THE COUNTRY APPROVES WILSON PLAN

President Wilson has spoken in a number of cities throughout the country in support of the League Covenant and everywhere thousands of American people regardless of party sentiment have cheered and applauded his utterances.

While he is urging that the covenant be adopted without change, the republican majority of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee have adopted radical changes in the pact that if adopted would practically nullify the Versailles agreement and send it back to the Signatory powers for a new agreement. In that event, it would probably never be rewritten and adopted and world war would continue and technically, at least, the state of war between the United States and Germany would still exist.

For this condition the republicans would be directly responsible. It has been pointed out by statesmen that the American people cannot read conditions and resume industrial and commercial activities until peace is established and trade relations with the world adjusted. For all these things the republican party will have to answer in the coming campaign.

Letter From Prof Graham
Crystal City, Texas
September 5, 1919.

To the Snyder Signal,
Snyder, Texas.

Have been away from Snyder since May 17th, 1918, and I sure do long for the old Snyder paper. I left Snyder at 3:30 p. m. May 17th, and that night the Scurry county people were overjoyed at getting a heavy rain fall. I have not visited your little town since for fear you would have another long drouth, however I am more than anxious to hear from the town and country which I learned to love so well.

Down here in Zavala county we have as many Mexicans as white people. This county is just as productive as Scurry, and in fact it has one advantage over Scurry County, as there are some 40 deep wells from which the people irrigate from 10 to 100 acres of land from each well. There are also several pumping plants located along the Nueces river, which runs through the country, from which fields from 20 to 60 acres are irrigated. Then we have a dam constructed, just one mile over county which cost \$100,000.00 and the South county line, in Dimmitt furnishes gravity water for some 500 acres of land. This 500 acres is known as the "Winter Garden District" as vegetables are grown here the year round.

We have a very desirable climate, while some times the sun shines with such force it forces every one to the shade, Winters are mild. I came here on the 10th of November, 1918, and every one was enjoying home grown vegetables, in fact there was plenty of vegetables up till Christmas. We are now planting our fall gardens. We plant some 600 acres to onions, about 25 acres to Spinach; 20 acres to cabbage; 3000 acres to cotton; 4,000 acres to corn and maize and 1,000 acres to beans this year, with good yield in all the above named crops. Every thing here is Mexican labor, and not very satisfactory either. Mexicans are receiving from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per day for common labor. This is a healthful climate but not any more than Old Scurry. Most of the people are Northern people, and came here for their health. The county is practically undeveloped, as a very small percent of the farming land has been put in cultivation. We have several large ranches in the country. These ranches are practically all stocked with cattle. Some sheep and goats. There are only three small towns in the country while only two of these are located on Rail Roads. We are 130 miles south west from San Antonio, 45 miles East from Eagle Pass. If you are looking for a place to catch fish and kill deer just drive down to Crystal City, Zavala County, Texas. Call for the Agricultural Agent and I will be only too glad to tell you which way to go, and it may be that I could go along too.

Find inclosed \$1.50 for which please send me the Snyder paper for 12 months. Best regards to all Scurry County people.

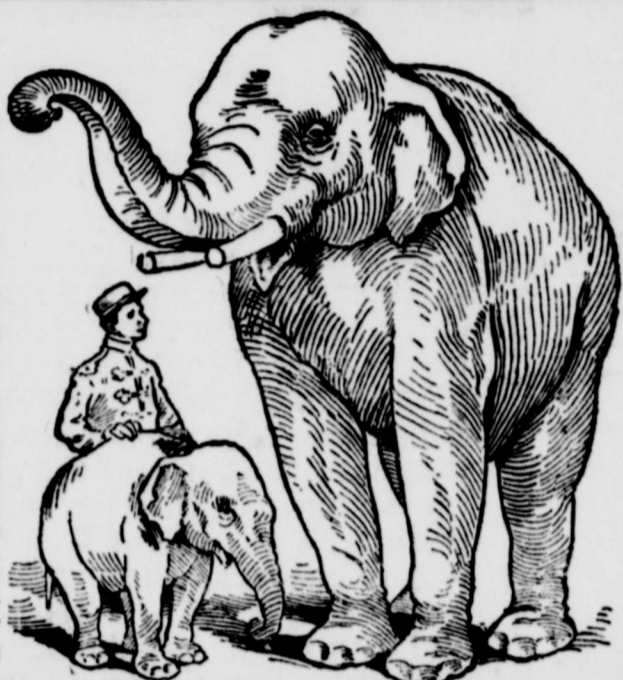

ALVARADO WARNS HIS COUNTRYMEN

Gen. Alvarado, a prominent Mexican statesman warns Carranza that unless conditions are improved, American intervention must come soon.

Alvarado urges Carranza, Obregon and Gonzales to adopt personal politics to solve national problems which he enumerates as follows:

Pacification of the country; organization of army; settlement of international and foreign debates; settlement of claims for damages caused by the revolution. The petroleum business organization of the national railroads, and settlement of the banking question. He calls upon Carranza, as the first chief of the revolution to lead the movement, and upon Obregon and Gonzales to resign their candidacy for the presidency and support it.

Abuses of the civil and military authorities in some regions are so outrageous, he said, he wonders the inhabitants do not rise in arms.

So many are the causes impelling the United States to intervene in Mexico Alvarado declares, that the conflict surely will come sooner or later unless the Mexicans know how to prevent it with ability and patriotism.

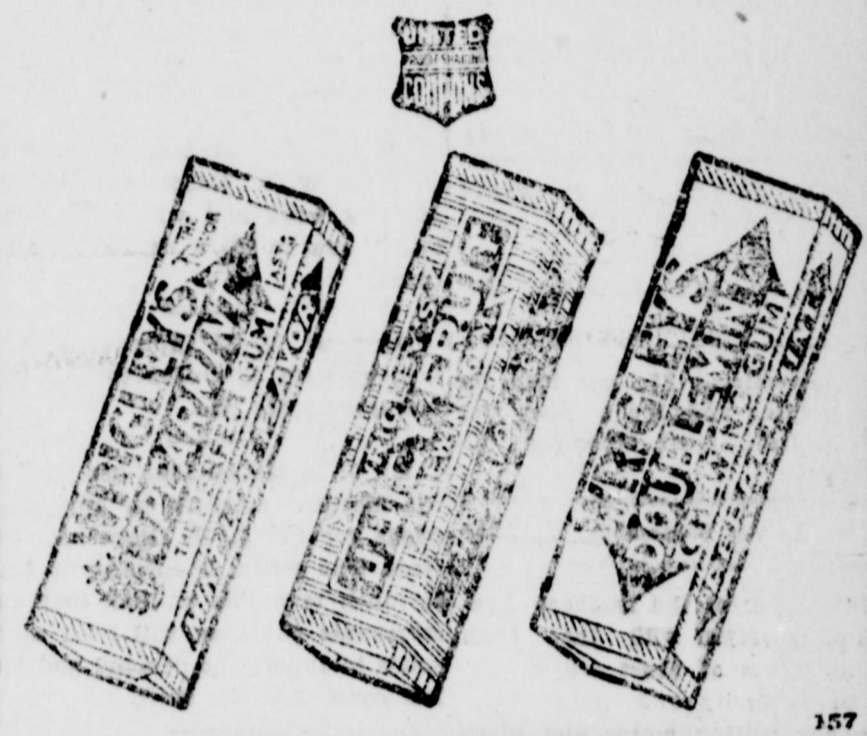

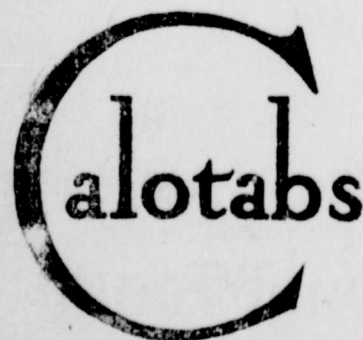
According to newspaper reports the whole country is threatened with a return of the Flu epidemic.

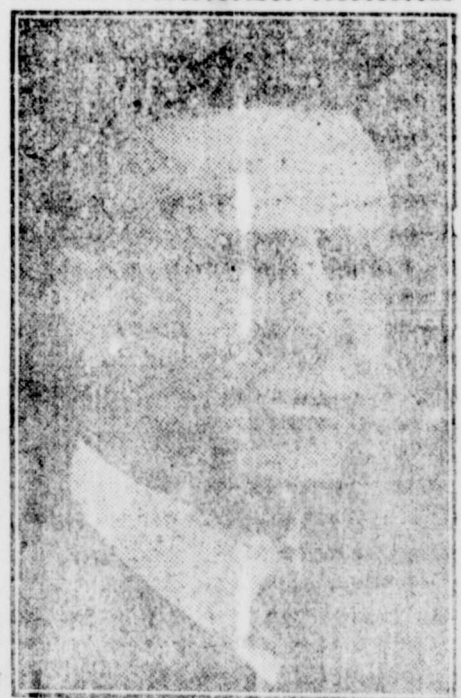
BAPTISTS ANNOUNCE PURPOSES TO WHICH VAST SUM THEY SEEK WILL BE GIVEN.

A period of five years will be provided for the final payment of these subscriptions but for the campaign to succeed, the sum of \$75,000,000 must be subscribed within the eight days. Many have expressed the belief that the subscriptions will run to \$100,000,000.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention the \$75,000,000 to be raised was apportioned among the general inter-

ests fostered by the Convention, as follows: Foreign missions, \$20,000,000; home missions, \$12,000,000; Christian education, \$20,000,000; state missions \$11,000,000; ministerial relief, \$2,500,000; orphanages, \$4,700,000; and hospitals, \$4,125,000.

The apportionment of this sum among the several states within the territory of the Convention has been announced as follows: Alabama, \$4,000,000; Arkansas, \$3,200,000; District of Columbia, \$200,000; Florida, \$1,000,000; Georgia, \$7,500,000; Southern Illinois, \$1,200,000; Kentucky, \$5,500,000; Louisiana, \$3,325,000; Maryland, \$750,000; Mississippi, \$3,350,000; Missouri, \$2,325,000; New Mexico, \$250,000; North Carolina, \$6,000,000; Oklahoma, \$2,250,000; South Carolina, \$5,500,000; Tennessee, \$4,850,000; Texas, \$16,000,000; and Virginia, \$7,000,000.

Here is what this big sum of money will help Southern Baptists do for the Master, as set forth by the Campaign Commission:

"It will equip more adequately and multiply manifold the 1,099 missionary workers of the Foreign Mission Board,

and will give more than 1,000,000 and 500,000 more children.

"It will enlarge and raise to a better efficiency the 133 Baptist schools in the South.

"It will go far towards meeting the expanding needs of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and the Women's Missionary Training School at Louisville, Ky., the Southwest Baptist Theological Seminary and Women's Training School in Fort Worth, the Baptist Bible School at New Orleans, La., a Theological Seminary for the Negroes, and will provide a first-class college for boys and girls of the mountain region.

"It will increase greatly our hospital service to the sick, open wider outlets to the orphans and provide a strong support for our aged ministers of the gospel.

"It will put Southern Baptists in position to assume a considerable share in the reconstruction of war-torn Europe, and embrace many of the marvelous opportunities for service which thrust themselves upon us from all parts of the world, at home and abroad."

While \$20,000,000 of this sum will go to foreign missions and thus be expended in carrying the gospel and its blessings to other lands, the remaining \$55,000,000 will be expended at home in building up home missionary, educational and benevolent institutions and projects, of which there are a number in every state within the boundaries of the convention.

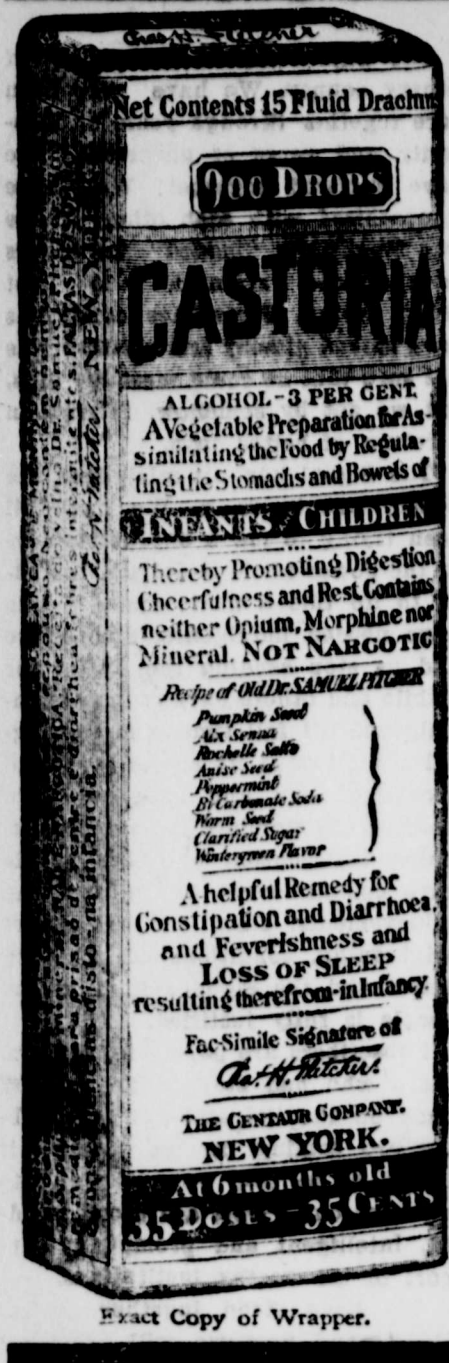

BAPTISTS LAUNCH WORLD PROGRAM

PLAN TO RAISE \$75,000,000 FOR GENERAL PURPOSES WITHIN NEXT FIVE YEARS.

WHOLE SOUTH TO CO-OPERATE

Each State is Given Definite Task To Perform in Raising Huge Sum For Denomination's New Budget—Drive is On.

Recognizing the need of the world for more religion and christian service along general lines, the Baptists of the South have resolved to contribute \$75,000,000 to a program of reconstruction following the war, and have laid plans to subscribe this sum during the week of November 30-December 7, a period of five years to be given in which to complete the payment of these subscriptions.

The decision to inaugurate this world program was reached at the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlanta last May, when the more than 4,000 delegates present voted unanimously to undertake the

The campaign has now been organized with the general headquarters in Nashville, Tenn., where Dr. L. R. Scarborough, president of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at Fort Worth, is in charge as general director for the South. He is assisted by a number of men in charge of special divisions of the work, while each of the eighteen states in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention has in turn perfected a state organization, including a State Director, a State Organizer and State Publicity Director. Each association, or district, within each of the states has likewise gotten busy by naming its associational or district directors, and the work of organization has been carried into the local churches to the extent that practically all of the more than 25,000 local Baptist congregations in the South have their workers named to help put over the biggest church drive that has ever been attempted in this section of the country. There are 3,000,000 white Baptists holding church membership in the South and it is hoped to reach every man, woman and child among them with the message of this campaign and give each of them a part in the plan of saving the world by giving to the extent of their ability to this vast conservation fund.

Christian education, home and foreign missions, state missions, ministerial relief, orphanages and hospitals, are among the various general interests of the denomination that will be cared for in this campaign, the matter of local church expenses, and local church equipment not being included.

Between now and November 30th every effort will be put forth in organizing and mobilizing the Baptist forces in the South, preparatory to the launching of the big drive for the subscriptions and cash payments. July was known as preparation month, August was designated as information month, during which time every effort has been put forth in informing the people on every phase of the campaign, while September has been designated as intercession month, October as enlistment month, November as stewardship month, and the period from November 30 to December 7 as victory week.

"We have undertaken a big task," Dr. Scarborough, the General Director, says, "but we have undertaken it in God's name and for His glory, and by trusting in God and doing our whole duty, we will succeed. There is work here for all, and glory enough for all if we win, but we cannot succeed except we labor diligently and pray earnestly."

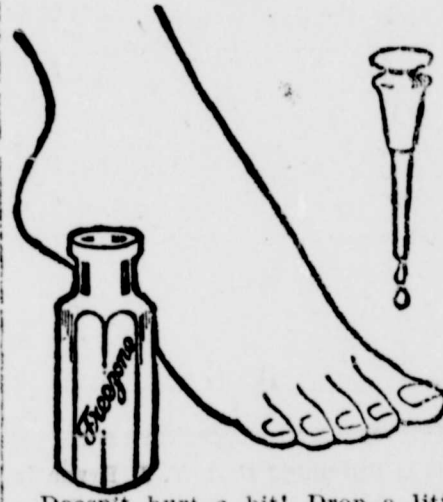
