NOW IN EFFEOT
Austin, Texas.-An important rul ing made by the attorney genera advises the state superintendent ublic instruction that taxes can b evied this year by school distric
nder the enabling aet putting int effect the amendment to the constitu on raising the limit for school taxes School districts are also advised tha they have the same right to evy and
