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**History Will Tell It.**

Here is what Gov. James M. Cox said about President Wilson in a Jackson Day speech last January:

"Yes, history will tell it all, and the name of the man who sensed the ills of the afflicted peoples of the earth, who sympathized with their honorable aspirations for freedom, and then wove the elements of simple justice into the fabric of international policy—his name will be chanted by the children of men yet unborn, while the names of those who made from their malignant spite a senatorial cabal against Woodrow Wilson will have been consigned to a part and place in the records of time too unimportant for voice to recall or memory to retain."

And even though some so-called democrats have gone about over Texas seeking to malign and condemn President Wilson, his name will go into history as the greatest statesman of the twentieth century.

**Bought a Scurry County Home.**

Mr and Mrs. R. F. Reed of Klondike, Texas, spent last week in Scurry county. Klondike is a town on the Texas Midland railroad between Cooper and Paris and Mr. Reed is the station agent. The time of year had come for his vacation and he and Mrs. Reed decided to spend the time in seeing West Texas. They came, looked about over different parts of the west and came to Snyder. They liked the prospect here and to prove it, they bought the J. H. Day farm at Union, five miles west of town, paying a good round price for the place. They may not move to it for awhile, but should they decide to come west to live, they will have a good, well improved farm home ready for them. In the meantime, they will read the Signal and know what is doing here.

**The Public is the Victim.**

Here in Snyder and other towns the people are paying tremendously high prices for tomatoes, watermelons and cantelopes, while the growers in East Texas are seeing their products rot in the fields, and it is all because of lack of transportation facilities.

The railroad people say they can't furnish the cars and yet it is said that long strings of freight cars are parked for days and weeks in all terminal yards. In other years, when crops were as abundant as now there was not so much trouble in getting freight moved. During the war the excuse was accepted that the government was using all the available cars, but that demand is now out of the way and the public can't understand why the cars then used to haul war supplies cannot now be found for commercial uses. If the railroad commission is for anything, it ought to stand four square for the public and see that shipping facilities are not withheld to the detriment of both the producer and the consumer.

**Cleaned Bailey's Plow.**

Cone Johnson said the other day in Fort Worth, in speaking of the harmonious work of the San Francisco convention:

"We cleaned Bailey's plow on every proposition he stood on and now he comes back with the open shop, a last desperate stand that is nothing but camouflage. What has the governor of the state of Texas to do with the open shop or the closed shop? Is the state to take sides in favor of the open shop and make it unlawful for laborers to organize and to deal with their employers by means of an organization? Is a man to be compelled by law to employ non-union labor exclusively against his wishes?"

The Democratic platform declared for the right of employer and employes to practice the principle of collective bargaining through representatives of their own selection, laborers having the right to organize and to deal with employers in an organized capacity. Employers to a large extent are already organized through incorporation and they deal with their employes through agents or representatives.

"It is likewise a fundamental

right of laborers to remain outside of organizations and to seek and hold employment wherever they can find it, and neither the rights of capital nor those of labor, whether organized or unorganized, include the right to resort to violence, force or lawlessness to enforce their demands. These are simple and old-time principles of Democracy and the state must not take sides with either the open or so-called closed shop. Bailey's open-shop proposition is mere camouflage."

A news special sent out from Dallas says: "Printing presses and linotype machines are being installed by the Dallas board of education at Bryan Street high school for publication of school papers and to instruct boys and girls of journalism classes in printing and typesetting. Teachers of English language will have charge of journalism classes while the mechanical instruction will be given by manual training instructors." Texas has maintained a school of journalism at Austin for several years. It seems the main line is teaching pupils to write copy for the printer and study what is termed "front end" methods. They may teach typography and machine work, but an application there for an operator failed of results. It is easy enough to find copy writers, but in these days there are not printers and machine operators enough to supply the demand.

Stephen Bell, writing in a New York publication, says that Thomas O. Marvin of Boston insists that the United States should cancel the \$12,000,000 debt owed to this country by European nations in order that American workers may have employment, for he argues that this enormous debt will have to be paid in goods and that American mills, factories and workers will be forced into idleness. That sort of logic if carried into individual life would suggest that a creditor should cancel a debtor's obligation rather than accept payment in cattle, hogs, cotton or grain, because to accept these commodities his fields and ranches would be of no use to him. Not many business men would refuse these things if they are all the debtor has to pay with.

"The San Francisco convention was a great assemblage of Democrats from every state, from every district in the United States, and from all our foreign possessions. It was the most unanimous convention I have ever attended. There was not a discordant note in the song of praise of President Wilson and the achievements of his administration. When his name was mentioned and his picture unveiled, the delegates rose as one man and gave thunders of applause, which even Bailey might have heard in Texas if he had not been so busy defaming the President and his record."—Cone Johnson.

Relating to Taxation by School Districts.  
Senate Joint Resolution No. 17.  
Proposing an amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by exempting independent and common school districts from the limitation of a total tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year, and making an appropriation therefor.  
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:  
Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows: (Creating a new Section 3.)  
Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every inhabitant of this state, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem state tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of the children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the state and the legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the legislature may authorize


an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed, or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation, in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by general or special law.  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the Amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the limitation upon the amount of school district tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation shall not apply to independent or common school districts created by general or special law," and all those opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots "Against the amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the limitation upon the amount of school district tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation shall not apply to independent or common school districts created by general or special law."  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.  
Sec. 4. That the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropri-

ted, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.





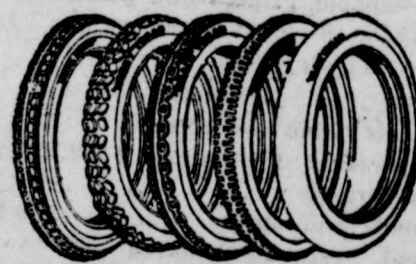

Mr. Clark states that the meeting made a very good showing, though there are a number of republicans in the county who were not present. He counts on about 150 republican voters in the county.

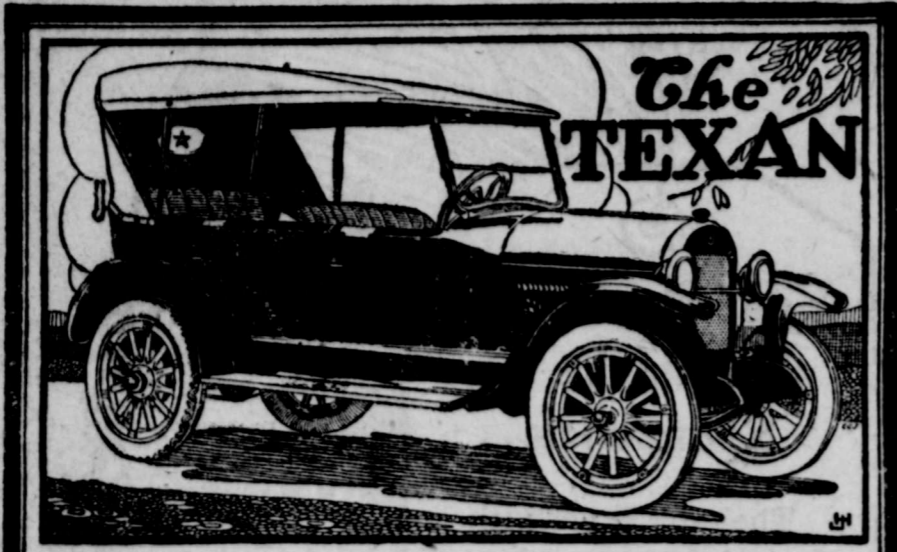
**No Shortage of Gasoline.**

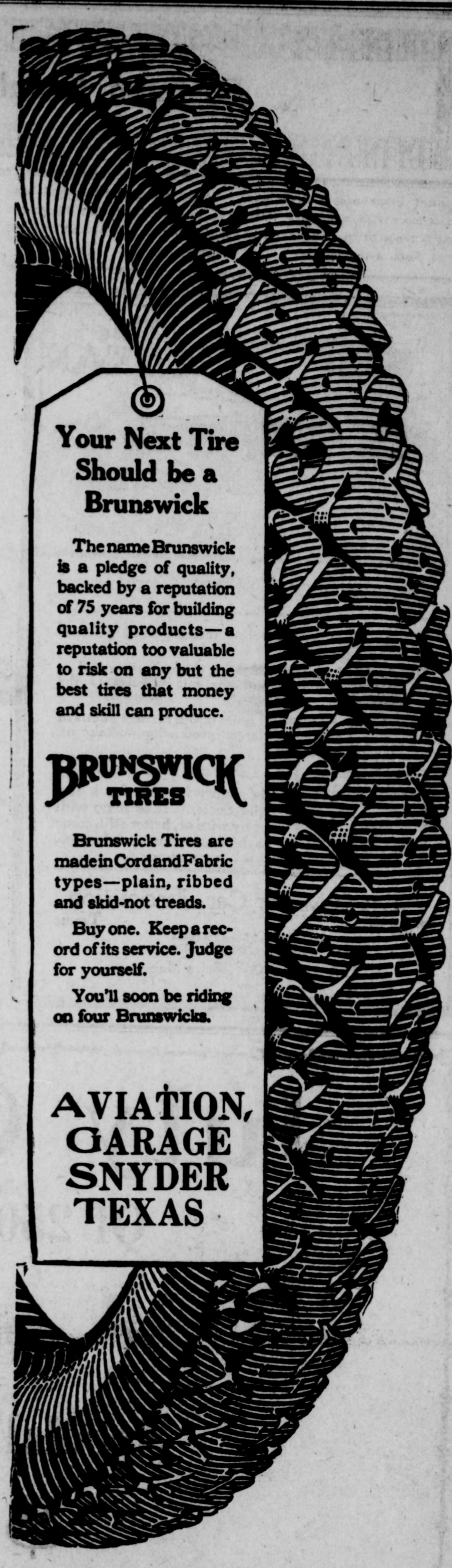
