Austin, Texas, June 1 .- A cotton quarantine against all Texas will result in the substitute pinkboll worm bill, submitted by the joint investigating committee Saturday is passed by the legislature, Dr. C. L. Marlatt, chairman of the federal horticultural board warned today, returning to Washington.

The proposed Walters-Cuerton bill, if enacted, he said will force a quarantine against all Texas by making impossible prompt and continuing inspection of regions nuder suspicion such as the known infested area and surrounding teritory, which received seed from Louisiana, in the last three years.

Washington, June 1 .- After brief discussion the House today adopted a resolution providing for adjournment of Congress sine die Saturday next at 4 p. m, and sent it to the Senate where similar action is expected by leaders.

No record vote was taken and some Democrats opposing the resolution were unable to force a roll call. Failing in this they vainly sought a reconsideration, but were defeated, 129 to 52..

Along with the formal action on the adjornment measure both Senate and House adopted speedup program to clear a mass of legislation.

EFFECT OF SUIT AGAINST FARM LOAN BANKS

> Houston, Texas, May 29, 1920 .-Referring to the temporary suspension in the closing of new loans by Federal Land Banks, M. H. Gossett, President of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, gave out the following statement:

"At the instance of the Farm Mortgage Bankers Association of America representing the old line mortgage companies, a suit was filed in the United StatesCircuit Court at Kansa City, and was tried in October, 1919. This suit involved an attack on the validity of the Feder-We are reasonably well situated al Farm Loan Act, including the tax immediately following. After keeping the case under advisement for months, the Supreme Court announced that it desired a re-argument of the case, but failed to name a time for such re-argument before the summer adjournment. 
"In January when we had every reason to expect an early decision of the case, and in order to continue the closing of loans when checks were being passed to borrowers at the rate of \$2,000,000 per month. this bank borrowed from commercial banks to tide us over a part of this waiting period, but on March 15, in view of the unexpected delay by the Supreme Court in reaching a decision, we stopped the closing of loans. In this situation, Congress has just passed a bill authorizing the secretary of the Treasury to buy a limited amount of Federal Land Bank Bonds, which will enable this and other Federal Land Banks in the system to repay loans from commercial banks which enabled us to



SOUTHERN BAPTIST **CONVENTION CLOSES**

LARGEST RELIGIOUS ASSEMBLY IN COUNTRY PLANS FU-TURE PROGRAM.

The seventy-fifth annual session of the Southern Baptist Convention, which has just recently closed in Washington, D. C., was marked by an attendance of over ten thousand, and was declared to be the most remarkable session of the convention in its history. Union Plaza of Washington has not been so crowded since war days as it was when the hosts of Southern Baptists bore down upon the gates of Liberty Hut, the Billy Sun-day tabernacle, where the sessions of the convention were held. The attendance was so great that as many as three simultaneous overflow meetings were being held in different auditoriums of the city, Liberty Hut not being able to handle half the crowds. Texas, though on the Western outskirts of the convention territory, was represented by more than 1,000 dele-

Texas Man Re-Elected President. Dr. J. B. Gambrell of Fort Worth, Texas, was reelected for the fourth consecutive year as president of the body, thus breaking a twenty year precedent that no person shall serve the convention as president more than three years. His election is regarded as significant as indicating that Southern Baptists have not changed in their attitude respecting the Inter-church World Movement in declining to enter the movement. Dr. Gambreft has been the spokesman for the denomination in expressions concerning the Inter-church World Movement, and his re-election is recognition of his continued leadership among South-

Convention Addressed By Vice-President Marshall.

Vice-President of the United States, Thomas R. Marshall, in an address of welcome to the Baptists on behalf of the Government, pleaded for the fuller acceptance of Jesus Christ in the minds and hearts of individual men and women, and added that it was his conviction that peace would never come to the world unless founded upon the teachings and principles of the lowly Nazarene. In his address Mr. Marshall paid his respects to churches that had forgotten to preach the gospel and were trying to reform society by dabbling in politics and trying to reform the government. He de-clared that the true churches were the anchors of safety for the nation.

Letter From President Read. During the proceedings of the Convention the following letter from President Wilson was read:

THE WHITE HOUSE Washington, May 12, 1920.

My Dear Dr. Tupper: It is a matter of genuine and very deep regret on my part that I cannot personally greet the members of the Southern Baptist Convention now gathering to hold the Diamond Anniversary Convention in this city. It would be a great pleasure to me, if I could meet the members personally and express my deep concern in all the great interests which they represent. It is of special significance and timeliness that a great Christian Convention should be held in Washington, because the nation now faces nothing less than the question whether it is to help Christian people in other parts of the world to realize their ideals of justice and of ordered peace. And I am sure that the nation will listen with the greatest deference to the utterances

of the Convention. Cordially and sincerely yours

WOODROW WILSON. Final Report on 75 Million Campaign Dr. R. L. Scarborough of Fort Worth, Texas, General Director of the Baptist 75 Million Campaign, made his final report on the results of the drive. The official figures reached a total of \$92,-630,923. The expenses of the campaign for raising this huge sum were remarkably low, being less than three-fourths of one per cent. Following the report a committee, consisting of one member from each state, and headed by Dr. F. S. Groner, of Dallas, Texas, was appointed to make recommendations for the program during the next four years of the five-year campaign.

Truett Addresses 10,000 From Capitol Steps

The climax of the convention was reached in an address by Dr. Geo. W. Truett of Dallas, Texas, delivered from the steps of the east entrance of the Capitol, overlooking the spot where the presidential inaugurations are held. Dr. Truett spoke on Baptists and Civil and Religious Liberty to an audience estimated at ten thousand, which frequently cheered him during his references to the League of Na-tions and to President Wilson. "Standing in the shadow of the Senate Chamber," said Dr. Truett, "I declare that the moral forces of the country, without regard to political party, regard the delay on the League of Nations a national and world-wide tragedy. I can certify to men of all political par-ties that the moral forces of this counwill not be silent until there is put forth a great league of nations that shall strive with all its might to put an end to the diabolism and horror of war. I thank God that that stricken man yonder in the White House pleaded and pleads yet that the Na tion will take its part with others in bringing a new era wherein shall dwell righteousness and peace." In his address Dr. Truett recounted the fight Baptists have made and won for civil and religious liberty in America. "With the intelligent Baptist," de-clared the speaker, "religion is forever voluntary uncoerced, dictated by no power, civil or ecclesiastical.'

These plans have been so drawn as to take care of every phase of church activity, the Sunday School and other departments being so provided for as to enable them to do their most efficient work. And a modern building, containing all these essential provisions, can be provided by any community that is able to build an oldfashioned one-room church building. as the cost for the modern structure is no more than that of the old-style

Big Loan Fund Provided.

To aid deserving congregations in building adequate houses of worship, the church building loan department was established six years ago and already more than 700 churches have been helped in building needed houses. The initial fund, established for this purpose, was fixed at \$1,000,000 and an additional \$1,000,000 will be received from the 75 Million Campaign. Applications pending now aggregate \$1,000,000 and loans are being made at the rate of \$50,000 per month. No loans are being made in excess of onethird of the value of the property, and the loan made must clear the property of all other indebtedness and thus make it possible to dedicate the build-

From the 75 Million Campaign the Home Mission Board will receive, also, \$2,500,000 to be used as gifts in the building of additional churches during the next five years, but this sum will be expended largely in aiding churches in stragetic points, among them being educational centers where it is desired to erect churches for premoting the religious life of students, especially of those students affiliated with Baptist churches
