The Agricultural Department at stin has sent out the itemized ret of the committee of 42 experts ck and implements, allowed for C. E. Leslie. st of seed and labor, ginning, wrapig and hauling to market, and find seated. at it costs \$80.19 an acre, and eir findings and recommendations aphs of their report, viz.:

Based upon the estimate of the reau of crop estimates of the govnment, of 174 pounds of lint per re, makes the cost per pound cents.

We, the price-recommending comittees appointed by Hon. Fred W. avis.. commissioner of agriculture, , find the cost of producing the 320 cotton crop, and to recommend te minimum price therefor, having one over the reports, find them onservative, and consider the proucers entitled to at least two cents er pound over cost, as profit, makig 48 cents as the average price the rop should bring, and which would ntitle the better grades to 50 cents r more.

Relaizing that the farmers may et the above prices if those who an will withhold their cotton from aarket, we urge every one who can, ot only in Texas but all over the south, to cease selling at once for a ess price, and co-operate with the Texas farmers in their efforts for justice and financial freedom.

The committee urges the farmers o warehouse their cotton, protect it from the weather, and not to sell for less than the above price, to sell slowly and never sell on a declining market; and to watch the market in the East as closely as the East watches the supply in 'he South.

Snyder's first bale of 1920 cotton came in Monday, September 13. It was raised and marketed by J. S. Lovelady of Polar. The cotton was ginned here Monday by the Farmers' Union Gin company, weighed 460 pounds and was bought by the Blackard Hardware Co. for 35 cents a pound, amounting to \$161.00.

A premium of \$52.00 was made up for Mr. Lovelady, and he was paid a total of \$213.00.

Mr. Lovelady, ! ke everybody else, hadn't much to say when asked about his cotton crop. The worms are there, but the main trouble is the plant has few bolls on it. This may be caused by pests but the general opinion is that wet weather has prevented fruitage.

Texas Cigarette Law.

Any person who shall sell, give or barter, or cause to be sold, given or bartered, to any person under sixteen years, or knowingly sell to any other person for delivering to such minor, without the written consent of the parent or guardian of such minor, and cigarette or tobacco in any of its forms, shall be fined not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars.

Will Call Legislature in Special Session.

It is now expected that Gov. Hobby will call the legislature in special session early next week to consider the Galveston situation and provide for keeping the port open to ship-Also to further regulate the voting franchise. It has been held that under the 19th amendment that poll tax and Gov. Hobby is desirous to provide lawe to prevent fraudulent voting. He will also probably submit a new utilities bill.

Memphis Commerrial Appeal. It is as true in politics as it is in pugilism that whenever a man receives a knockout blow his days of usefulness are ended. School Tax Amendment.

The \$4,000,000 appropriation made by the legislature to increase teachers' salaries was intended as temporary in order to tide over the present session until the amendment can pass and become effective. This some older may be seen any day amendment, which is to be voted on at the next general election in November, proposes to remove the limitation on the amount of taxes that may be levied by school districts.

> The special appropriation for immediate rel'ef allows \$14.50 per pupil this year, but afterwards the per capita will drop back unless the peopie are permitted to increase their taxes and the better teachers will seek other lines of work and our public schools will retrograde.

As a rule the people are s'ow about adopting a constitutional amendment that calls for more taxes, but in this case the life of our schools depends on it and this is one kind of taxation that is of special advantage to the poorer people.

It is gratifying to note that a numper of boys and girls from the rural schools are enrolling in the high school department of the Snyder public schools. These students make a highly valuable contribution to the high school spirit. It is the sincere aim of those charged with the administration of the Snyder public schools to work in absolute this section of the state. The interests and purposes of the city schools and of the rural schools are, "and of right ought to be," identical,

The course of study in the high school department has been made as rich and varied as it is wise under the prevailing conditions. Besides four full years in English, in mathematics, in history, in Latin and in I science, three years in Spanish and one in civics and social problems will be given. The lack of room renders it impossible at this time to offer courses in domestic economy for the girls and manual training for the boys. It is the aim, not merely the dream, of the school board to enrich the course of study with the addition of certain subjects which will greatly tend towards the enlargement of human life. But before these aims can be realized the school system must be made ready for them. Doubtless these good things will come about in due time.

James A. Garfield once describe a college a log on one end of which wasseated a student eager to learn and Mark Hopkins at the other end of the log. Garfield was crudely expressing the power of the teacher over students. But at the same time he did not intend to convey the impression that a building well adapted to school work had no place in the operation of a school. The Snyder school board has used its best efforts to meet the needs of the public in selecting this year's teachers. What our school buildings lack in convenience and adaptab'lity is attempted to be offset by employing teachers who will render a high character of servce to the community.

The Snyder public schools will this year, as during the past year, open each day's work at 8 o'cleck in the morning. Parents are urged to see that their children arrive on time. Tardiness is inexcusable. No well organized business to'erates pokiness. A public school system certainly ought to be an up-to-date business enterprise.



Bunte Bros. Confectioneries and three wholesale grocery houses were indicted today by the federal grand jury charged with profiteering in sugar. The grocery houses named are the Empire Grocery company, Hadesman Bros. and the Henderson Taylor company.

Bunte Bros. are charged with having sold 60,000 pounds of sugar which cost them \$0,100 for \$17,550. A second count alleges that they sold 60,000 of sugar which cost \$7,800 for \$17,400. Two shipments of 80,-000 pounds each were sold for \$48,-000 while the cost was \$20,800, the indictment says.

The Empire grocery company is charged with selling 600,000 pounds of sugar for \$162,000 which cost \$81,420.



GO TO EXTREMES

Health Faddists Apt to Become a Nuisance.

Hard to Deny That There Are Many Like the Unfortunate Jiggins, Who Literally "Dumb-Bell" Themselves to Death.

The following editorial from the Gary Times is printed by the Journal of the American Medical Association as a lesson to health faddists:

There is a great deal of truth in the satirical story of Jiggins, who had the health habit. Jiggins lived 20 years ago, and health was a disease with him. The Dallas News says that Jiggins took a cold plunge every morning. He said it opened the pores. After it he took a hot sponge. He said it closed the pores. He got so that he could open and shut his pores at

Jiggins used to stand and breathe at an open window for half an hour before dressing. He said it expanded his lungs. He might, of course, have had it done in a shoe shop with a boot stretcher; but, after all it cost him nothing this way. And what is half an hour?

After he had got his vest on, Jiggins used to hitch himself up like a dog in harness and do shadow exercises. He did them forward, backward and hindside up.

He could have got a job as a dog anywhere. He spent all his time at this kind of thing. In his spare time at the office he used to lie on his stomach on the floor and see if he could lift himself up with his knuckles. If he could, then he tried some other way until he found one that he couldn't do. Then he would spend the rest of his lunch hour on his stomach perfectly happy.

In the evenings, in his room, he used to lift iron bars, cannon balls, heavy dumb-bells and haul himself up to the ceiling with his teeth.

He liked it. He spent half the night slinging himself around his room. He said it made his brain clear. When he got his brain

Color Test Supreme.

The Florida supreme court recently affirmed the decision of a lower court that the color test leads the acid test in citrus fruit in determining their marketable condition. A large grower undertook to ship grapefruit that showed an average on the trees of more than one-half colored, indicating ripeness, under the law. An inspector made an acid test and seized the shipment as immature fruit. The grower appealed to the courts. The state authorities had held that the color test was secondary and that the fruit could not be shipped unless it stood the acid test. The supreme court holds that ripeness is sufficient test for shipment, but if the ripening is delayed, as it sometimes is, until after the fruit is fit for consumption, the grower may prove by the acid test that he may market the fruit.




