"The Rev. R. M. Hardman was were spent in Clarksburg, West Va., where he received his preliminary edtime in Virginia. He was bound apprentice for four years, under Major Cooper, Editor Clarksburg, "Conservative," to the "Art Preservative." He came into Iowa in 1868; worked on the "Post" in Chicago in 1871 and also in Milwaukee, on the "Evenin Wisconsin." Later published the "Dundee Enterprise," Dundee, Michigan. Was married to Sarah Adeline Blackburn in 1873. They removed to Nebraska in 1879, where he was editor and proprietor of the "Minden Gazette." Also published the second paper on Military Reservation, Newark, Kearney county, Neofficial paper of Kearney county. Was at this period in his life that he took Holy Orders in the Protestant Episcopal church and was ordained to the diaconate by Bishop Talbot, by Bishop Leonard, in 1899, after which he spent ten years in the Missionary work in South Dakota. Came to All Saint's Church in Cameron in February 1915, Rev. Hardman graduated from the National University. He was a regular enlisted soldier Chicago, now Polyteneck School in in Co. C. 2nd. 

TAKING OF SCHOOL CENSUS SCHEDULED TO START MARCH 1

Austin, Feb. 12.-Taking of the scholastic census in Texas will commence March 1, according to announcement made by W. F. Doughty, state superintendent of public instruc tion, and it is expected that the scholastics in Texas will reach 2,200,000 which would make an increase of 1,070,000 over the present number,

This abnormal increase is due to the passage of the Thirty-fourth legislature of the compulsory education

Dr. Duncan was by no means the first to see the need of a safe depository for the savings of the people, for several others as high minded, but not so practical, had theretofore attempted to establish savings banks, but in their zeal to make the proposition attractive, combined features that smacked of charity, and therefore failed as business ventures. As early as 1798 the "Wendover Bank" was instituted by the Rev. Joseph Smith, who with two rich parishioners agreed to receive sums on deposit and repay the same at Christmas with a bonus of one-third the amount deposited. ganized a society to receive certain sums on deposit monthly, according to age and to pay the same as a pension after sixty years of age. THIS COUNTRY SOON MUST FINANCE ITSELF

People Should Realize Thrift at Home Is Necessary.

One hundred years ago the first savings bank in the United States was established. The advent of this institution came with the era of commercial and industrial expansion. It came when the population of the United States was only 9,500,000, and there were but 246 banks in the country. By 1820 ten of these savings banks had been established with 8,635 depositors and aggregate deposits of \$1,138,576.

Prosperity came, the people saved and the deposits in these great reservoirs of capital, which now number 2,100, by leaps and bounds increased to enormous proportions. To-day, with our national wealth approximating \$187,000,000,000 and almost one hundred millions of people in the country, we have about \$4,700,000,000 in the savings banks belonging to ten and a half million depositors. This may seem an amazing sum of capital and number of depositors, but when a comparison is made with other countries and a balance is struck it is found the United States is near the end of the list in the percentage of savers to pop-

The possibilities for the greater promotion of habits of thrift and saving among people are indeed extraordinary. With remarkable opportunities in the United States for increasing foreign trade; with bumper crops in every section of the country; with gold pouring into the coffers of the banks; with every appearance of unprecedented future prosperity, the fact is apt to be disregarded that the other great commercial nations of the world are involved in a war of frightful destruction and economic waste; that after the war these nations will need

funds for reconstruction and the United States will be called upon to supply them; that for some time to come this country will not be able to secure capital, as in the past, from France and Great Britain, for the purpose of carrying on new enterprises. The United States must finance itself. No fear need be had for the imme-

diate future, but it is inevitable that the time is coming when this country must meet the test of financing prac tically the entire world. Preparations are being made for defense in the event of war; preparations should also be made for peace. Adequate credit machinery can be developed and perfected, but it will assuredly require a sufficient amount of capital to maintain properly and keep in good running | the best advantage. condition this credit machinery.

DON'T BE EXTRAVAGANT.

"Live Within Your Income," Keynote of Nationwide Thrift Movement.

"Live within your income" is the keynote of the great nation wide thrift movement, and be not so wasteful.

The strength of Rome lay not in the time when Romans were extravagantiy spending their millions in feasts and games; when people were flocking from the country to the city; when Romans were too lazy even to play their own games, but hired gladiators not only to play, but to die, for their amusement; it lay not in the time when the young Roman millionaires spent their time at the baths and in feeding on nightingales' tongues and on oysters brought in wet moss from the shores of Britain; when \$175,000 was paid for roses at a feast, and when her citizen soldiery was replaced by hirelings, but in the time when the Roman farmer was its citizen and statesman and deposit one-third his income each depended not upon the hired others, month in a savings bank that pays but opon bimself, for performing the duties of the family and the state.

LAUNCH NATION WIDE SAVINGS CAMPAIGN.

Waste of Money Means Waste of Human Energy.

One hundred years ago there was no bank that encouraged the thrifty housewife who wanted some safer place for small sums than the top bureau drawer or an old sugar bowl, to deposit her little hoard and draw interest on it until she was ready to use it.

But in 1816 the first Savings Bank in the United States was started, and during 1916 the American Bankers Association will conduct a national Thrift Campaign through its Savings Bank

Savings banks now number their women depositors by the thousand, but there are still many opportunities for thrift which women must be encouraged to use if the United States is to be the thriftiest instead of the most prodigal nation in the world. For national thrift has its basis in home thrift and waste of money in home management means waste of the human energy it takes to earn money.

So the bankers are urging the establishment of school savings banks for teaching girls, as well as boys, how to save their pennies and how to spend them wisely. They are urging parents to give their girls regular allowances and teach them how to keep simple accounts. To the Y. W. C. A. in its wellplanned movement for thrift among girls and business women, the bankers are supplying speakers and helping with the distribution of the excellent personal account books which the Association has prepared. They are also cooperating with the National Housewives League, domestic science teachers, women's clubs and other agencies that have as their object the teaching of home economics, self-organization and development.

For thrift does not mean simply the saving of money. Genuine Home thrift means managing the home so well that none of the Father-energy it takes to earn money, or none of the Mother-energy it takes to spend it, is wasted by foolish purchases, extravagant housekeeping or niggardly economy. It is not the thrifty housekeeper who scrimps on the table, wears frumpy clothes or goes without wholesome pleasures for the mere sake of having a bank account. Real thrift should mean better-balanced and therefore more nourishing meals, the buying of better clothes because they last longer, and investing in labor-saving devices which leave the homemaker free for rest and recreation with her family. Get Full Value Out of Labor Another Problem.

Your job depends upon two things: First, the profitableness of the business; and second, your efficiency. If the business is not remunerative it annot long exist, and the inefficient workman is soon eliminated by the processes of competition and supervi-

The principal cost in all business is the labor and material cost, and the problem of business is to get full value out of labor and cut out all waste of material. The thriftless workman can waste as much as he produces, and do it so unconsciously that it may not be detected without expensive checking. A fifty-pine-cent article can be wrapped so expensively that the profit disappears. Paper and twine is often used so thriftlessly by department store employees that when delivery is made the profit is cut in two. These are the little leaks that waterlog the business ship. The employee must realize the fact that he is one of a great

number and if he allows little wastes

in material, or "soldiers" just a few

minutes each day, in the aggregate the

loss is enormous. A few years ago there was a wreck on a western railroad that cost the company \$250,000. The president sent word down the line that as a special favor to him he wanted each man in the company's employ to endeavor to save five cents' worth of material a day, or do five cents' worth of work more a day than theretofore, and the loss would be made good in a year. The problem of all big concerns is to get the men in this frame of mind constantly-no loitering on the job and no waste in the job.

Big concerns everywhere are giving much thought to the elimination of the waste and utilization of all the byproducts. Chicago is famous for using all the pig but the squeal. The Pennsylvania Railroad requires that every bolt and nut that can be retapped be used. You will find no waste iron around their yards. Even the cotton waste used in wiping engines is cleaned and used for packing journals. In the South the stumps of yellow pine, heretofore a nuisance and an encumbrance to the land, are now turned into resin, turpentine and other by-pred-

Thrift In the Office.

Large employers of office help are confronted with the problem of keeping down the cost of office supplies. As a corrective, a new eraser is not given until the metal center of the old one is returned. The stump of the old pencil is an order for a new one. Ink is kept in nonevaporating wells.
