| PRESIDENT GOES <br> to the people <br> A Man of Peace, Recognizes Possible War, Would Provide For National Defense. <br> President Wilson has met with some outspoken opposition and some half hearted halting withir his own party in congress to his plans fer National defense. His ideas have been misrepresented and distorted by crities who ought to know better as to his attitude. No man in the American government has done mere to keep this nation out of war than has President Wilson. Mr. Bryan, though less discreet, has not been a stronger advocate of peace, but Mr. Wilson is not blind to the fact that the time may come when the American people may be called to defend cur own shores against foreign enemies. The very fact that by strenuous efforts we have meintained neutrality during the struggle in Europe, has made us an object of dislike with both factions. As is the case in most all human activities the fellow who tries to be the friends of both sides is misunderstoed and misrepresented. He believes he knows the hearts of the American perple and has faith in | American virtue and patriotism. He has gone straight to the people to state his policy. He doesn't expect a war now, but insists that no man knows what may come tomorrew. He understands the feeling of foreign powers toward this nation. Germany is a resourceful and a resentful nation and is apt to harbor a disposition to harass us for supposed discriminations, and as an excuse to abuse our rights. England is jealous of the growth of American commerce and is apt to contend against our rights at sea. There are apt to be many points of difference and unless the United States is prepared to take care of herself it would be absurd to assert our moral rights. The Wilson administration has tried moral suasion, has tried humane reasoning, but Europe is war mad and as with the good old farmer, if gentle words have no effect, we ought to be in tosition to make positive demands and to enforce them if we must. <br> Mr. Wilson's speeches everywhere are being enthusiastically endorsed by the business world. He doesn't want war, he merely wants the country to be ready to defend her rights. Here are some of his expresions. "America is not afraid of anybody." "I know I reflect your feeling and | the feeling of all our citizens when I say the only thing I am afraid of is not being ready to perform my duty; I am fraid of the danger of shame; I am afraid of the danger of inadequacy; I am afraid of the danger of net being able to express the correct character of this country with tremendous might and effectiveness whenever we are called upon to act in the field of the world's affairs." <br> "Let me tell you very solemnly you can not postpone this thing,' <br> "I od not know what a single day may bring forth. I de not wish to leave you with the impression that I am thinking of some particular dangers. I merely wish to tell you that we are daily treading amidst intricate dangers. The dangers that we are treading amongst are not of our ewn making and not under our control. I think ne man in the United States knows what a single week, a single day, a single hour may bring forth." <br> "As your responsible servant, I must tell you that dangers are in finite and constant. I must tell the people new circumstances have arisen which make it adequately necessary that this country prepare herself for war, not for anything that smacks of | aggression, but for adequate netional defense." <br> "Let me tell vou solemnly, you can not post pone this thing. We are, tread ing amidst intricate dangers." <br> "No man in the United States knows what a single week, a singe day, or a single hour may bring ferth." <br> "Have you made yourselves ready to stand behind your government for the maintenance of the honor of the country?" <br> "When the world is on fire, how much time do you want to take to get ready?" <br> "We must train and equip at once a very considerable body of men." <br> "I know peace costs something.
