Ever since the fearful storm of last Sunday week which devastated Corpus Christi and other towns and settlements along the gulf coast, the daily papers have teemed with he rible stories of suffering, death and and destruction of people and property.

The property losses reach into millions of dollars. People who were possessed with valuable homes and buildings were stripped of everything. Families living comfortably and happy have been hurried to death by wind and wave or torn from fond embrace and some lost and others left bleeding in body and soul.

Up to now great stretches of storm stricken coast line have not yet been searched to give up the bodies buried there in sand, surf and debris. It is probable the death list may reach 1000. Already about 600 bodies have been found and buried, many of them unidentified and scores of persons are missing and supposed to have perished.

Rockport, Aransas Pass, Port Aransas, Sinton, Corpus Christi, and villages and hamlets were either totally destroyed or horribly torn up. As far inland as Robstown, Eloni Alice and Kenedy buildings were demolished and crops destroyed.

From Corpus Christi the fury of the storm swept west to Kingsville, Point Isybel, and Brownsville and into Mexico leaving death and devastation in its path. Hundreds of tourists and visiors were in Corpus Chirsti and many of these were lost and scores of lamilies throughout the state are mourning the loss of loved ones.

The appeal for aid sent out by Gov. Hobby and relief committees has met hearty response from almost every town in Texas and from other states and relief is being hurried to the stricken region. Trainloads of food and clothing were run into Corpus and Aransas Pass within a few hours after the news of the storm had flashed over the wires.

The recovered dead have been burjed, the injured hve been ministered to and the homeless have been provided with shelter, and in course of time the survivors will be comfoliable and siness will be resumed. The storm wrecked towns will be rebuilt and we hope measures will be adopted to protect those towns as Galveston is protected.

MISSIONS NEEDED **ALSO IN HOMELAND**

SECRETARY GRAY OF HOME BOARD SETS OUT SITUATION CONFRONTING SOUTHERN BAPTISTS THERE.

\$12,000,000 IS GOAL SOUGHT

This Sum Will Be Laid Aside From Baptist 75 Million Campaign For Work Among Negroes, Foreigners and Other Projects.

While \$20,000,000 of the \$75,000,000 to be raised in cash and five-year pledges by the Southern Baptists between now and December 7th will go to foreign missions, \$12,000,000 will be devoted to missions at home, it has been officially announced. Home missions is regarded by the Baptists as quite as essential as foreign missions, the larger sum being set aside for the latter cause by reason of the larger field to be covered-practically the entire world.

"Twelve million dollars is a large figure when compared with what we have been doing heretofore," Dr. D. B. Gray, corresponding secretary of the Home Mission Board at Atlanta, declares, "but it is very redsonable in comparison with our ability and small in comparison with the needs of the

Home Mission fields." tions which confronts America since the war has transferred the center of \$30.00; second \$20.00. education from Europe to this country, Dr. Gray says: "This brings a new day of opportunity and responsibility to our people. Our schools and colleges must be strengthened and endowed. They must be made thoroughly christian in fact as well as in theory. In this way we are to counteract the vicious ideals of Germany and her allies in the world war. Our youth must be trained on proper lines as to religion and ethics. This can be done

best in our denominational schools." Some of the educational institutions fotsered by the Home Mission Board are the forty mountain schools, serving 3,000,000 residents of the South living in mountainous territory where public high schools are lacking. Fully \$10,000,000 could be used to advantage in strengthening the equipment and teaching force of these schools, it is

estimated, so great is the need. Another demand of the home field is the 4,000 church organizations in the South which need assistance in the erection of suitable houses of worship, while more pressing still is the problem created by the presence in the South of 10,000,000 negroes. Speaking of the negro problem. Dr. Gray says: "They are of more vital concern to us than any hundred millions of people anywhere else in the world. Socially, politically, economically and religiously they constitute our greatest task and we neglect them at our own peril as well as their infinite loss. Racial relations are tense and the situation calls upon Southern Baptists for a worthy program in behalf of the religious uplift of our brothers in black. We must lead them in sane missionary and evangelistic work and likewise in the development of their religious life on sane and helpful lines. We need a large company of the best, wisest and strongest negro evangelists and teachers who shall help us to lift up their race and make them worthy and worth while as Christian citizens."

That work among the foreigners in the homeland offers the best and most economical opportunity for missionary labors among them anywhere, is the declaration of the Home Mission leaders. These foreigners are in the fields, mines and factories and are a vital part of our civilization. This work among the foreigners not only gives them the christian religion, but makes them more contented, and better American citizens, it is pointed

Great hopes for the future of the churches in the South are held out in the enlarged program of evangelism and enlistment which the Baptist 75 Million Campaign will make possible. The Home Board hopes to win from 300,000 to 500,000 people in the South who are not christians during the period of the campaign.



Kentucky made a late adoption and will have a longer delay than Texas, while Oregon is in a worse situation than Kentucky. None of these states have free textbooks. Texas with this additional tax on the book situation is faring, comparatively well. The schools of Chicago opened about two weeks ago, and as yet, have not been supplied with readers. In Arkansas the depository, with most of the fall supply of books, was burned about a week ago. Many publishers are refusing to take further

The prospects for relief of the Texas shortage are good. Investigat ions made this week indicate that most of our schools will be supplied with the majority of books by the first of October. At the first of the week the Texas School Book Depository and the Southern School Book Depository were practically empty, the supplies having been exhausted. But both of these depositories expect large shipments this week. Ginn & Company reported a shortage in algebras only. Nearly all of the independent districts and most of the large common school districts have been supplied with the basal books. Most of the schools have been supplied with spellers, read ers, and geographies. The Language book may still be delayed several weeks. As the text has not been changed, the schools may manage for a shorttime, by permitting two or more children to use the same text, in turn. Reasonable allowance should be made for the usual conditions this year, and for delays resulting from the fact that the textbook bill did not become a law until June, and therefore, its provisions could not be rigidly enforced. If after allowance for reasonable delay, the schools are supplied with books each school should avail itself of the

Majority Feel That President's Guidance Should Be Held-He Regards Pact As Sure to Come Soon.

(By Mt. Clemens News Bureau)

Aboard President Wilson's Special Train-From the Capital at Washing ton to the far Pacific coast the Presi dent of the United States has jour neyed on the most unusual expedition ever undertaken by a chief executive of the nation.

To discuss national questions, many presidents have toured the land; but Mr. Wilson is laying before America a question which affects the whole world-the question of whether or not we are to join in the League of Na tions; whether we are to forget out former isolation and share with the other peoples of the earth the respon Salvation Army through speakers sibilities of maintaining civilisation and preventing, as he says we can do, feture wartere.

Between the capital and the coast the president made afteen speeches and half a dosen brief talks. All of 100,000 fellow citizens listened to him. Several millions had the chance to see him, and apparently everyone wanted to see him, from those who threnged the streets of the cities and towns where he stopped, to those who came to the railside or stood at little flag stations in remote places, knowing their only reward could be a fleeting glimpse and a wave of the hand.

He has met and talked to all types of citizens-to men big in the business, financial and professional worlds, to farmers and mechanical workers, to Indians and cowboys and foreignborn herders and rangers, to soldiers and to mothers who lost soldier-sons in the late war.
