I sold one of them to buy feed for the others. As they were all registered. I got \$25 for it.

I took the best of care of them, and in the following September I sold them for \$75 each and the sow for \$135. This amounted to \$735. I put \$700 in the bank and kept the other \$35 to buy my winter clothes with.

In January, 1920, I drew out \$150 and bought 50 purebred Brown Leghorn hens and five roosters with \$145 of it. I took the other \$5 and bought my brother a Christmas present; although it was a late one, he said that was all right, that it is not the time it is given or the present that is given-it's the giver.

From my 55 chickens I raised 130 young ones, and sold \$20 worth of eggs for hatching, and \$12 worth on the market. I also gave my relatives and neighbors a good many settings. I have now with my father's and brother's help 240 chickens, 110 of | them laying, and \$580 in the bank. This year I bought a fine Jersey heifer and a kodak with part of the

#### TEXAS-OKLAHOMA LAND

GIVEN AWAY IN 1838.

Washington .- Claim to 14,000, 000 acres of land in Texas and Oklahoma, including the cities of Tulsa and Oklahoma City and virtually the entire Burkburnett oil field, was filed in the supreme Court on April 9 in behalf of the Cherokee Indian Nation, supported by a government patent issued by President Van Buren and certified as authentic by the Interior Department.

The claim was in the form of a petition for permission to intervene in the Red River oil lands case, an original suit between Texas and Oklahoma involving jurisdiction over the valuable oil fields situated along the common boundary.

The motion was filed by John M. Taylor, grand nephew of General Zachary Taylor, an attorney for the Cherokee nation. He said the patent was discovered accidentally among the papers of a dead chief of

#### STATE RAILROAD IS

The full and plenary control and management of the Texas State Railroad was taken out of the hands of orm of a money-logue.-Boston Trap the State Prison Commission and Pripi. placed with the board of Managers consisting of the Lieutenant Governor, and two practical railroad men named by him by Senate Bill 267. passed by the regular session of the Thirty-Seventh Legislature, effective March 12, 1921, and repealed all laws and parts of laws in conflict therewith, according to an opinion given by the Attorney General to the Prison Commission. It is held that the Prison Commission has not now and has not had since March 12, 1921 any poyer or authority to control, manage, maintain or operate the Texas State Railroad, and is not charged the matter, with any duty with respect to the ontrol, management maintenance or operation of that rall oad.

Should the Loard of Managers fail or refuse for any reason to take over this property and dispose of or operate it as provided by Senate bill 267 the Attorney General suggests that the matter be called to the attention of the Governor by the prison Commission that the Governor may take such action with respect to the property as in his judgment the law and the facts will warrant and require.



Hume, federal director of savings. Sales during January totaled \$2,-646,000, as compared with the lowwater mark reached in September, 1920, of \$1,815,000. During February, the latest month for which figures are available, there was continued improvement; the total reached \$3,324,000-nigh \$6,000,-000 for the two months.

For the past year or more, the volume of thrift stamps and savings certificates presented for redemption has exceeded the amount of new securities sold. 
