staple mikes a greater difference in price, and here I wish to say that the reputation of a ceitain potnt has
much to to with the price of coton

rado city is pasing one to two cents more for cotton than Snyder buyers can pay. This is because they have
made some gink believe they have some staple there that I ama sure
they baven't got though rill admit they kaven't got though r'tl admit
they have some better staple on an average than Snyder has, as Colora-
do is getting the best of scurry Co cotton this time, whith is from the
Dunn and Ira country, as the cat claw sandy land has made the best
