In a few recent articles I have pic-
tured the ignorance tured the ignorance, the filth, the
idol worshipping, the lazine:s, the diol worshipping, the lazine: ${ }^{\text {and }}$, the
brutality, and the general worthdessness of the savages of the South Sea Islands and the greatest compliment I can think of to the
churches of today is churches of today is that they send
out men to combat these conditions out men to combat these conditions
and that the misionaries, in spite of and that the misionaries, in spite of
the greatest of handicaps, are slowly working a great change in the life of the natives. It seems utterly impossible to do anything with them
until you have visited until you have visited a few of the
mission stations. You would hardly identify the natives there as kindred to these terrible savages still in the bush.
The first mission station we came
to was conducting Episcopal to was conducting Episcopal Mission near the island of Auki. He had no
seen a white man for months and Mrs. Johnson was the first white woman he had seen-in years. He was
a young man with a sublime faith in his abisty to turn the natives to civilized ways and he lived there in
that lonesome cauntry carrying oa Little can it be appreciated what
this means. It is not merely getting this means. It is not merely getting
them to go to church out it is a case them to go to churchep clean, an almost impossible task, and of mak
ing them intelligently care for their bodies. Hundreds of the natives boay and they merely scratch then and go on spreading infection every-
where. It is very hard to make them where. It is very hard to make them
see the value of medical attention see the value of surely coming around

We later went to Bunana, a mission island conducted by the Rev. Mr. Wilson and his sister, a most
charming woman. They have an encharming woman. They have an en-
tire little island to themselves and theyare educating a number of little native boys. They believe they can train there boys and in turn send them out to carry the ways of civili--
they have made wonderful progress they have made wonderful progress
for the youngsters were polite and for the youngsters were polite
clean and already a fer of them can read and write a little English. Not alone are the missionaries in-
terested in this work. Scattered throughout the islands are a few brave men who have ventured to
start plantations a nd they are a big influence in getting tha savages into ways of cleanliness and industry and under their guidance many of the natives have turned planters. Indeed
these pioneers have theso pioneers have t, ned a few o
the islands into celightful paradise the islans.

Notable among the planters are Mir Bell, Mr, Markham, J. J. Hardy, Ton Chapind, Tom Sterlng, Billy Gibso:1 Mr. Higgin and Mr. and Mrs. Kerr They have many friends ammeng the
natives and in their way they ar natie kings on their own plantations.
They co-operate with the misions in
every way and as the number of bi brave hardy men ploneers increase so 1 am sure will the saving ofth
savages be more and more assured. savages be more and more assured.
The white men are always bitterly opposed by the old native chiefs who opposed by the old nalve of their
are exceedingly jealous are exceedingly authority. Wesaw the ruins of a few old plantations and missions which had been completely wiped out by
raids of the savages in the old days, raids of the savages in the old days,
and even now many a native who ts
and suspected of attemptind to join the
missions is murdered by his tribe companions.
So strong is the hatred of many of
the bush savages frem the bush savages for those who have
in a measure met the pioneers of civin a measure met the ploneers of civalone four hundred of them live in an armed camp to protect themselves These four hundred natives cross over daily in canoes to the mainland
of Mallicola to attend their gardens and at night return in their canoes coanuts. A
