To the subscribers to stock in the Market and Warehouse Company we are pleased to report that we have secured the warehouse of the Union Warehouse Company and are now ready to receive cotton. The cotton classer, Mr. E. H. Garrison, you will find at the warehouse and he will give you a certificate of classification of your cotton if you desire it. We have not succeeded in selling any maizee and kaffir and therefore would urge the farmers to house it at home and not dump it on the falling market. You should not accept less than \$30 in bulk per ton, You will get it if you hold. The cotton prices are nearly maximum and we suggest that sales at 32 up to 35 cents are advisable but if they fall below let up on sales. Just sell enough to get by. The Galveston Impove-

The Legislature submitted an Amendment to the State Constitution to be voted on in November providing for the raising of the grade at Calveston and giving better protection to the city. Such improvement will be of great value to the State. Galveston is our chief port and whatever will benefit Galveston will benefit all Texas. But the people of Texas should keep in mind the fact that Galveston and Galveston county expect to pay for the work lithout asking help from the rest of the State. The people there are rady to tax themselves for this improvement, but cannot do so until he constitution is amended so they may levy the necessary tax on themelves. They are asking the people of Texas to amend theconstitution o permit them to tax themselves or this purpose. Surely the peple of the state will grant that request. Fexas people are living closer toether than they did 40 years ago and will surely be more considerate f the welfare and privileges of the alveston people than were the East and Central Texas people toward West Texas. It will be remembered that something like 25 years ago the eople in West Texas wantd constipeople in West Texas wanted constitutional authority to form irrigation districts and levy taxes on themselves to provide for irrigation systems. They got the necessary amendment ubmitted and the people in other arts of the state defeatd it. At that time there was a disposition to defeat any chang in the constitution and although it would not have cost other parts of the state any thing it was efeated and West Texas is still with out irrigation. Let us hope the people may take a broader view now and

Stricken Cities Released From Obligation. Money Sent With Workers

Relief work for the stricken section of the coast of Texas is being pushed with all possible speed by the Salvation Army, according to Lieutenant Colonel George Wood commander of the southwestern division, who is now in Corpus Christi. Clothing has been rushed into the

Every city in the southwestern division falling under the jurisdiction of Lieutenant Colonel Wood has been asked for assistance. Prompt responses are being made to all appeals according to southwestern offi-

The Salvation Army has withdrawn the coast counties in the stricken section from the home service campaign scheduled for September 29. The amount in quotas withdrawn reaches \$100,000. The decision was reached after a conference between John Henry Kirby, chairman of the state advisory and executive committee, Lieutenant Colonel Wood and Herbert B. Ehler, southwestern financial director.


