Huntireds of Texas soldiers, wounded or ill, lying in the big army hospitals of New York City, receive their first special welcome and their first hint of home calls made on them by volunteer women workers at the Texas desk in the Hall of States. Backed only by the Texas Club of New York and the South-ern Society, these women are trying to do as well by Texans who reach New York on their way home as other states are doing for their sons other states are doing for their sons with the aid of large appropriations. Kansas is spending \$35,000 to welcome her boys, Massachusetts \$50,000, and other states smaller amounts. The Texas women say they have received no financial aid from the state even toward the clerical work of writing to two or three hundred Texas fighters they have found in the hospitals here.

These letters, sent out under a plan devised by War Camp Community Service, are the first words from home to reach the wounded boys as a rule. The women invite the lads to visit their headquarters Hall of States or. in the cases of the severely wounded, they

How they rush for the home papers. Some of them need more practical aid, some are "blue," some need a job back home, some want to trace lost families. To all of these the Texan women given help. Sometimes they take a "blue" lad home to dinner and then to the theatre, sometimes they get their men folks to talk to them. A few days ago, newspaper staff writers startled us with announce ment that Carranza was lining up South American states against the United States, then in a day or two the announcement comes that Venetions with Texas and other American points. It being sow to look like much of the apparents strained relations between the United States and Mexico is special propaganda sent out by somebody that wants to bring on trouble. Of course we all feel that Carranza has been antagonistic toward this country and that he was so, because of the poisonous influence of Germany, but he must know that now, he could in no wise stand up against any sort of American demonstration. He ouht to know that friendship and co-operation with this country will sooner bring prosperity and stability to Mexico, and we are slow to believe that he is seeking a belligerent alliance to oppose us. There may yet develop a spirit of greed here with purpose to encroach on Mexico with demands for rights and concession that would breed resentment and lead up to a breag of relations, in order to base an excuse for intervention. Such a movement, if existent, is not in the mind of our government, but is being nurtured by ambitious exploiters who have covetous eyes on the undeveloped resources of Mexico.

"We are quick to guard the industrial interests of our community of seeking to establish and maintain industrial plants within its bounds.



We should be no less solicitous to guard the investments of our community," said Robt H. Chrnutte of the First National Bank today. "If an industry, however small, plans to move to another community, our businessmen and bankers would use every effort to induce its owners to remain. They want its wages to continue to go to local merchants, to buy local homes, and to build up saving accounts. Such business loss directly affects the community's business prosperity.

"Yet when sharpers, dishonest prromoters and stock jobbers begin to unload utterly worthless stock and bonds of wild cat companies on our people we make no organized effort to keep them from taking our capital, wages and savings out of our cemmunity Instead of protecting our citizens we are likely to allow these sharpeas to ply their trade so long as they do not run afoul of the criminal law.

One of the favorite means of mulching the small investor today is to induce those who have put their savings into War Saving Stamps and other Government securities and transfer their funds into worthless papers. The community, to protect its capital and its property, should organize, if not to punish the sharpers, at least to educate its citizens as to the value of their Government securities and as to the risk of entrusting their money to strangers glib of tongue and unscrupulous in promise and prospectus. Com. munities who fail to do this fail to realize that some thirty million of people own Government securities but really know very little about the nature or value of bonds and how use them.

"The 'Baby bonds', The War Saving Stamps are particularly the targets of the vendors of worthless stocks and of stamp scalpers. Owners of these War Saving Stamps ough to know that they are as good as gold and can be readily redeamed for full value, plus interest todate, on ten days' notice at any post office. The scalper, however, even attempts to convince owners of these Stamps that their security has fallen in value in some strange fashion, despite the fact that the stamps can never go below their par value plus the interest accrued today. A favorite trick is to tell persons who have one or more Stamps in a 1918 certificate that these Stamps are valueless unless the certificate is filled with twenty stamps. They then offer to buy these Stamps at a cash discount, or to exchange them for worthless stocks,

"The truth is that War Saving Stamps are as good as gold whether you have one Stamp or one hundred Stamps. The Government on maturity will pay five dollars for the single stamp in a certificate just as readily as it will pay \$100 for twenty of them. Similar arguments are used by the scalpers to discredit the 25 cent Thrift Stamps.

"Where banks, merchants, businessmen and other community leaders fail to make clear to everyone in the community how good Government securities is to hold, they are simply allowing their citizens to be cheated, and are cheating themselves out of investments which ought to be making good business for local business.

"Meats in Storage"

Every working day of the year 75,000,000 pounds of meat are required to supply home and export needs-and only 10 per cent of this is exported.

These facts must be kept in mind when considering the U.S. Bureau of Markets report that on June 1, 1919, there were 1,348,000,000 pounds of meats in cold storage. If the meat in storage was placed on the market it would only be 20 days' supply.

This meat is not artificially withheld from trade channels to maintain or advance prices.

Meats in storage consist of-

- per cent (approximate) hams, bacon, etc., in process of curing. It takes 30 to 90 days in pickle or salt to complete the process.
- per cent is frozen pork that is to be cured later in the year.
- per cent is lard. This is only four-fifths of a pound per capits, and much of it will have to go to supply European needs.
- per cent is frozen beef and lamb, part of which is owned by the Government and was intended chiefly for over-seas shipment. If this were all diverted to domestic trade channels, it would be only 11/2 lbs. per capita—a 3 days' supply.

From this it will be seen that "meats in storage" represent merely unfinished goods in process of curing and the working supply necessary to assure the consumer a steady flow of finished product.



It is now made plain through German papers that it has been their purpose to not sign the treaty until they should have tried to get their Hohenzollerns back and see if they could restore the old monarchy. SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT RATI-FIED BY TEXAS LEGISLATURE

The Woman suffrage amendment to the Federal Constitution was ratified by the Texas State Senate last Saturday by a safe majority. The House had already voted overwhelmingly for ratification. Texas is th 9th state to ratify the first southern state to line up.

Oponents of the measure wanted the matter referred to the people. They argued that the Texas people had gone on record in opposition to woman suffrage and that Texas people didn't want it. Advocates argued that woman suffrage was a platform demand and that Texas Legislature had requested congress to provide just such an amendment.

One source of regret to Texans in this matter over defeat of the state amendment in May, is that the Texas constitution and laws will be made to conform to the federal constitution and yet the ignorant halfway naturalized foreigners will still be privileged to vote in Texas. The amendment proposed in Texas would have cut out that illiterate unqualified element from voting, but unless' some way is found to bring reform


