

MPD scores major drug bust

Muleshoe Police arrested a Lubbock man and a Portales, N.M. couple Sunday night and seized drugs with an estimated street value of \$8,000-\$10,000 during a routine traffic stop on U.S. Highway 84.

Police found 112 grams of methamphetamines, five grams of cocaine and \$7,500 in cash in a car being driven by Gerald "Pete" Green, 36, of Portales.

Also arrested were his live-in girlfriend, Laquita Darlene Dillinger, 37, and Christopher Lynn Welch, 25, of Lubbock. All three were charged with possession of a control substance with

intent to distribute, a first-degree felony punishable by five to 99 years in jail and up to a \$10,000 fine.

Bail for all three was set Monday at \$25,000.

Traveling east on U.S. 84, the vehicle was originally stopped shortly after 9 p.m. near the city limit sign for driving without headlights and failure to maintain a single lane.

Muleshoe Police Chief Rick Henegar said both Green and Dillinger, who was in the passenger's seat, were obviously intoxicated and acted suspiciously when questioned.

Police observed a scanner and a

black bag containing the cash.

Dillinger, listed as the owner of the 1985 Ford LTD, gave consent to search the vehicle. Patrolman Richard Wills found the drugs in a sock in the woman's purse.

Also found was an electronic rolodex with a list of customers and money owed and several crack cocaine pipes.

Henegar described the suspects as mid-level dealers and heavy personal users. At the time of their arrest, Green and Dillinger were out on bond on

House backs bill to reactivate weevil program

AUSTIN—The Texas House Monday tentatively approved bill that would revive the state's boll weevil eradication program that was halted last month.

The bill allows the Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation to continue running the program to rid the state's cotton fields of the boll weevil.

The program will be operated under the supervision of the state agriculture commissioner after the supreme court ruled it was unconstitutional because the 1993 legislature delegated too much authority to a private entity.

Under the bill, the commissioner must approve the foundation's operating budget and give approval before it can borrow money. The commissioner will also conduct board elections for the foundation and referendums to establish zones.

In addition, the commissioner will propose the assessments that will be imposed on farmers. The bill also bars the foundation from destroying a farmer's crop for failing to pay the assessment.

The bill establishes six statutory zones in the state, including two on the High Plains.

An election for the Northern High Plains zone, which includes Bailey and Parmer counties, has not been scheduled.

The bill faces another vote in the House before it can be returned to the Senate.

The bill must be passed by June 2, the final day of the 1997 legislative session.

School Board approves salary increase for teachers

The Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District Monday approved an across-the-board salary increase for teachers during its regular bi-monthly meeting.

All current MISD teachers will receive an additional \$1,000 per year as part of their contract renewals for the 1997-98 school year.

According to MISD Superintendent Bill Moore, the district increases teachers' salaries each year as part of the State's step increase program.

"For every year of experience they teach, teachers generally get an increase (in salary)," Moore said.

Teachers last year received a salary increase of \$1,250, but additional days were also added to the school calendar.

Board members focused most of the discussion on events in Austin that could affect teachers' salaries in the future.

State Comptroller John Sharp recently told the Texas legislature of a \$1 billion surplus in tax revenue collected by the state, which could be placed in the education budget.

Moore believes placing that much added revenue into the education budget could cause teacher's salaries to increase dramatically, leaving local districts in a bind when the surplus runs out.

"It's like trying to make car payment from your saving account," Moore said. "You can only do it for so long before you run out of money."

MISD sponsoring summer food program

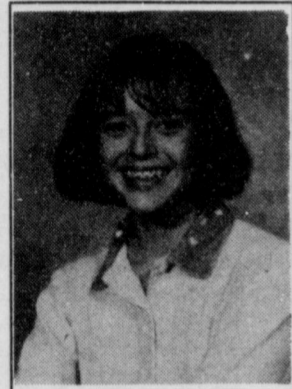
The Muleshoe Independent School District will sponsor a summer food service program from June 5 - July 2nd. All children age one to 18 years are eligible.

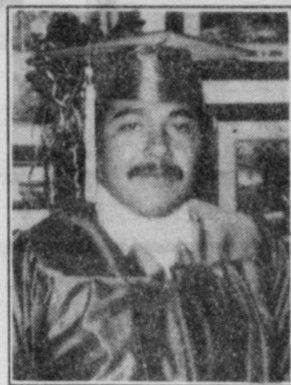

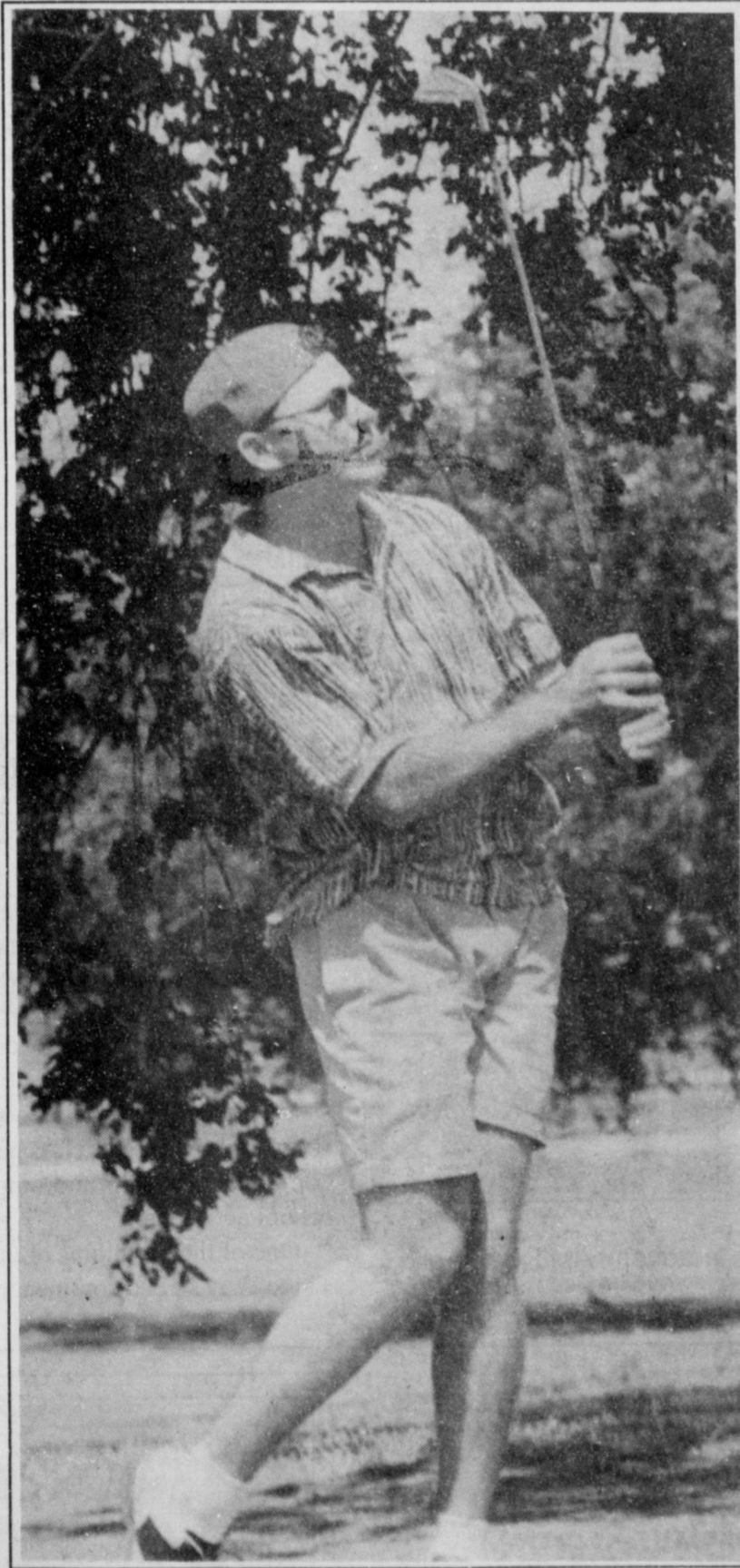

She is a two-year member of the National Honor Society, serving as vice-president her junior year.

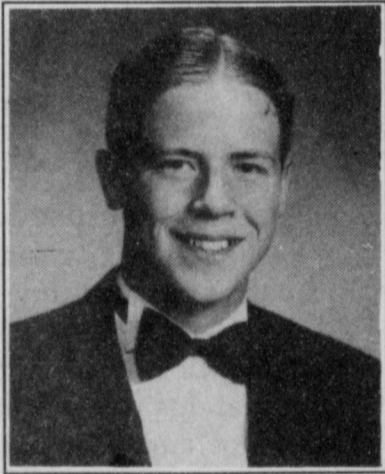
Foster has been named to the honor roll all four of her years. She has received the top student award in a variety of classes.

Mimms participated in many University Interscholastic events in his four years at LHS, winning a state title in accounting his freshman year.

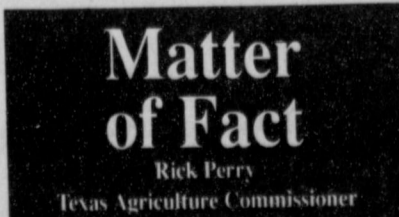
Mimms played varsity basketball the past two years, and is a four-year member of the varsity tennis team.

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Combest disappointed state CRP acres slashed

WASHINGTON, D.C. — U.S. Rep. Larry Combest (R-Texas) expressed displeasure with the shifting Conservation Reserve Program acres from Texas and the reduction in the total number of accepted acres nationally.

Only 16.1 million acres of environmentally sensitive farm land will be accepted into the CRP program,

"As the USDA carries out its plan to reduce CRP acreage across our nation, I will hold USDA accountable to answer the questions of those who will ultimately feel the brunt of these decisions," Combest said.

On May 22, the USDA announced that it would enroll only 16.1 million of the "most environmentally sensitive acres" in the popular, and effective Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). This despite the fact that Congress had authorized the enrollment of an additional 25 million, and the USDA's own budget called for the enrollment of 19 million acres. "I would contend that a

greater environment and economic benefit could be seen by more people if the USDA were to enroll additional acres, as the Congress directed," claimed Combest.

As Chairman of the House Subcommittee on Forestry, Resource Conservation, and Research, Combest has scheduled a hearing for June 11 to examine the effects of the recent announcement. "I will require the USDA to justify in very specific terms why certain parcels of land were chosen over others. At my request the USDA has agreed to conduct another sign-up before the year's end. I intend to receive specific suggestions that can be used by West Texas Farmers to allow those acres that truly need protection to be accepted in this second sign-up."

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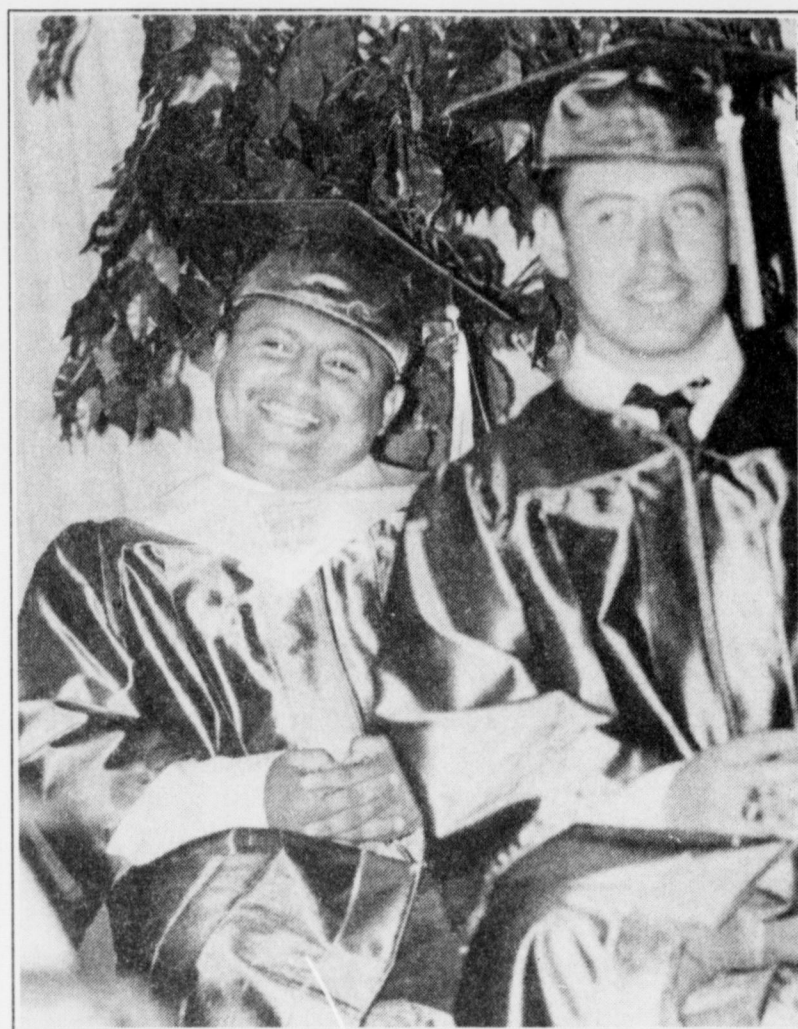

LUBBOCK — Announcement of the results of the 15th Conservation Reserve Program Sign-Up have left many observers less than thrilled at the results. With expectations high, the acceptance of bids on only 1.7 million acres in Texas will no doubt disappoint many individuals. Texas landowners submitted bids on some 3.2 million acres. The 53 percent acceptance rate for Texas bids means a considerable number of CRP contracts will expire this year. Percentage-wise, regional CRP levels changed very little. An example of this is the fact that

the Southern Plains area had 15 percent of the old CRP enrollment and this new CRP enrollment figure is 14 percent of the total. "The fact that overall funding was significantly reduced for this Sign-Up was a major factor in the reduction in the number of bids accepted," notes PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "Also the heavier reliance on the Environment Benefits Index played a major role in which bids were ultimately accepted or rejected." The Texas High Plains fared about average say PCG officials. Unfortunately, the area's

58 percent acceptance rate was only slightly better than the rest of the State and there were significant reductions in some Counties. Overall, the 25 County area surrounding Lubbock submitted bids on just over 1.7 million acres. The area had just over 1 million acres accepted into the new CRP Program. Legislation designed to address problems with the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Program is slowly making its way through the Texas Legislature. With Senate approval already in hand the ball shifts to the House Of Representatives where lawmakers will work to finalize the current legislation.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 302 Main Street, Muleshoe, TX 79347.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P.O. Box 13528, Austin, Texas 78711-3528.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

USUAL DEADLINE

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

SPECIAL DEADLINES

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usual February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

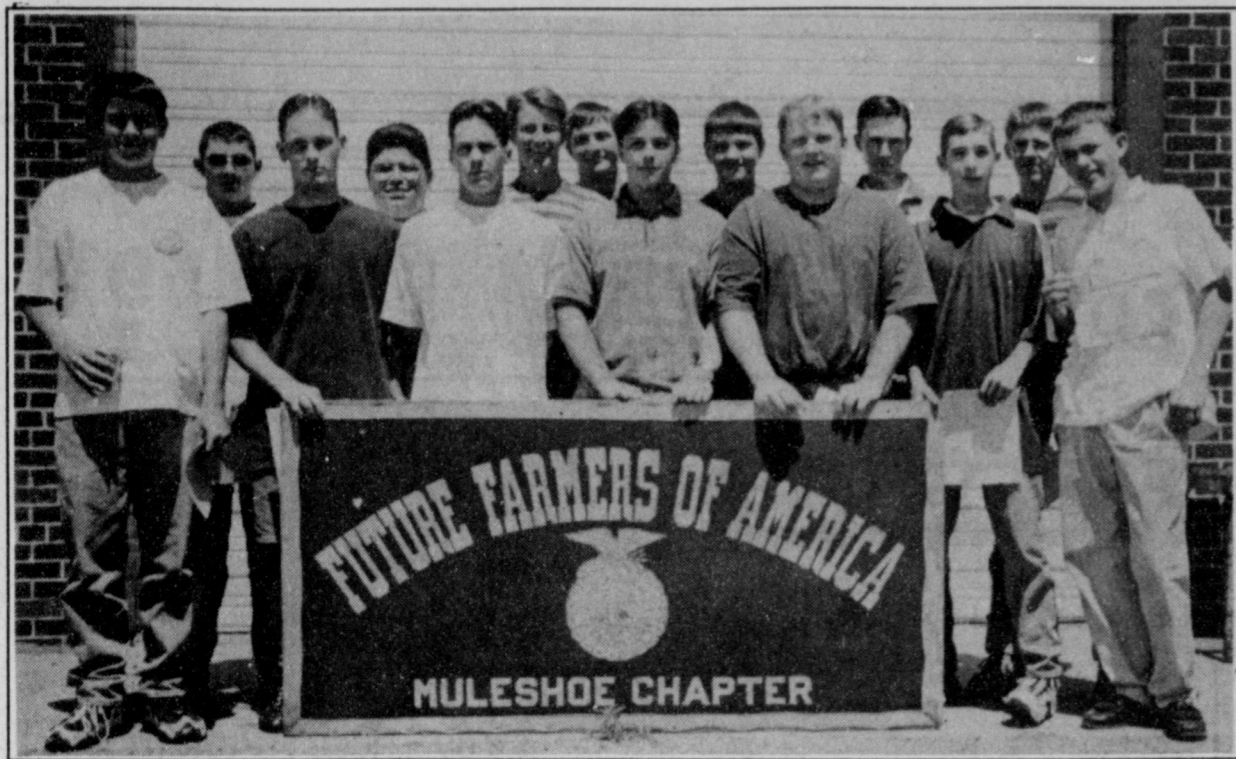

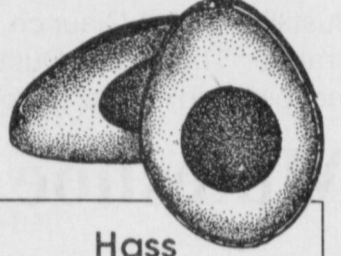

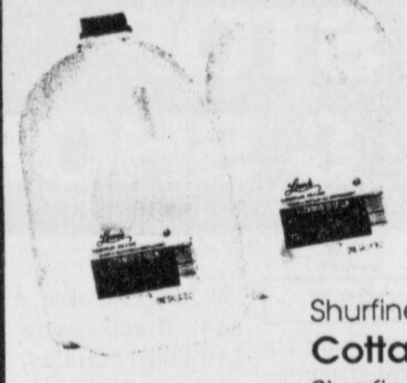
