

6th. That an instructor be employed at a salary not to exceed the income of the association membership fees, less operating expenses.

7th. That regular gatherings of mer bers be designated, governed by weather conditions, etc, and a record of the proceedings including the num ber in attendance be made to the executive committee by the instructor employed.

8th. That members be allowed to serve on care of grounds to apply on membership fees.

Railroad Man Dies on Train


