





WILLIAM JENNINGS BRYAN. ABiographical Sketch.

(Compiled by F. V. C.) W. J. Bryan, American political

leader, was born March 19, 1860, at Salem, Marion county, Ill. His father who was a lawyer and from 1860 to 1897 a state circuit judge was a native Virginian, Silas Lillard Bryan.

W. J. Bryan graduated from Illinois College in 1881, and from Union College of Law Chicago in 1883; during his course he studied in the law office of Lymon Trumbull.

He practiced law at Jacksonville from 1883 to 1887, when he removed to Lincoln, Nebraska. There he became conspicuous both as a lawyer and as a politician, attracting particular attention by his speeches during the presidential campaign of 1888 on behalf of the candidates of the Democratic party.

From 1891 to 1895 he represented the First Congressional District of Nebraska, in the National House of Representatives, and received the un. usual honor of being placed on the important Committee on Ways and Means during his first term. He was a hard and conscientious worker and became widely known for his ability in debate. In a campaign largely restricted to the question of free-silver coinage, he was defeated for re-election in 1894, and subsequently was also defeated as the Democratic candidate for the United States senate.

In the Democratic National Convention at Chicago, in 1896, during a long and heated debate with regard to the party platform, Bryan, in ad. vocating the "plank" declaring for the free coinage of silver, of which he was the author, delivered a celebrated speech containing the passage "You shall not press down upon the brow of labor this crown of thorns; you shall not crucify mankind upon a cross of gold."

This speech made him the idol of the "silver" majority of the convention and brought him the Democratic nomination for the presidency on the following day. In the election, however, he was defeated by William McKinley, the Republican candi. date, receiving 176 electoral votes to 271

But though defeated he remained the leader of his party. During the Spanish-American war he was Colonel of the 3rd Nebraska Volunteers, though he saw no active service.

His ability, sincerity of character, and wide information, and his attitude towards the new issues arising from the war, in which he took the side opposed to "imperialism" in ed his following. In 1900 he was nominated for the presidency and again defeated by McKinley receiving only 155 electoral votes to 192. After the 1900 election he established and edited at Lincoln a weekly political journal, The Commoner, which attained a wide cir. culation. In 1905-1906 he made a trip round the world, and in London was cordially received as a great American orator. He was again nominated for the presidency by the Democratic party in 1908. After a heated contest Mr Bryan again suffered a decisive defeat. President Taft securing 321 electoral votes to Mr. Bryan's 162. His subsequent history is familiarly known to Signal readers.

COTTON FUTURES BILL PASSED BY HOUSE

Washington, April 28 .--- The Lever Cotton Futures Bill was adopted by the House late today by an overwhelming vote as an amendment to the pending agricultural bill. The bill is a slightly amended duplicate of the one held unconstitutional by the New York Federal Court last year because as a revenue measure it did not originate in the House.

Speedy action on the measure was caused by the adoption of a special rule, by a vote of 184 to 86, to force consideration of the administration legislation program. The rule would allow little more than five hours' debate on the grain grading, Federal warehouse and cotton futures propos_ als. Still more drastic rules for consideration of other administration measures are being considered.

The cotton futures proposal was adopted in the committee of the whole, 101 to 23, after spirited debate. It is almost identical with the former cotton futures law which was held unconstitutional by Judge Hough of New York on the ground that it was a revenue bill which had improperly originated in the Senate instead of the House. Under its provisions a tax of 2c a pound would be levied on all cotton sold for future delivery in any exchange, board of trade, or "similar institution or place of business."







PRESENT CROP CON-DITIONS AND PROSPECTS

Dallas, Texas, April 29.-From reports received within the past week by the Texas Industrial Congress from bankers, newspaper publishers, commercial secretaries, and other business men in one hundred and fifty of the agricultural counties of the state, based upon interviews with the best informed farmers in their respective localities, it appears that there are only a few counties in which the cotton acreage is not great er than that of last year.

The great majority of counties are planting an acreage equal to that of 1914, and some are breaking out new land. Owing to the scarcity and high price of seed, the planting is thinner than usual, but this may prove of little importance in the stand, the difference probably not being equal to the number of plants cut out in chopping. If the season is favorable and there are no unusually heavy ravages of insect pests, Texas may expect a crop of four and one half million bales or more, as in 1914, instead of the three million bales of 1915. 


