SAVING SAVAGES IN THE WILD SOUTH SEA ISLANDS

By Martin Johnson. In a few recent articles I have pictured the ignorance, the filth, the idol worshipping, the lazines, the brutality, and the general 'worthlessness of the savages of the South Sea Islands and the greatest compliment I can think of to the churches of today is that they send out men to combat these conditions and that the misionaries, in spite of the greatest of handicaps, are slowly working a great change in the life of the natives. It seems utterly impossible to do anything with them until you have visited a few of the mission stations. You would hardly identify the natives there as kindred to these terrible savages still in the bush.

The first mission station we came to was conducting Episcopal Mission near the island of Auki. He had not seen a white man for months and Mrs. Johnson was the first white woman he had seen in years. He was a young man with a sublime faith in his ability to turn the natives to civilized ways and he lived there in that lonesome cauntry carrying on his work.

Little can it be appreciated what this means. It is not merely getting them to go to church, but it is a case of making them keep clean, an almost impossible task, and of making them intelligently care for their bodies.
