In the Oil Field.

There has been no big activities in drilling anywhere since the rainy weather has been on.

The rig is being hauled out from Hermleigh for the Dunn well. The Snyder Oil Association had a big water tank hauled out Wednesday and Secretary Paxton said they will start up as soon as water and fuel are ready.

Wireless For Snyder.

H. G. Towle informs us that he has placed an order for a first class wireless receiving station, that is guaranteed to pick up the time from the largest government station located at Arlington, Virginia, each tick of the clock at the Navy Observatory is transmitted at five minutes before twelve at noon and ten p. m. each day.

The government weather report can be picked up also, it immediately follows the time report at same vibration.

This will give Snyder and Scurry county benefit of correct time, and the government weather report when Towle learns to read it.

Grocery Business Change

Mr. H. M. Blackard has bought Mr. W. G. Ralston's grocery stock and store building on the east side of the square and expects to be in charge there next Monday. Mr. Ralston has not stated what he expects to do.

Secretary Denson Wants to Quit.

Secretary J. M. Denson said early this week that he was about to throw up his commission and get the Chamber of Commerce to elect another Secretary. He said he consented at first to do the clerical work, but expected others to engineer the activities of the organization. He has found for some reason or maybe for no reason the membership have been mighty slow about taking up public propositions and he was going to try to get the executive committee together so he could tender his resignation.

Then a day or two later he said he went to some of the members and announced that he was doing nothing in an official way and wanted to resign and they told him they did not understand why he was doing that if he has nothing to do.

His Father Died at Coleman.

Mr. E. Z. Jenkins, aged 60 years, father of Mr. Homer Jenkins, of Snyder, died last week at his home at Coleman. He had a severe case of influenza last winter and never had recovered from the effects. Homer went to see him a short time ago and left him apparently better on Thursday but he grew worse very soon and passing away in a few days.

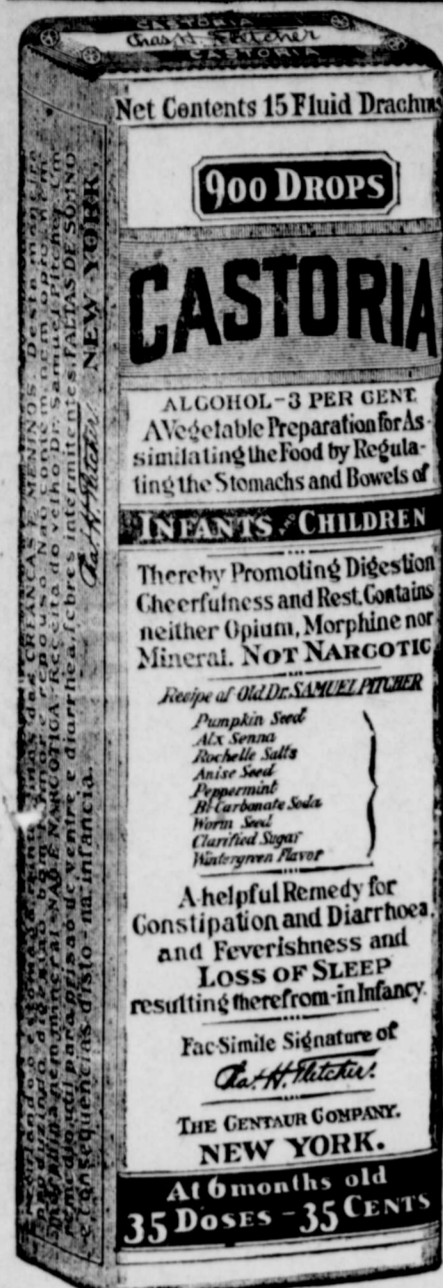

Weather for October.

Under date October 11, Foster out-
lines serial storm changes from 11th
to 24th and says:
These storms will dominate the
weather of the continent from near
October 10 to near Oct. 24. Temper-
ature will fluctuate, but, while the
season calls for general trend down-
ward of 9 degrees, I expect the trend
to be upward more than 10 degrees
from Oct. 9 to 21, and then a cold
wave that will bring a great fall,
causing frost to threaten the north-
ern parts of the cotton belt.
The two principal storms of the
month will come within this four-
teenth-day weather period and they
will largely increase the amount of
precipitation which will continue to
be in about the same sections as for
the last three months. These prin-
cipal storms of October will occur
during the five days centering on
Oct. 12 and 25, and last storm will
be unusually severe and will probably
develop two sets of storms, one de-
scribe above, then a tropical storm
which may develop into a hurricane.
These October storms will greatly
benefit the winter wheat sections,
particularly where winter grain is
sown for pasture, but in the spring
wheat sections, north of the high
ridges that run east and west, pre-
cipitations will continue short because
the moisture must come from the
Gulf of Mexico and will be precipi-
tated on the south side of these
ridges. Precipitation will continue to
be heaviest in the cotton States and
in the Arizona-New Mexico country.

BAPTISTS PLAN RECONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

BODY CHARGED WITH DUTY OF OUTLINING HOW 75 MILLION CAMPAIGN CAN PROMOTE THAT TASK REACHES FIELD—DR. LOVE OUTLINES THE NEED AND ISSUES CALL

To make a general survey of the economic, social and religious conditions in Europe with a view to recommending to the Baptists of the South where and how they can aid most effectively in the reconstruction of that continent through the Baptist 75 Million Campaign, a commission, composed of Dr. J. F. Love, secretary of the Foreign Mission Board at Richmond, Va.; Dr. Z. T. Cody, editor Baptist Courier, Greenville, S. C., and Rev. Everett Gill, missionary at Rome, Italy, who is returning after a leave of absence in this country, and who will serve as guide and interpreter to the other members, is now in England for a conference with the Baptists of Great Britain and will go from there for an inspection of France and Belgium.

Another brief conference will be held with the Baptists of Switzerland, after which a trip will be made through Italy and a survey of the new republic of Czecho-Slovakia conducted. From Prague, capital of Bohemia, the commission will go into such parts of Russia as are open, and the foreign trip will be concluded with an inspection of Palestine, where the missionary work formerly done in Syria, Persia and Galilee by the Illinois Baptist Association has been turned over to the Foreign Mission Board.

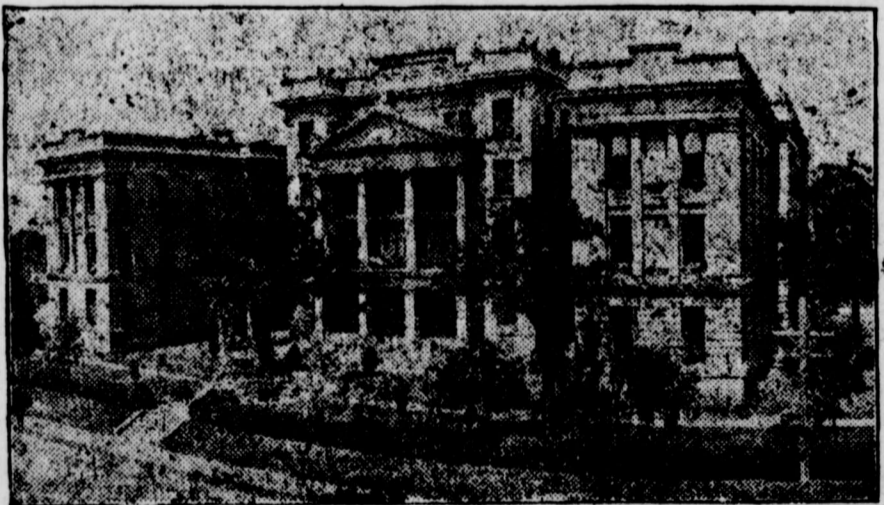
There are approximately 4,250 Baptist churches in Europe today, with 3,000 pastors and missionaries and 666,800 church members, it is announced by the headquarters of the Baptist 75 Million Campaign, and a considerable sum from this campaign will go toward succoring needy families of Baptists and others in the war-torn regions as well as in the propagation of the gospel and the establishment of Christian institutions there, it is announced. Before sailing on the Adriatic on his

European mission, Dr. Love made the following statement outlining the purpose of the commission:

"When the call came to help save, promote and secure democracy in Europe there came a louder call to help save, promote and secure evangelical Christianity in Europe. That which alone will now preserve and perfect the democracy for which brave men have died on the battlefield of Europe is the Christianity of the New Testament. Southern Baptists can no longer profess New Testament Christianity and decline a challenge like that which is now presented to them to bear witness to their faith among the peoples of Europe. Our people never before faced such a challenge and such a responsibility.

Of course we can not go to the men and women of Europe who have been stripped of earthly fortune and reduced to direst necessity with a message of Christian love and brotherhood if we decline in our abundance to carry some substantial pledge of our love and compassion. Mothers will not be able to stay the crying of their little ones to hear us preach if we decline to practice the gospel of compassion and feed these little ones and build fires at which they can during the coming winter warm their frosted toes. Southern Baptists are under the most solemn obligation to help relieve the want and suffering of Europe. But if there were no reconstruction work in Europe, Southern Baptists have motives numerous enough and strong enough to compel them to make a complete success of the Baptist 75 Million Campaign. I would therefore, as my parting word to my brothers and sisters of the South, implore them to give themselves to this campaign and carry it to a triumphant conclusion during Victory Week, November 30-December 1.

\$4,800,000 TO BE RAISED FOR HOSPITALS



A modern hospital illustrative of the type of buildings Southern Baptists are employing in the relief of human suffering.

In their work of relieving human physical suffering Southern Baptists at present own and control fourteen hospitals and there are under course of construction and about ready to be opened at least two more, with considerable progress made toward the erection of others. All of these institutions are liberally patronized and are self-supporting but all of them need to be enlarged in order to meet the rapidly-growing demands upon them. The demand for charity work is especially urgent and in order to enable them to thus render a needed service to those who are least able to help themselves as well as to provide larger facilities for the regular work the hospitals are doing the sum of \$4,800,000 has been apportioned to them from the proceeds to be raised in the Baptist 75 Million Campaign.

This work of relieving the physical infirmities of men, women and children and thus putting them on the

road to better health and larger efficiency and usefulness was begun within the bounds of the Southern Baptist convention in 1890 when the Missouri Baptist Sanitarium was opened in St. Louis. From a very small beginning in a residence with less than a dozen beds, this institution has grown into a modern institution with more than 300 beds.

Other Baptist hospitals in the South include Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Okla.; Baptist Hospital, Miami, Okla.; Baptist Hospital, Cushing, Okla.; Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, Tenn.; Georgia Baptist Hospital, Atlanta; Oklahoma Baptist State Hospital, Oklahoma City; Baptist Hospital, Columbia, S. C., Texas; Baptist Memorial Sanitarium, Dallas; Baptist Hospital, Houston, Tex.; Baptist Hospital, Alexandria, La.; Baptist Hospital, Jackson, Miss.; St. Louis Baptist Hospital, St. Louis, Mo., and the Kansas City Baptist Hospital at Kansas City, Mo.

She was only a simple girl from the country. She entered the big city in the hope of earning enough money to give her the clothing of the fashion plate ladies and movie queens. Perhaps she came with the intent of making herself useful in the world.

She got a job. It was work, if that constitutes a job? She slaved nine hours a day behind a counter or possibly she stacked matches in boxes—no matter she got the job.

And the salary, magnificent—\$10 a week. The clerks in Perkins' store back home only got \$6 but then she was ignorant as yet you see.

So she drifted along until one fine night she found herself hanging over the railing of the river bridge, pocketbook empty, hungry—contemplating a leap from the bridge—or worse.

Then there is the working man. He knows no trade for he grew up in untrammelled America where one is permitted to do as he pleases. An indulgent father had not insisted on him learning anything useful. His mother upheld him in idleness.

Possibly the father went broke. Possibly he never had anything. At least we find our hero at forty, discouraged, knowing no trade, on the bum.

A bad season strikes his section of the country. He has no money, no friends. Then we find him—where?

Riding the rods to a better land, in jail and out, a knight of the cinder trail.

The poor man comes one dreary night to a cold home. He is out of work. He knows no friends. His children are huddled around a stove in which the last embers are dying. A small girl of four weeps for food.

A mother in the next room—there are two rooms—lies in a bed of old blankets and ragged great coats. She is moaning in pain.

A little life is to come into the world before many hours have passed. There is no doctor, no provisions. There is no fire, no light.

In despair the man goes into the night stumbling against the cold wind seeking assistance in his trouble.

There is a gutter bum who has no knowledge of how loathsome he really is. Drunken, abused, kicked and cuffed he dodges all human beings.

Like a trounced dog he avoids people yet he must seek them. At last he decides that he is down and out. He goes down the street with longing in his heart. He longs to tell some one how he despises self.

He has reached the turning point. Will some one hold out a hand?

Ha! ha! he laughs. He knows the world.

Then there is the woman without shame. Christ had compassion on her kind but she has come to think that no one else had. Harpy like she pines her way about the streets of the great city.

Her cheeks are incarnadine. Her soul is as red as her painted lips. Her eyes are as full of guile as the misshapen mind.

Unloved, much caressed, hunted, a prey upon society she comes to the last step down, then she finds gold in her heart. Des anyone else find it?

So they run through the annals of life. But here is what happened.

The simple girl went to a clean boarding house and after a few years made good. She blossomed into a flower of pure womanhood.

The gutter bum sent his wife to a maternity home where she received good care. His children were sent food, clothing and fuel.

The gutter bum was offered a chance at self rehabilitation. He made good. He quit drink, got a job and was useful.

The harpy was sent to a rescue home and became a woman. She who was old only in experience again learned the simple love of a child. She was saved for the world.

Each was saved through the Salvation Army and its organizations for mankind.

AROUND THE WORLD WITH THE AMERICAN RED CROSS. Junior Red Cross.



Early in the participation of the United States in the world war, the American Red Cross perceived the value of mobilizing the school children of the country and the Junior Red Cross was organized. Before the war ended nine million children were enrolled and helped in the war fund and membership campaigns, in chapter production of relief supplies and manufacturing furniture for the refugees whose homes and household goods were destroyed.

Children everywhere in the United States responded to the call to service sounded by President Wilson as head of the American Red Cross. This photograph is that of an enthusiastic young Japanese member of the Junior Red Cross of Spokane, Wash., starting out on the ambitious undertaking of collecting "a mill of pennies" for war relief. A comprehensive peace program is now being worked out for the Junior Red Cross, which is being held intact.

AROUND THE WORLD WITH THE AMERICAN RED CROSS. In Serbia.



As far back as the first winter of the war, the Red Cross sent to Serbia a sanitary commission that effectively checked the scourge of typhus, but after the United States entered the conflict, the Red Cross was able, in August, 1917, to send a full commission that carried on extensive relief operations among the suffering refugees of the tortured nation. Hospitals were established, the refugees fed, clothed and given medical attention, the army supplied with much needed dental treatment, farm machinery, and seeds provided to help the Serbs redeem their land to productivity, and, not least, measures undertaken for the succor of the children. The terrible condition into which these helpless victims of the war had fallen is well portrayed by this photograph of a little Serbian girl wearing the rags and expression of hopeless dismay that were all she possessed when the Red Cross came.

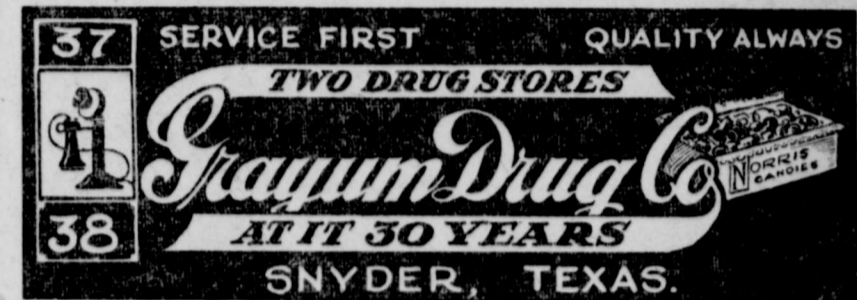

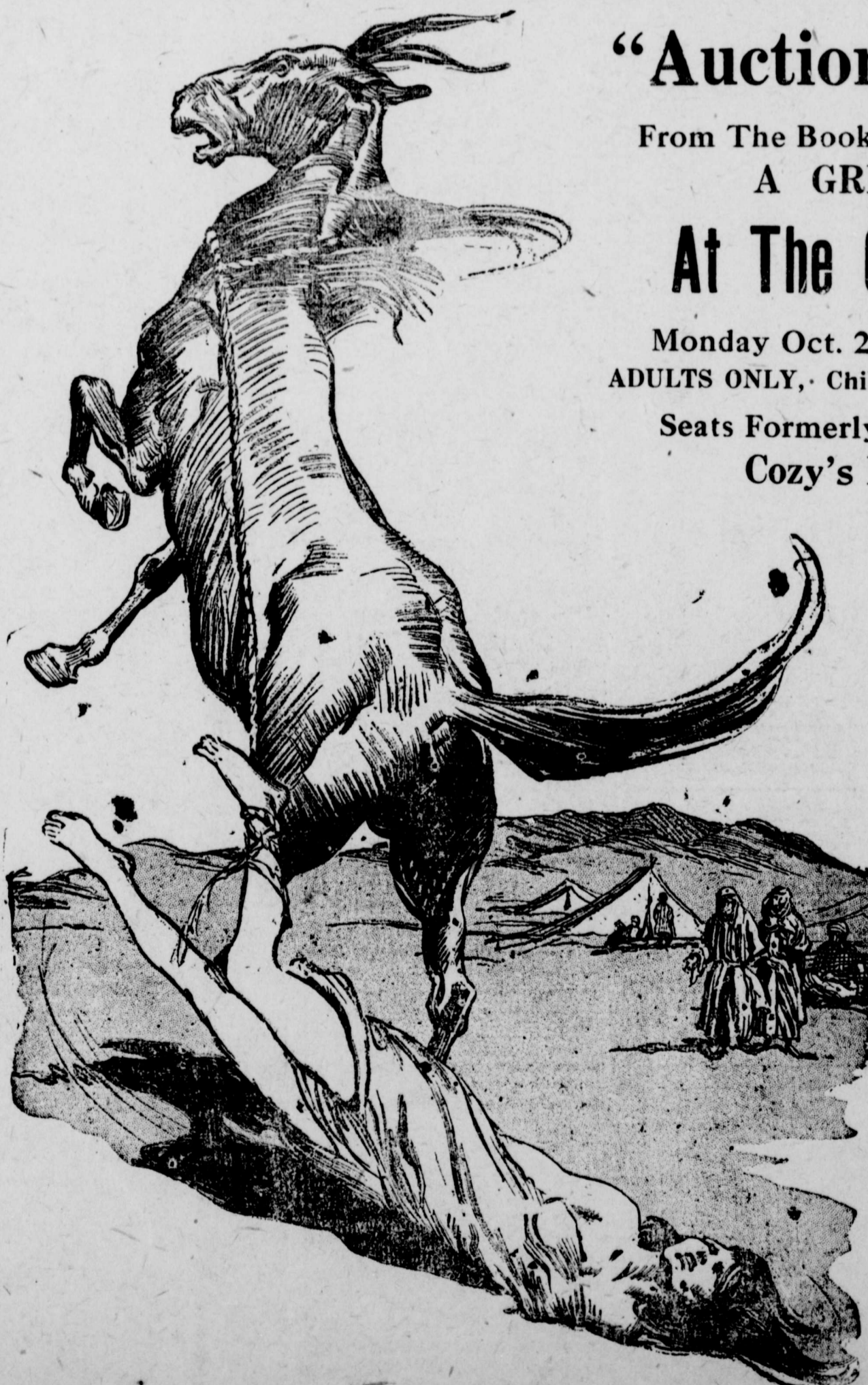

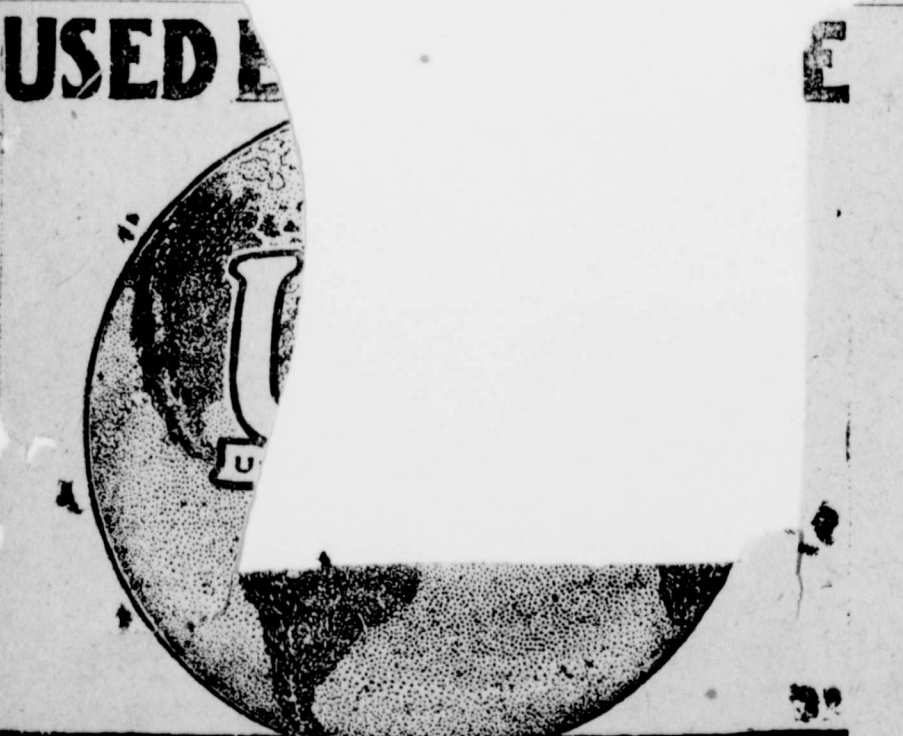

RED CROSS DRIVE GAINS MOMENTUM

ACTIVITIES OF EACH DAY OF NOVEMBER CAMPAIGN OUTLINED.

SCHOOL CHILDREN TO AID

Also Women's Clubs, Municipal Employees, Labor Organizations and Business Men.

That added momentum is being given by the Third Red Cross Roll Call by the approach of the opening day of the campaign, November 2, is indicated by hundreds of preliminary reports reaching Southwestern Division headquarters in St. Louis from Red Cross Chapters in the five States—Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma—composing the division. The drive closes November 11.

An outline, giving in detail the Red Cross activities that will characterize each day of the 10-day campaign, recently has been made public. The opening day has been designated "Red Cross Sunday" and will be the occasion for sermons on the Red Cross that will be preached in churches throughout the United States. Special programs are to be held at morning or evening services.

On Monday, November 3, the Governor's proclamation in each State will be made public, mass meetings will begin and the first check of the progress of the campaign will be made at a workers' dinner in the evening.

"Municipal Employees Day" has been set for Tuesday, November 4. On this day a proclamation from the Mayor of each city and town will be arranged for, while on the principal municipal building the Red Cross flag will be raised to be displayed throughout the remainder of the campaign.

Department store speeches will be made by "four-minute men" to be followed by lunch hour enrollment.

Wednesday, November 5, is to be "Women's Day," on which special tribute is to be paid to the work which women are doing in the Red Cross. Meetings of women's clubs, special exercises in Red Cross workrooms and Chapters will characterize the day, which also will mark the peak of the house-to-house canvass that is to be an additional feature of the campaign.

Homage to the support which the laboring man is giving to the Red Cross will be paid Thursday, November 6, which is "Employees' Day." Noon meetings will be held at factories and large industrial plants.

The school children of each city, town and county will be the central figures on Friday, November 7, when special exercises in the schools will be held. The following day is special feature day for business and fraternal clubs. On the second Sunday of the campaign, November 9, patriotic sermons will be preached. November 10 is "Button Day," when all not wearing Red Cross buttons, will be solicited, while on Tuesday, November 11, the first anniversary of the Armistice, final reports will be made, and the campaign will close.

SOLDIERS TO DIRECT DRIVE

SAILORS, TOO, IN SOME CASES WILL RUN CAMPAIGN.

Willingness of Returned Fighters to Direct Red Cross Roll Call Encouraging.

Returned soldiers and sailors in a large number of Red Cross Chapters of the Southwestern Division of the Red Cross—Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma—have accepted the directorship of the Third Red Cross Roll Call, Nov. 2 to 11, according to a recent announcement.

That this willingness not only to become members of the organization but to engage actively in the campaign to perpetuate the American Red Cross for future work indicates the high regard in which service men hold the Red Cross, is the belief of Alfred Fairbank, Division Manager.

"The fact that the young men who have served their country so courageously, and who have seen the Red Cross at work, are willing to assist so actively in its continuance should appeal to every man, woman and child in the country.

TEACHERS WILL CANVASS

Dallas, Texas, Instructors Volunteer As Red Cross Roll Call Workers.

School teachers of Dallas, Texas, have volunteered their services as canvassers for the Third Red Cross Roll Call, November 2 to 11. They already have perfected an organization and plan to make a house-to-house canvass on the second Sunday of Roll Call week in an effort to swell the total of Red Cross memberships for 1920.

"As we each intend to canvass in our own district," one teacher writes to Red Cross headquarters, "we expect to accomplish much by this unified action. Many teachers have mentioned that they had been unable to give as much time to war work as they wished and therefore desired now to aid the Red Cross in furthering its peace program.

WILL ANSWER CALL OF WHOLE WORLD

THIS IS AIM OF SOUTHERN BAPTISTS IN THEIR PRESENT DRIVE FOR \$75,000,000.

ENLARGE PRESENT WORK

Forces in Field Today Are Far From Sufficient To Meet Needs of Situation, Leaders Declare—Europe Included On Program.

Now that the larger liberties enjoyed by peoples everywhere, following the close of the world war, have revealed as never before the need and the opportunity for the spread of the gospel to all the ends of the earth, the Baptists of the South have launched their program for \$75,000,000, to be raised in cash and five-year subscriptions between now and December 7th, in the hope of making a worthy beginning toward supplying this world need.

Of the total sum sought in this campaign, the actual drive for the funds

to be made during Victory Week, November 30-December 7, \$43,000,000 will be devoted to missions, and \$20,000,000 of this sum will be devoted to enlarging the work on the ten important foreign fields occupied already and to opening up new fields where countless millions of people have not yet heard the story of Jesus Christ.

Asia, Africa, Latin America (including Mexico as well as South America), and Europe are the four continents in which the missionaries of Southern Baptists are operating today, but in all of the ten countries of these continents, Southern Baptists have only 316 missionaries, 787 native workers, 192 of whom are ordained, 12 foreign physicians, 6 foreign trained nurses, 21 native physicians and 23 native nurses.

"Our missionaries already on the field have wrought wonderfully for the Master, considering the difficulties they have had to confront," Dr. J. F. Love, secretary of foreign missions, declares, "but we at home have not supported them as we ought with helpers of all kinds and with schools, hospitals and other agencies to enable them to do a larger work in every way. The smallness of the work we have done already can be realized when we look at the vast number of people who have not been reached in the foreign fields we are occupying today. China, for instance, has a population four times that of the United States, or one-fourth the population of the entire world, and our force there consists of only 65 men, 62 married women, 49 unmarried women, 54 ordained natives and 420 unordained native helpers. Japan, which has half as many people as the United States, is being served by 9 men, 9 married women, 3 unmarried women, 11 ordained natives and 6 unordained native helpers. In Italy there are a third as many people as there are in the United States, yet we have there only 2 men, 2 married women, 35 ordained natives, and 3 unordained native helpers. Mexico has 15,000,000 people, and we have in that country and on the border a missionary force consisting of 11 men, 11 married women, 3 unmarried women, 24 ordained natives and 15 unordained native helpers. Argentina has a population of 8,000,000, and our missionary force there consists of 7 men, 7 married women, 14 ordained natives, and 7 unordained native helpers. In Africa, we have entered only one state, that of Nigeria, but this state has a population of 20,000,000, and to serve those people we have only 7 men missionaries, 6 married women, 3 unmarried women, 3 ordained natives and 52 unordained native helpers. Brazil has a territory larger than all the United States and a population of 50,000,000. Serving those people we have a force of 54 men, 23 married women, 2 unmarried women, 69 ordained natives, and 52 unordained native helpers. Our work in Chile, where there are 3,000,000 people, is only two years old, but we have 12 churches, and 15 outstations, in which last year there were 122 baptisms. We need at least 200 more missionaries now and from the proceeds of this campaign we hope to employ them and then equip them and those on the field already for doing the largest work for the Master."

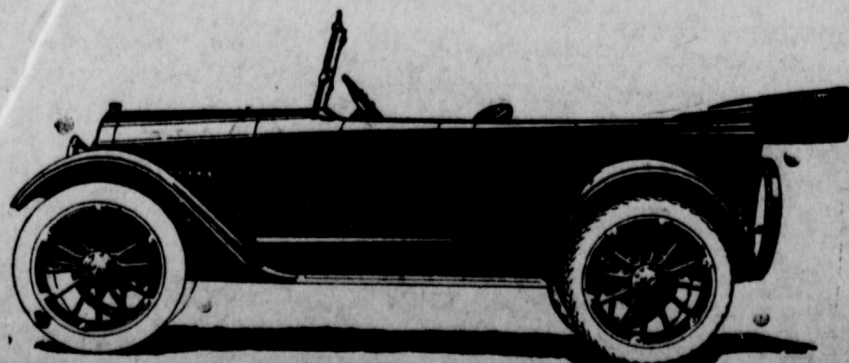

Tremendous Historical Picture of Armenia's Heartbreak Released By First National.

Reviewed by Hanford C. Judson. Nothing could be more affecting than this vivid picture of the greatest tragedy of the world. One would think the scenes in "Auction of Souls" had been pictured in Armenia at the time of the persecution of this Christian people. They are given the chance to declare for Mohammed, but are true to Christ, and from this comes their martyrdom, burnings, starvation, outrage beyond description and torture beyond the power of the mind to realize.

The picture is too big and too affecting for words to tell much of the impression it makes on the spectator. It is so reverently done and so wonderfully true to humanity in all that it shows, that no doubt it will be kept for years and handed down as a historical manuscript picture. It couldn't be done more worthily or be made to give a clearer impression of actuality. Each of the great cast

players who took part in it seems to have lost him or herself in the story; they seem more like participants than like actors. It is a reverently told story of magnificent Christian heroism, and of Turkish horrors beyond understanding.


