A Signal man in company with sev eral other Snyder men made a visit one day this week to Westbrook in Mitchell county. We went in by Ira and across the river to Cuthbert and on to Westbrook.

From Cuthbert you can see the smoke of the machinery at the West- | days. brook wells. At Westbrook well No. 1, the pump was running and by standing on the ladder at the tank into which they were pumping the oil you, could see about the producton that was coming from the well. It was flowing in heads of about one half gallon every fifteen seconds. The man on the pump said it was maknig abut 25 barrels a day.

At the No. 2 well we were told a slush bucket had been lost in the well just a few minutes after it had been shot, but which was not serious. They were setting the casing and pump rods and pipe were laying on the ground. The drillers thought it was about the same class of well

A Star rig was punching a hole about 300 yards southwest of No. 1, and judging from the length of time it took to draw the slush bucket this one was something like four or five hundred feet deep.

Another well was drilling just over the rdge from Westbrook, but we did not go to this one.

A fishing job at Iatan was in progress. This well has had many difficulties and although it reached pay dirt it is feared they will have to abandon the hole.

A well was started midway between Westbrook and Colorado, with a rotary rig, but this is changng to a Standard outfit.

Reports from the Long ranch in Borden county are that they are abandoning the present hole and setting for a new test.

Such persons are allowed the exemption of \$2,000 granted a married person. In addition, they are allowed a credit of \$200 for each dependent under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective.

A married person living with husband and wife can not claim an additional \$2,000 exemption as the head of a family. His or her exemption is based upon the marital status, irrespective of the support of others gram for the diocesan auxiliary meet- living in the same household. The ing would probably be arranged by additional \$200 credit for dependents does not apply to the husband or wife of a taxpayer. For example, if a married man supports a father who is incapable of self-support, he is entitled to the \$200 credit for such person. If through force of circumstances he supports his wife away from home he is entitled to the \$2,-000 exemption allowed a married person, but not to a \$200 credit for a dependent.

> A son who has left home but who sends his mother more than one-half the sum required for her support is entitled to the \$200 credit, provided the mother can not support herself. Otherwise, the amount must be considered as a gift, and, therefore, the credit is not allowed. A son living at home and supporting his father, mother, or other relative may claim the \$2,000 exemption allowed the head of a family but not the \$200 credit unless such relative is under 18 years of age or incapable of self support.




