The name of the next war loan will be "the victory Liberty loan," Secretary Giass announced today. The exact date in the spring when iff's to be floued has not been fixed

The honor flag of the loan will bear a blue "V" on a white field surrounded by a red border, the "V" indicating both five and victory.

About \$0,000 German helmets, captured by General Pershing: troops and some new ones taken from the storehouses behind the lines, and some battered relics of the battlelds, have been ordered by Frank

R. Wilson, director of Liberty loan publicity for distribution in the fifth Liberty loan campaign.

This Victory bond is put: orted to be the last war bond issue and it is necessary to raise about \$6,009,960,-000 to meet the expenses of retarning the soldiers to their respective homes.

The Scurry county quota will be announced fully ten days before the campaign begins. Extreme methods will be pursued to sell the required amount.
