Austin, Texas, June 7.-Governor Hobby gave out the following statement:

During April of this year a reprentative of the Division of High hools of the State Department of ducation visited the Snyder public hools and investigated the work in e several high school classes. The uvder high school already has nineen and one-half units of affiliation, id the visitor of this year recomends that two more units be grant-1. This will make a total of twentyie and one-half, provided that the ecimens of work done are satisctory. Many recommendations are ade for the improvement of the nyder public schools. Among the commendations made might be entioned the following, namely: 1. That a modern high school uilding be constructed as soon as onditions will permit.

2. That improvements be made lighting facilities.

3. That a modren heating system a installed if the old building is to ontinue in use for any length of me.

4. That the elementary grade liraries be made standard for classied schools.

That, provided specimens sub-5. itted are satisfactory to the examers, the following affiliation in adtional subjects be granted: Gener-Science 1 unit, Trigonometry 1-2 ait, and Commercial Arithmetic 1-2 nit.

"The Snyder high school is an anquated, inconveniently arranged ructure. It was not built accordig to present day accepted princiles of school architecture. The ghting is insufficient and incorrectarranged, coming from three sides several rooms. If the paint were



When it came to placing Bailey's name on the ballot there was considerable discussion but went on by a vote of 15 to 4.

Some men who voted for it expressed opinion that Bailey is not eligible but they are willing to let it go that way.

John W. Gaines of Bay City led opposition. Judge Huff of Wichits Falls said the committe had no authority to determine a judicial matter. Luther Nichols, a spectator. told the committee that the things they were saying about Bailey are beneath his notice.

H. S. Moran of Weatherford favored putting Bailey on the ballot and said:

"I was among the first number of men who years ago met at Dallas and demanded that he resign as a representative of the people because he was carrying the secret code of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company in his coat pocket."

Judge Gaines said that he had always been the personal and political friend of Bailey and that he still was Bailey's personal friend, declared that the legislature passed a law last year which denies the committee the right to put on the ticket the name of any man ineligible to hold office, he said, and therefore, the committe should not put his name o nthe ticket.
