Governor Cox First Statement.

Governor James M. Cox in his first statement after the election said:

"For the first time in ten years the Republican party is in complete control of the legislative and executive branches of the national government. Therefore, policy as to statute and administration is with it. Its task is no longer that of the critic, but is constructor. It is my hope and firm belief that the Democracy of the nation will not attempt political sabotage. The country has seen quite enough of that.

"We are in the midst of an emergency, and the nation's every resource should co-ordinate in behalf of the things that are helpful. So long as government exists, the principles of Thomas Jefferson will be the center about which human hopes will gather. Talk of a new party is absurd. One might as well discuss the destruction of human emotions.

"In spirit I am as proud as when the fight started. I would not retrace a step nor yield a single jot of principle. It was a privilege to make the contest in the face of overwhelming odds. There is a distinct difference between defeat and surrender. The flag of Democracy still flies as the symbol of things more enduring than the passions and resentment that comes with the aftermath of war."

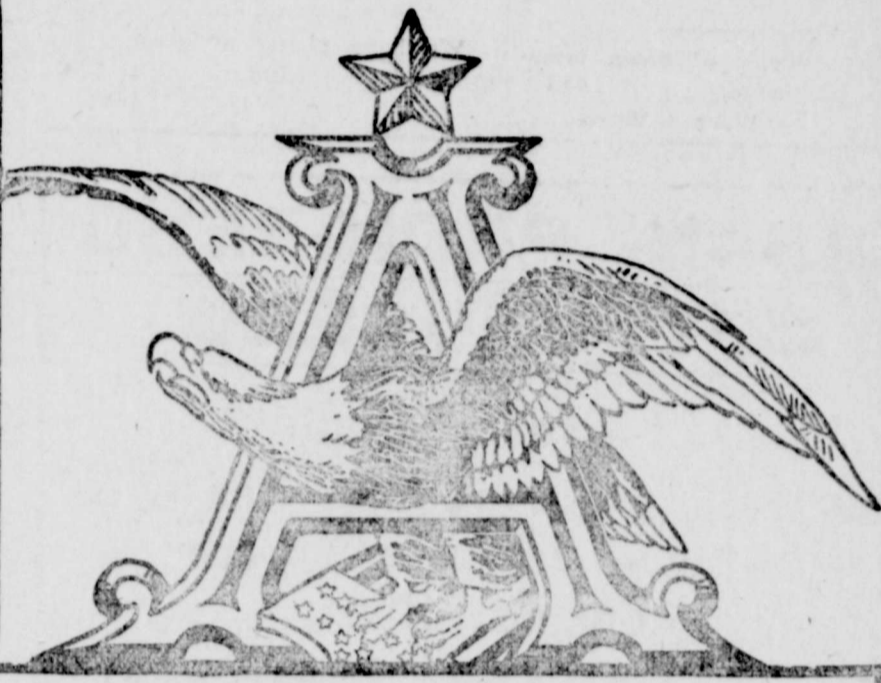

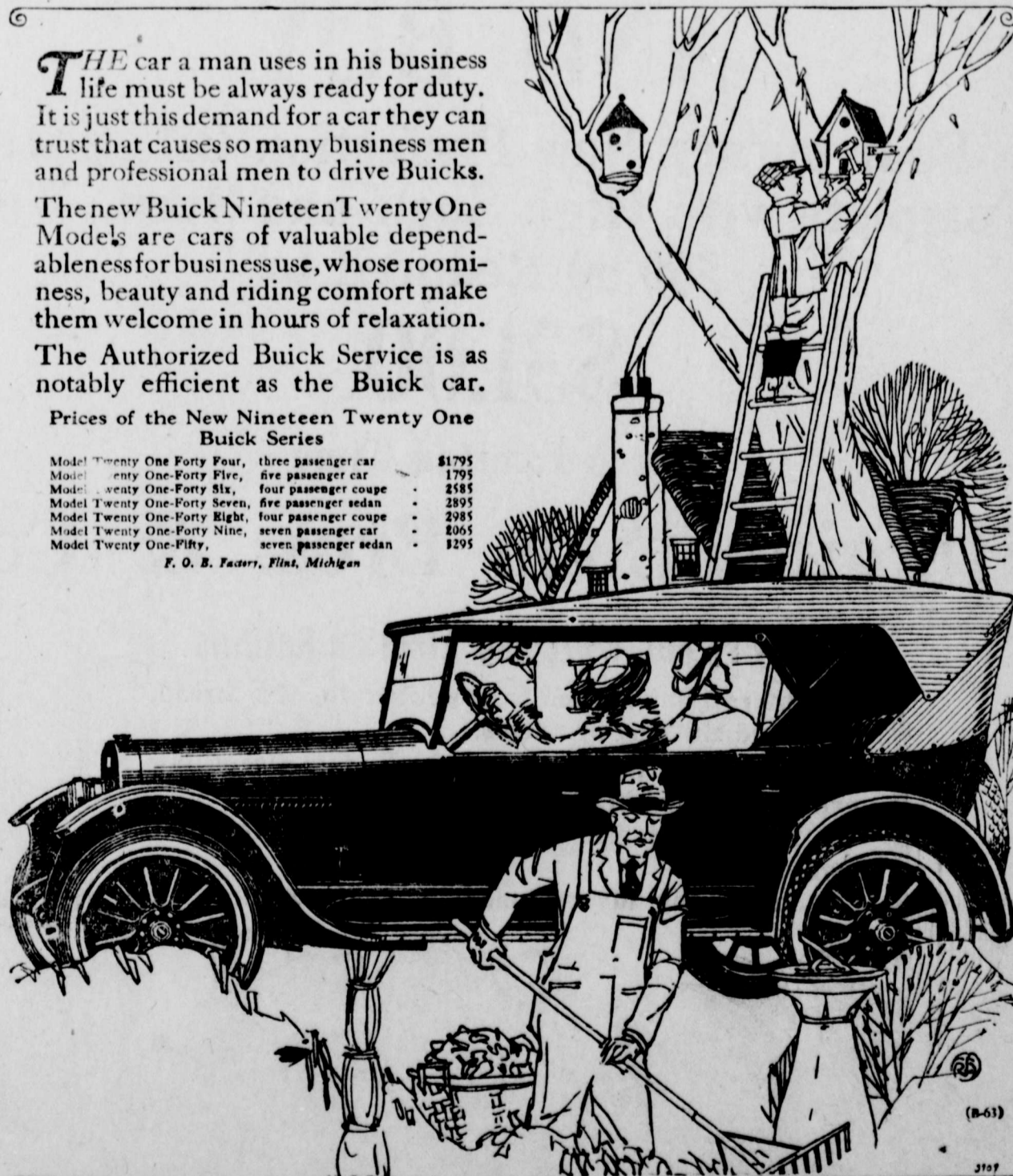

An Appeal to Hold Cotton.

At the cotton conference held in Dallas October the 21st, more than one thousand Texas bankers pledged themselves to put over the Acreage Reduction Campaign in their county. County chairmen have been appointed for each county in the cotton producing belt of the state, with a representative from each local bank as a local Captain. The campaign is being aggressively pushed. Reports reaching this office from over the entire state show that farmers, both land owners and tenants, are signing the pledge for a reduction of next year's cotton acreage.

The sales of wheat and other winter grains are reported unusually heavy and thousands of acres usually devoted to cotton are being sown in grain.

The sentiment against the gathering of extreme low grades and "bolly" cotton is almost universal. From every section comes reports of

cattle being turned into the fields to graze the late maturing scattered cotton, every pound of which would ordinarily be picked. It is apparent that the Texas crop will be very considerably reduced from this cause.

The key to the situation is—hold for the next sixty days as we have for the past twenty days, as there will be a demand for every bale produced, at prices, much higher than now prevail. Gather no extreme low grades and "bollies"; prove to the world that acreage age will be reduced, which will have a good influence upon present prices, and bring about a system of diversification. Build permanently a system of bonded warehouses covering the entire state that will protect the cotton from country damage and permit the financing of same by member and Regional bank while in the hands of the producer thus enabling our people to protect themselves from the annual recurring slump in prices.
