THE NEW METHODIST COLLEGE

Abilene Reporter.
By the action of the board of education of the Northwest Texas Conference, in session here Friday under the direction of Bishop William F. McMurry, a recommendation will be made at the next meeting of the conference that will result in the location at Abilene of an A-1 college under the control and direction of the Methodist church.

The bid which Abilene made for this school was attractive in every way and one of the most liberal ever offered a school in Texas. It calls for a donation of \$200,000 from a band of Abilene Methodists who feel the need for such an institution in this part of the state. The citizenship of Abilene will add another \$100,000 and a beautiful site of 25 acres has also been contributed. In addition Abilene agreed to raise another \$100,000 as endowment, raising the total actual offer of this city to \$450,000, supplemented by perpetual free water for the institution. The general conference of the Methodist church will add \$150,000 as endowment, which will start the school off on a solid financial basis and will insure its success.

That the Methodists of West Texas need an A-grade college located at some point in this conference is apparent to every person who has looked into the matter at all. That Abilene is preeminently the place for this school is just as apparent. The city has reached a population where it is financially able to support the college and here has always been in Abilene a school spirit unsurpassed in any city in the world.

Abilene is situated so that it at once becomes an ideal location for an institution of this kind because of the pleasant climatic conditions and civic advantages of the city. People like to live in Abilene. The many public improvements now under way will add much to the comforts of Abilene as a residential city.

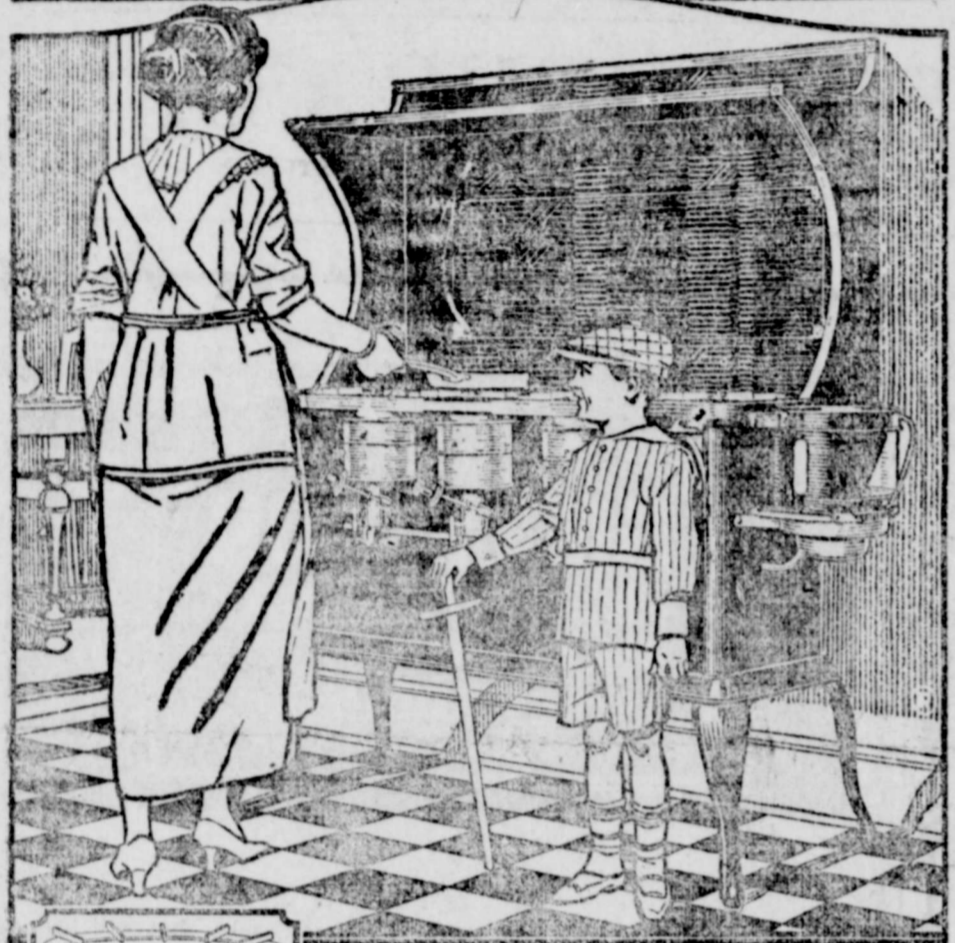

TO THE CITIZENS OF SNYDER AND SCURRY COUNTY

Owing to the serious nature of the labor situation, Snyder is in imminent danger of losing the compress and oil mill. Unless these two institutions are permitted to employ negro laborers they will be forced to move to other locations. The compress has already closed down for the season on account of inability to keep laborers, and the oil mill has only been able to operate on half time.

We believe that such industries as the compress and oil mill should be encouraged, they being the only pay-rolls we now have. We feel that they are essential to the success of our town, and knowing that it is impossible to operate them without negro labor, we think it would be a serious mistake to not permit the negro laborer to remain here during the cotton gathering season and while the oil mill and compress are operating.

We have noticed in a newspaper of recent date that there is some resentment against the negro laborer. Knowing that negro labor is absolutely essential to the farmer during the cotton picking season, and to the oil mill and compress in all cotton growing countries, we feel that we should urge that the negro who behaves himself be allowed to stay, and that our newspapers refrain from publishing articles that would tend to frighten the negro away.

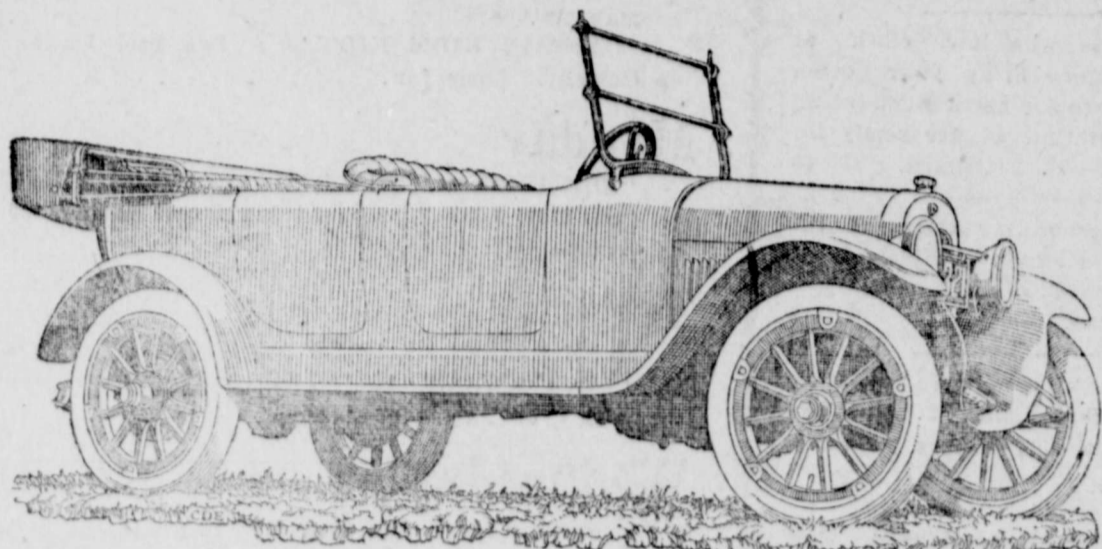

**SAVING SAVAGES IN THE
WILD SOUTH SEA ISLANDS**

By Martin Johnson.

In a few recent articles I have pictured the ignorance, the filth, the idol worshipping, the laziness, the brutality, and the general worthlessness of the savages of the South Sea Islands and the greatest compliment I can think of to the churches of today is that they send out men to combat these conditions and that the missionaries, in spite of the greatest of handicaps, are slowly working a great change in the life of the natives. It seems utterly impossible to do anything with them until you have visited a few of the mission stations. You would hardly identify the natives there as kindred to those terrible savages still in the bush.

The first mission station we came to was conducting Episcopal Mission near the island of Auki. He had not seen a white man for months and Mrs. Johnson was the first white woman he had seen in years. He was a young man with a sublime faith in his ability to turn the natives to civilized ways and he lived there in that lonesome country carrying on his work.

Little can it be appreciated what this means. It is not merely getting them to go to church, but it is a case of making them keep clean, an almost impossible task, and of making them intelligently care for their bodies. Hundreds of the natives walk about with sores all over their body and they merely scratch them and go on spreading infection everywhere. It is very hard to make them see the value of medical attention but they are surely coming around to it.

We later went to Bunana, a mission island conducted by the Rev. Mr. Wilson and his sister, a most charming woman. They have an entire little island to themselves and they are educating a number of little native boys. They believe they can train these boys and in turn send them out to carry the ways of civilization. They have made wonderful progress for the youngsters were polite and clean and already a few of them can read and write a little English.

Not alone are the missionaries interested in this work. Scattered throughout the islands are a few brave men who have ventured to start plantations and they are a big influence in getting the savages into ways of cleanliness and industry and under their guidance many of the natives have turned planters. Indeed these pioneers have turned a few of the islands into delightful paradise-like spots.

Notable among the planters are Mr. Bell, Mr. Markham, J. J. Hardy, Tom Chapin, Tom Sterling, Billy Gibson, Mr. Higgin and Mr. and Mrs. Kerr. They have many friends among the natives and in their way they are little kings on their own plantations. They co-operate with the missions in every way and as the number of big brave hardy men pioneers increase so I am sure will the saving of the savages be more and more assured.

The white men are always bitterly opposed by the old native chiefs who are exceedingly jealous of their authority. We saw the ruins of a few old plantations and missions which had been completely wiped out by raids of the savages in the old days, and even now many a native who is suspected of attempting to join the missions is murdered by his tribe companions.

So strong is the hatred of many of the bush savages for those who have in a measure met the pioneers of civilization that on the island of Vao alone four hundred of them live in an armed camp to protect themselves. These four hundred natives cross over daily in canoes to the mainland of Mallicola to attend their gardens and at night return in their canoes loaded with yams, bananas, and coconuts. A strong guard is left at the gardens.

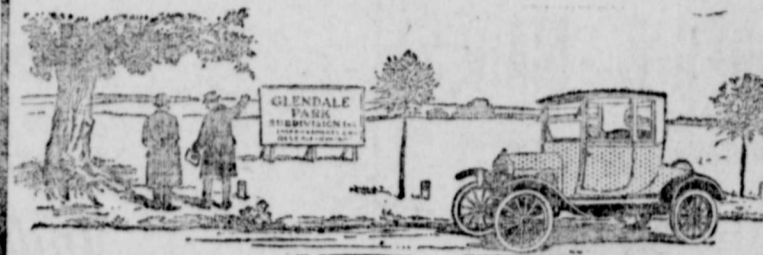
The bush natives are not familiar with the making of boats and canoes as the others are and they cannot follow them from the mainland to their island home, but they frequently raid the gardens and attempt to destroy them. Vao is a tiny little island with just room enough to live on and no space for farms so the natives are forced to the mainland. This condition of welfare has obtained there for many years.

Many missionaries have been killed and carried away into the interior and the British Government has sent several punitive expeditions after the murderers but with little success. The sailors cannot get far through the intense jungles. The only real successful methods of punishing the savages who raid missions is to shell them with long range guns of the ships and on occasions this

has resulted in the freeing of missionaries who were captured and carried away alive.

The most difficult thing in converting the savage is to make him change his attitude toward the women folk. They persist in making the women do all of the work while they sit around and look on. The women do not seem to care but once the young girls feel the refining influence of any one of the few missionaries in the island they are lost to the savage life forever. They will never submit to the tribal customs and the man who would marry them must follow their dictation.

One incident occurred near Vao which is an illustration of the cave man methods of the men. Mrs. Johnson and I walked down to the beach one afternoon to watch the natives come to their island home from the mainland. One large canoe came up with an old chief who had been proclaiming on many occasions a desire to join one of the missions. In the canoe, however, he had his five wives and they were all loaded down with yams, bananas, and other edible articles. He got out, sat down on the beach, and yelled to the wives to pull the heavy canoe out of the water.

While they struggled he turned to Mrs. Johnson and said, pointing to the wives: "You go help Marys (native name for all women) pull 'em one fellow boat long shore."

Mrs. Johnson huddled in a little closer to me and then in the best lingo the natives could understand she cried: "What, man, me no work. White man belong me. Me that she was no better than his Marys belong Vao."

The chief grunted, spat on the ground, and looked at Mrs. Johnson as if he wanted her to understand that she was no better than his Marys

and that she should be no walking around with clothes on.
