ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION BY WILL LAYNE POST

The eleventh day of November has set aside by America and the Nations of the world as a memorial to the declaration of the armistice on the western front. No from the struggling armies was welcome than this declaration. Millions at home and abroad this the most endearing message in years of terrific struggle. No in the world's history is more tre with human significance; to recall no day can mean more, for the Armistice Day ranks with the Memorial Day and Fourth of July marks the dawn of a new era in the history of the world, the triumph of civilization over barbarism, the defeat of the aggrandisement of domination and the enslavement of the principals of democracy. Monarchical authority brought reason to a torn world of the elements which are the fundamentals of American Government. None can say but that the boys who left shores for foreign lands were the first that terminated the conflict. It is to them that we must offer gratitude.

Will Layne Post of the American Legion in Snyder observed Armistice Day with Open House and a Reception to the relatives and friends of the boys of the Legion and the Legion in general. Assisted by the members of the Red Cross the Legion Rooms presented a gay and pleasing appearance; the national colors and bunting were arranged with pleasing effect. One end of the club room had been elevated for a committee of the Legion and a stage which faced seats for an American Cross workers met the guests of several hundred. More trained teachers are needed as evidenced by the shortage this year. Then there is a greater incentive now to become a teacher than there used to be, because salaries have considerably increased.

FINBERG TO MAKE FIRST SHIPMENT OF COTTON NOV. 30

Abilene, Nov. 12.—Farmers desirous of shipping their cotton to European markets under the so-called Finberg marketing plan have until Dec. 1, according to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, which indorsed the plan for the reduction of the low grade staple of the west.

Under the plan proposed farmers turn their cotton over to George Finberg of this city at the compress point, attaching their bill of lading a draft for \$20 to cover transportation, marine insurance and other incidentals. The cotton is shipped in large lots by the Finberg Company from Galveston to three marketing centers in Europe, where special connections of the company sell, if possible, the staple at the highest market price at a propitious time. The proceeds less 5 per cent for brokerage are sent to the F. & M. National bank at Abilene, trustee, where disbursement is made to the farmer. It has been estimated that there are at least 100,000 bales of holly cotton from the 1919 crop which cannot find a market anywhere in this country for a price that will pay for the picking.

To remove this drug from the market by shipping it to Germany and other countries where this grade of cotton is in strong and steady demand and secure for it a price that will remunerate the farmer and at the same time reduce the strain on the 1920 crop, is the purpose of the scheme.

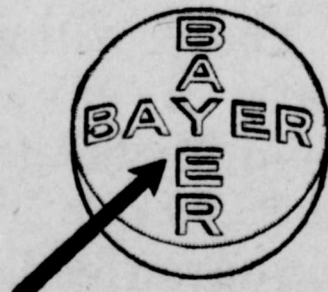

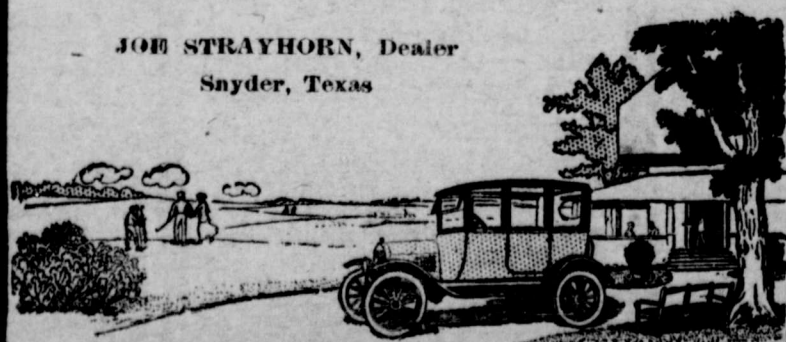

LETTER HAS MANY SCARED.

Religious Creed Alleged to Have Been Written by Christ—Timid Making Editors' Lives Miserable.

The following clipped from an exchange has been sent The News with request to publish:

County papers throughout the United States are printing what is alleged to be a letter written by Christ. In this letter was an injunction that it should be published to the world by whoever found it together with the statement that misfortune and bad luck would follow the person having possession of it in the event that it was not given publicity.

There was likewise a promise that whoever may have a copy of this in his or her possession will prosper and be followed by good fortune. This paper has received some hundreds of requests to print this letter, so if it will relieve the superstitious fear of any one, here it is:

According to the history of the letter it was written by Christ just after his crucifixion, signed by the Angel Gabriel ninety-nine years after the Savior's birth and presumably deposited by him under a stone at the foot of the cross.

On this stone appeared the legend "Blessed is he who shall turn me over."

"No one knew what the inscription meant, or seemed to have sufficient curiosity to investigate, until the stone was turned over by a little

child and the letter which follows was discovered:

"Whoever works on the Sabbath day shall be cursed. I command you to go to church and keep holy the Lord's day, without any manner of work. You shall not idle or mispend your time in bedecking yourself in superfluities of costly apparel and vain dressing, for I have ordered it a day of rest. I will have that day kept holy that your sins may be forgiven you.

"You will not break my commandments, but observe and keep them, they being written by my hand and spoken from my mouth. You shall not only go to church yourselves, but also your man servant and maid servant. Observe my words and learn my commandments.

"You shall finish your work every Saturday at 6 o'clock in the afternoon, at which hour the preparation for the Sabbath begins. I advise you to fast five days in the year, beginning on Good Friday and continuing the five days following in remembrance of the five bloody wounds I received for you and mankind.

"You shall love one another and cause them that are not baptized to come to church and receive the Holy Sacrament; that is to say, baptism, and then the Supper of the Lord, and be made a member thereof, and in so doing I will give you long life and many blessing. Your land shall be replenished and bring forth abundance and I will comfort you in the greatest temptation, and surely he that doeth the contrary shall be cursed.

"I will also send hardness of the heart on them and especially on hardened and unpenitent unbelievers. He that hath given to the poor shall find it profitable. Remember to keep the Sabbath day, for the seventh day I have taken as a resting day to myself.

"And he that hath a copy of this letter written by my own hand and spoken by my own mouth and keepeth it without publishing it to others, shall not prosper, but he that publisheth it to others shall be blessed by me and if their sins be as many as stars by night, and if they truly believe they shall be pardoned and they that believe not this writing and my commandments will have my plagues upon you and you will be consumed with your children, goods and cattle and all other worldly enjoyments that I have given you. Do but once think of what I have suffered for you; if you do, it will be well for you in this world and in the world which is to come.

"Whoever shall have a copy of this letter and keep it in their house nothing shall hurt them, neither pestilence, thunder nor lightning, and if any woman be in birth and put her trust in me she shall be delivered of her child. You shall hear no more news of me except through the Holy Scriptures until the day of judgment. All goodness and prosperity shall be in the house where a copy of this letter shall be found. Finished."

The story goes that the little child who found it passed it to one who became a convert to the Christian faith. He failed to have the letter published. He kept it, however, as a sacred memento of Christ and it passed down to different generations of his family for more than one thousand years.

During this period the family suffered repeated misfortunes, migrated

to different countries until finally one of them came to America, bringing the letter with him. They settled in Virginia, then moved further south still followed by misfortune, when finally the last member, a daughter, approached her death bed and called a neighbor, Mrs. Thompson, giving her the letter and related its history for more than one thousand years. The Thompson woman began the attempt to have it published and it first appeared in the Rome (Ga.) Tribune on Oct. 31, 1891. It then appeared in the Dalton (Ga.)
