MONTHLY REPORT OF THE RURAL SCHOOLS OF SCURRY COUNTY, A-1

Many people are asking the reason for the shortage of the free books. I thought it might be to make a statement relative to this matter. In the first place the books are sent to the schools in the order in which the bonds are received by the trustees. The trustees, if they were very slow in their bond, and not all have the bond yet. Then there is a scarcity of labor and lack of fuel in the paper mills, the delay in transportation from the paper mills to the publishers, then these same causes for delay in reaching the depositories where they are sent in car load lots. Here they are repacked and sent to the trustees all over the state with from one to three weeks delay in transportation. Then by the time they lay in the all over the state with from one to three weeks this makes considerable delay in reaching the pupils.

A few people are charging all this up to the free text book system. This is not exactly fair. We doubtless would have experienced much trouble at this time in getting books should we not had the free book system, just the same as getting sugar, coal, etc. Besides it takes some time to work out and eliminate the bad features of any new law. We were warned by representatives from the states where the system has been in vogue that the people would not be pleased with it the first year or two, but if due patience was exercised, after one or two years, the old plan would be entirely satisfactory. Remember the children of Israel after getting into the Wilderness on their way to the Promised Land wanted to return to the "flesh pots" of Egypt.

All teachers of the county should make out a bill for the books they had then have the custodian of the books sign giving name and number of the district and mark "Emergency Order" and rush at once to the Depository. Also it is high time the Supplementary readers were ordered. This is to be done at least one month before they are needed. The Attorney General has ruled that we are to use the Elson Readers as one of these, and we can choose from the other seven series one other. Three different readers should be used during the term. To neglect to do this is almost criminal. Full instructions and addresses will be found in the back of the Course of Study.

A few schools responded to the request to bring to my office the surplus new books. If all would do this, it would relieve the situation considerably.

Quite a number of schools are striving to reach the A-1 standard this year. Frequent attention to the standard cards (which should be tacked up in every school building) would help to arouse interest in this matter. Let the teachers call for this card and other blanks needed at my office.

Following is a list of the schools that have joined the Scholastic League: Ann, China Grove, Turner, Strayhorn, Bethel, Camp Springs, Snyder, High, Colonial Hill, Canyon, Independence, Ennis, Mitchell County Line, Bell, Plainview, Ira, Fluvanna, Crowder, Pyron, Dunn, Santa Fe, Lone Wolf, Woodard and Martin. We are extremely anxious that we make it 100 per cent membership for this county. We hope that the other schools will send the membership fee of \$1 at once into Dr. E. D. Shurter, Austin, and get the necessary bulletins fully explaining the

SCRUB HOGS MUST GO

The scrub hog in Texas is fast losing all of his friends. In fact war has been declared by many progressive farmers and numerous club boys, with the result that he is receiving the knife at slaughtering time in many sections, while purebreds are taking his place.

The hog is merely a transformer of feed. In other words, a machine which manufactures meat in marketable form from feed on the farm. Now as long as range conditions permitted him to gather his substance from field and forest, little thought was given to the cost of feed and the returns received, but now that feed and food are bringing real money, the thinking man wants a machine for his investment, and the purebreds are rapidly developing the fact that the ratio of gain in a given time from the same amount of feed is much greater than in the case of the scrub.

ARMY OFFICERS LAND IN MEXICO

MESSAGE FROM THEM STATES THEY WILL BE RELEASED TODAY

ARE HELD BY MEXICANS NOW

Los Angeles, Jan. 28.—After a short stay in Brownsville, Texas, the two American aviators were taken to Nogales, Arizona.

Brownsville, January 28.—A message from military authorities here to the commander of the post at Nogales, Arizona, was delivered today in eight hours and thirty minutes, by airplane, flying in relay, according to announcement at Fort Brown.

The message was handed to Lieutenant Vincent J. Maloney here at 4:25 o'clock this morning and was delivered to the Nogales Commander at 12:55 p. m. it was said.

Forced to Land

McALLEN, TEX., January 28.—The two lieutenants, Davis and Grimes, who were reported lost near Zapata, Texas, were forced to make a landing in Mexico, thirty miles south of Zapata, and are being held to night by Mexicans, though the promise has been made them that they will be released in the morning.

Promised Freedom

A message from them was received here to night which stated that they expect to gain their freedom at the time stated.

Encounter Fog

The two lieutenants became confused in the fog and followed the Solado river from Zapata into Mexico instead of proceeding on up the Rio Grande, there also being compass trouble. Thirty miles up the Solado river the plane was forced to make a landing and there the Mexicans took the two American aviators prisoners.

OUTWITTING THE LOAN SHARKS

THE GOVERNMENT PLANS TO SAVE \$100,000,000 A YEAR ON BONDS

SHARKS ARE GIVEN HIGHBALL

Will Buy Any And All Government Bonds for Sale, is The Plan. Will Loan \$45 On \$50 Bond

The government proposes a plan whereby it cannot only save itself \$100,000,000 per year, but also cheat the loan sharks out of their ill-gotten gains from needy or credulous bondholders. These bondholders, for the most part small ones, are falling over themselves disposing of their bonds, either because they need the money or because some one makes them an alluring offer.

The government proposes to stabilize the bonds and stop the scramble to get rid of them by loaning money itself on the bonds at a low rate of interest through the postal savings system, on the smaller bonds, a loan of \$45 being made on \$50 bonds and \$90 on \$100 bonds, with privilege limited only by the maturity of the bonds. So if bondholders think they must have the money they can secure it at the postoffice with prospect of redemption or at least an income on the bond and still have the money. The government expects to net at least \$100,000,000 a year at the same time so that they will not fall in the market.

It has been humiliating to the government to experience such a depression and the treasury has taken this plan to make everybody understand that the government bonds are worth par if purchasers will only consider them such.

now cheap, plentiful and easy to get. Why not save a few dollars and put them away for use in case of emergency, much the same as the soldier carries his "first aid"—his emergency treatment—with him on the battlefield? It seems to this writer that there never was a time in this country when so many people really had an opportunity to start a bank account as a nucleus to and around which may be able to build for some time.

Furthermore money will probably not continue as cheap as it now is very long. One dollar saved now may be worth twice as much two years hence; in other words, two years later one dollar may have twice the purchasing power it now has. Let us use our heads, as well as our hands, practice intelligent economy and start a saving account. This will be good for the individual and good for the country, because it will go far towards establishing and perpetuating sound prosperity.

Houston, Texas, Jan. 24.—Texas produced twice as much cotton during 1919 as any other cotton growing state and ranked third in production of corn, according to the crop summary issued by the Houston division of crop reporter of the Department of Agriculture.

Of the cotton crop of 11,000,000 bales Texas produced 2,700,000 bales Georgia ranks second with more than a million bales.

Texas produced 202,800,000 bushels of corn. Iowa with 400,000,000 bushels led corn producing states, with Illinois second with a yield of 300,000,000 bushels, and Texas third.

In oats production, Texas ranks third among the states with a total of 94,000,000 bushels being ranked in this crop again by Iowa and Illinois.

Texas produced 5,550,000 bushels of peanuts, being led only by Alabama, which produced more than 6,000,000 bushels.

Texas produced one-sixth of the rice crop grown in the United States last year. The state's total yield being 6,998,000 bushels. She was, however led by Louisiana, whose crop totaled 19,700,000 bushels; and by California with 7,800,000.

J. J. Harris of Mt. Zion community is loading out to Hale county, where he is establishing a home.

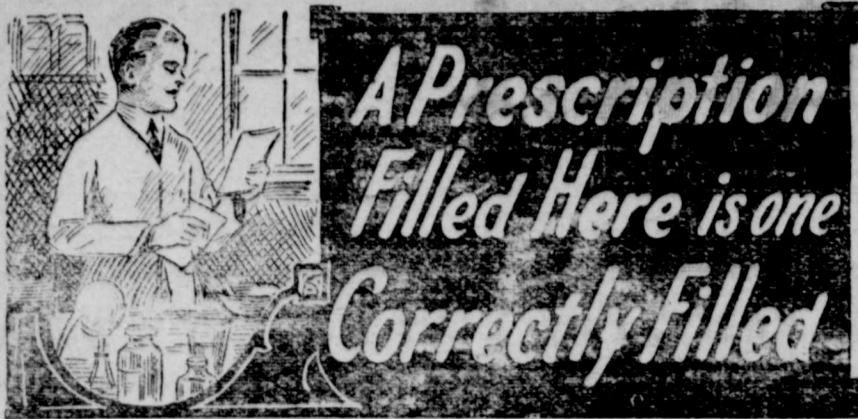

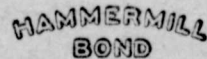

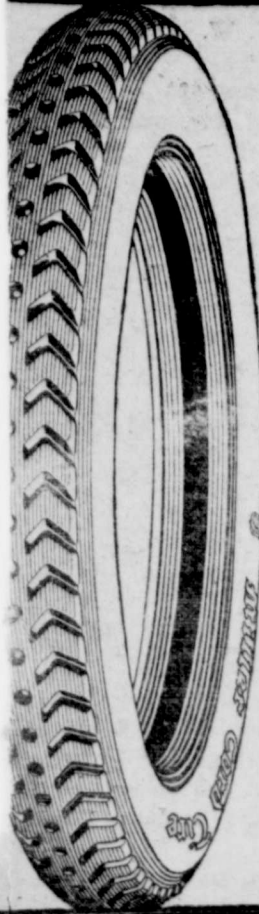

The Texas-American Company has paid a third dividend to stock holders—this time 2 per cent.

Burkburnett field, with an average daily production of 95,000 barrels, is considered the best oil pool in America.

Lydon well, in Stephens county, is making 2,000 barrels.

McCulloch county is taking on new interest in oil matters.

Texas Rangers have taken possession of the disputed oil territory on Red River in the Burkburnett field again.

The town of Desdemona was almost wiped out by fire last Monday afternoon.

A Pittsburg dispatch Monday quoted crude oil at \$5.25 a barrel.

Humble Oil and Refining Company report oil sand at 1,200 feet in the Iowa Park field.

It is reported that oil has been found near the cap rock between Gail and Lamesa. At first it was pronounced a 20 barrel well, but after halting the production it was estimated at eight barrels.

The Mount Pleasant people at Fluvanna are still in hard rock at about 700 feet.

"The Stanton people are being hindered at the Riley well but will soon be ready for business at the Trevey location at Knapp.

The Snyder Oil Association will have a meeting of share holders at the Court House this afternoon to discuss the matter of taking up the slacker and going ahead with the Walker well.

People in other states have their eyes on the Snyder territory.
