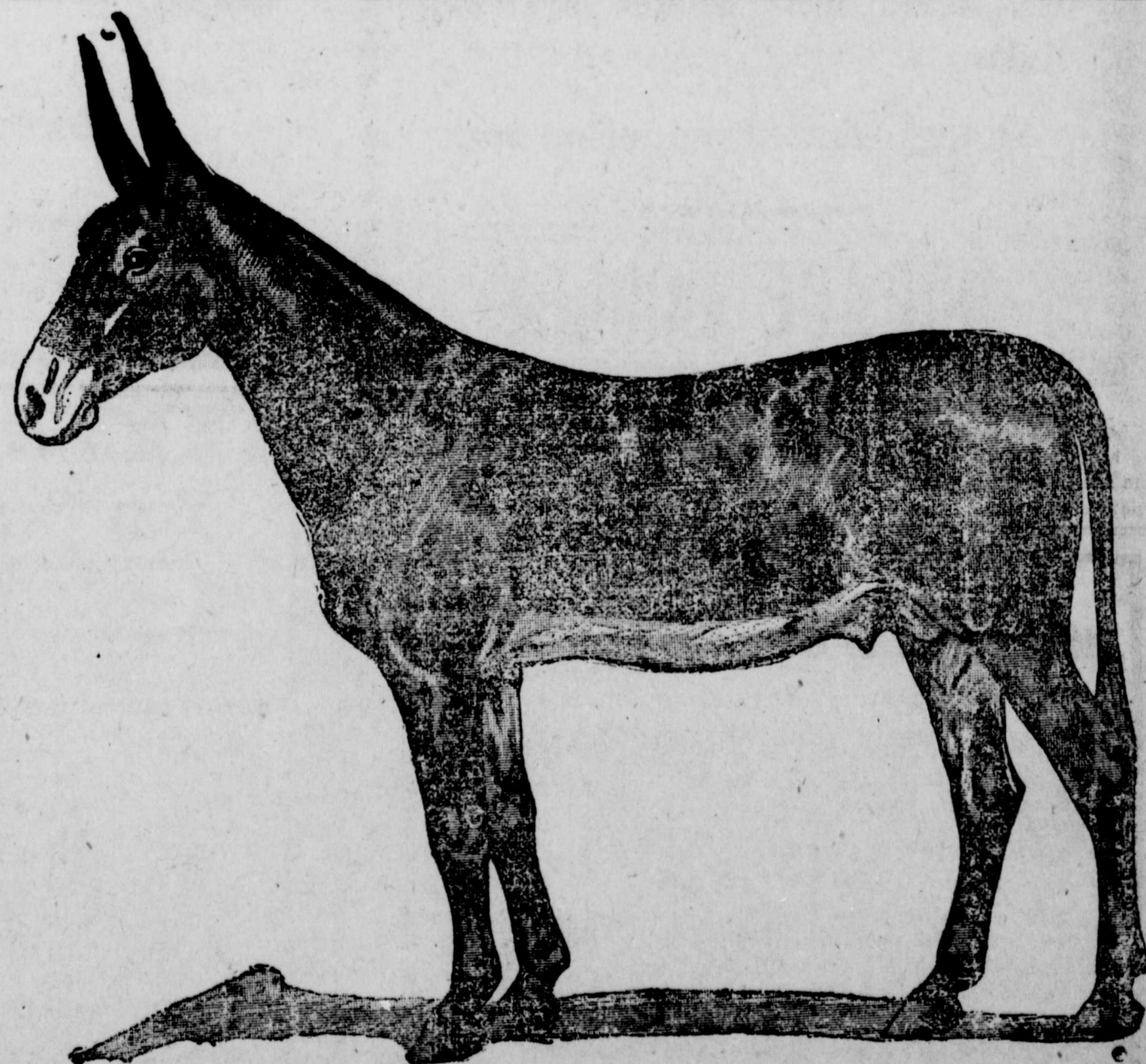

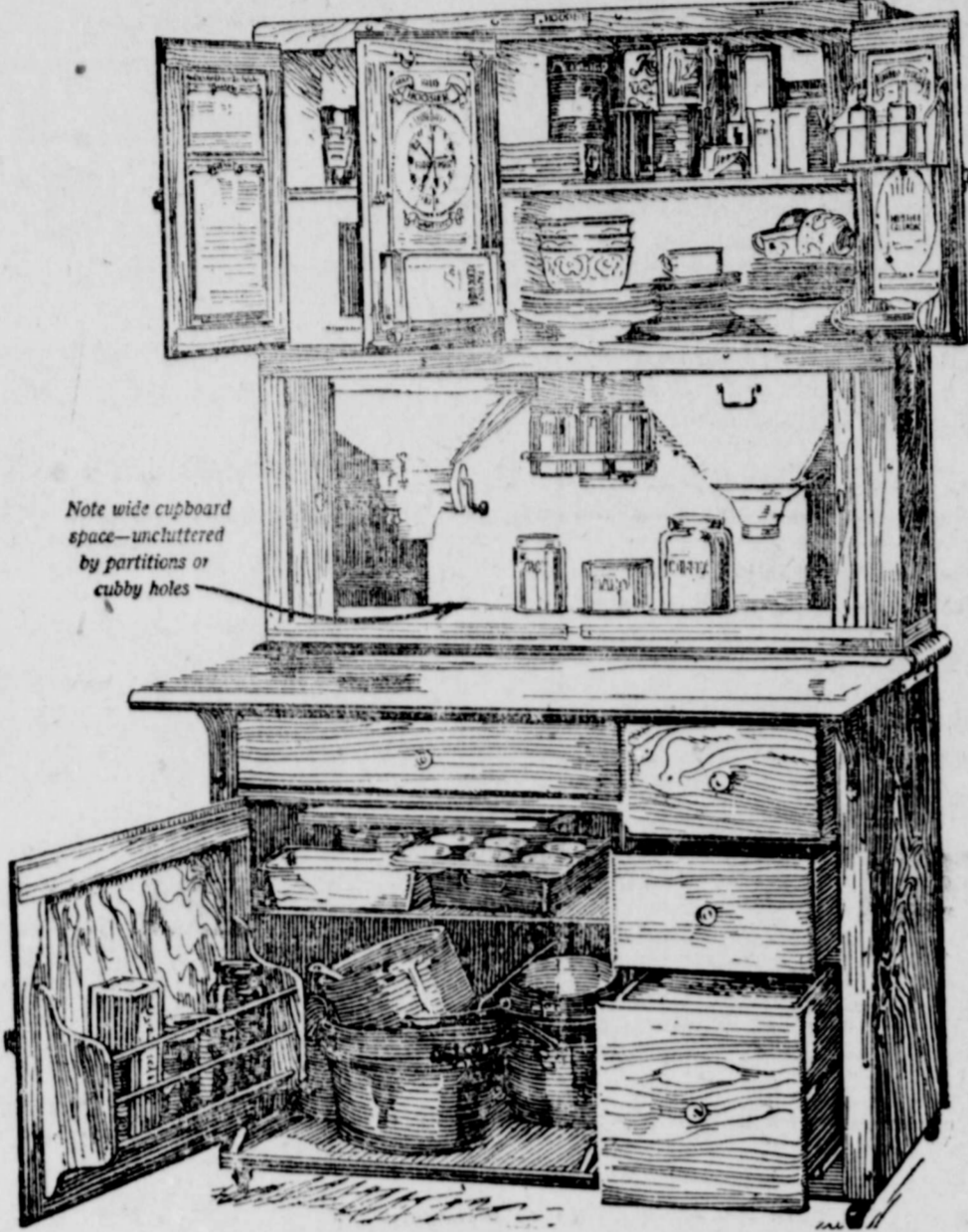

The Sunday Laws Should be Observed

Art. 302 PENAL CODE OF TEXAS. Selling goods on Sunday. Any merchant, grocer, or dealer in wares or merchandise, or trader, in any business what-so-ever, or the proprietor of any place of public amusement, or the agent or employe of any such person, who shall sell, barter, or permit his place of business or place of public amusement to be open for the purpose of traffic or public amusement on Sunday, shall be fined not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars.

This law applies to the operation of soda fountains, candy counters, cigar stands, confectioneries and barber shops, that is shaving and cutting hair. See Statutory exceptions, Art. 300 and 303.

I kindly ask that the Sunday laws be observed. If not, prosecution will be the result.
